Task B: Brainstorming a Possible Topic

- a. Research possible topics you are interested in pursuing for your AP Research Academic Paper (4,000-5,000 words). Write down three to five possible topics.
- b. Choose one of the issues you listed that you consider the one topic you may want to research. What is a current issue you are interested in?
- c. Why are you interested in this issue?
- d. Does this issue have more than one perspective you would like to examine? If so, what are the perspectives? Provide details about how each perspective relates to the topic.
- e. What are your own personal feelings on this issue? Explain why you feel this way.

To have a better understanding of your potential topic, you need to understand and evaluate the research already completed on it. You need to access EBSCO and other databases, including those you used in AP Seminar, to find out what research has already been conducted on your potential topic.
