# Principal's Message

Dear Parents/Guardians,

We have begun second half of the school year. Our teachers and students are working hard as they move forward toward achieving at least a year's growth. We recently assessed all students the second of three-progress monitoring (PM2) tools. This data will be compared to the first PM1 to determine students' strengths and areas needing extra attention. The Leadership Team has met with teachers to discuss every student's progress. We have put plans in place to either enrich or remediate learning activities to ensure all students have an opportunity to reach their fullest potential.

Maintaining a safe campus is a priority at Dania. Guidelines and policies are being implemented districtwide to secure our campuses better. When the school day begins, all perimeter gates must be locked. One entrance (gate # 6) will allow parents and visitors access to the school. The gate must remain closed, and visitors must have proper photo identification and call the school's office to gain entry if it is unmanned when they arrive. Please help us to keep our campus safe by adhering to the following expectations for arrival, dismissal, and access to the campus.

- The parking lot that accesses the front of the school (south lot) opens for drop off at 7:10 for students going to breakfast and remains open until 8:00 AM.
- Students should not be on the school campus before 7:10 AM. There is no supervision!
- The South Gate (3rd Terrace) will be used for guest entrance and exit. We have a Campus Monitor who staffs this gate. However, there are times when they will not be at the gate due to other duties. You must call the school at (754) 323-5350. We will then send someone to open the gate. Please understand that this may take time, so please plan accordingly.
- When entering the campus, please be prepared to present photo identification at the gate entrance and the office and share your purpose or need for entry. Our staff appreciates receiving a positive attitude during these procedures and will reciprocate the same!

We have numerous free student clubs (Art, Chorus, Orchestra, Student Council, Safety Patrol, Morning Announcement Crew, Robotics, Debate Team, and Math Competition Team) and free afterschool tutoring for students in grades 1-5. We are diligently finding ways to ensure our students are provided opportunities to succeed academically, emotionally, and physically.

At this time of the school year, the academic camps take priority. If your child is not included in any camps or clubs and you are interested, please get in touch with Ms. Markevich or Ms. Spencer at 754 323-5350.

Collaboration between parents, community partners, and school staff is crucial to our rich history of success. Help build your child's independence by ensuring they come to school prepared with homework, lunch, laptops, etc. Dania continues to be a wonderful place to work and learn.

Our students have been busy learning and experiencing new adventures. Most students have learned their ABCs and are now using that knowledge to blend and read. It is a fascinating time watching them

become independent readers. To help with this process, please practice reading at home. It is one of the greatest gifts you can give to someone you love...The joy of reading!

Our little ones are learning to add and subtract numbers 0-10 and listen to and solve word problems. While driving, you can ask simple questions like ...2 cars are on our right, and one car is on our left...How many vehicles are next to us? I see four birds on the line, and one just flew away...How many birds are there now?... These are the type of real-world problems they should be solving.

In Social Studies, we completed our unit on Holidays Around the World. Students learned about different cultures and how children celebrate and practice other traditions. One fun fact was knowing that children in Australia believe eight white kangaroos pull Santa's sleigh.

In Science, we learned about plants and animals and how they are alike and different. We also discussed the characteristics of natural and make-believe animals and fiction and nonfiction literature. We are learning about penguins and other animals that live in cold temperatures.

Our last quarter's adventures included an inhouse field trip from the Museum of Arts and Science. The students were excited to interact with robots and do some programming. Our second graders have been learning many strategies to achieve reading success. These strategies are finding the main idea, recalling facts and details, understanding sequence, recognizing cause and effects, making comparing. and predictions. Informational texts about Our Government, learning to develop skills to understand the three content areas: reading comprehension/vocabulary, reading and writing foundational skills. grammar. Please continue to have your child read for 20 minutes each evening.



#### Third Grade News

Third graders have been working hard learning all the new concepts this school year. F.A.S.T. assessment for Reading and Math is taking place in May. We encourage our students to utilize Scholastic Literacy Pro, Epic, Reflex Math, Savvas Easy Bridge Math (Teacher Assigned Lessons), BrainPop, Jr., and F.A.S.T. Assessment Practice Students & Families (flfast.org) to prepare better and be more confident when taking the test.

Consistent practice should continue daily at home to strengthen reading and math skills to make learning gains and reach proficiency. Third graders need to score a Level 2 (285) or higher in reading on the final F.A.S.T. assessment for promotion to fourth grade. Keep in mind that Level 2 is not

proficiency in third-grade skills. Scoring a Level 3 (300) or higher demonstrates proficiency.

For mathematics, students should have a conceptual understanding of multiplication facts (1-12), division, addition with or without regrouping (multi-digit numbers), and subtraction with or without regrouping (multi-digit numbers). Daily practice is necessary to reach procedural fluency in these foundational skills. The foundational skills spiral throughout each topic. When homework is given, students must complete homework assignments and homework to the teacher. The homework assigned additional practice is reinforcement of skills learned in class.

We are proud of our student's progress and look forward to a strong second half of the school year.



## **Fourth Grade News**

- 1. Language Arts/Reading and Writing: We are focusing on responding to informational and opinion prompts, sentence structure, punctuation, and staying on topic. In reading, we focus on inferencing and locating evidence within the text. Parents, please visit Mrs. Podesta's Canvas page to access many educational resources that can be used to improve reading and writing skills. Don't forget to READ, READ and READ!
- 2. Math: We are currently starting topic 8, which is in the second edition of their math series. They were able to take their first edition home. Please don't hesitate to use that for practice and review, especially those word problems they like to avoid.

Please ensure that your children are completing their Calendar Math nightly. I can't express how important it is to practice those skills daily. Students will continue to practice and learn new strategies for multiplying and dividing multi-digit numbers. We will focus on solving multistep word problems and addition and subtraction problems with mixed numbers.

3. Science: Students have been working on the Properties of Minerals and Classifying Rocks.

Our students have completed their FAST mid-term Math and Reading assessments. The scores are listed in pinnacle for your review. Here are some ways you can assist your child at home:

Check their agendas and backpacks nightly/weekly.

Make sure they complete all their reading and math homework assignments.

Work on Success Maker and Epic on the computer at least three times weekly.

Download apps that are beneficial to their academic success in school.

Make sure that if they are healthy, they are present in school. Absences cause them to fall behind. Call the office if your child will be absent.

Asking questions about what they are reading will help them make connections in the book. As reading and writing are interdependent, instruction in one supports learning in the other. As you work with your children at home, please encourage them to write about their reading. This action will

also help to strengthen their ability to comprehend text.

We encourage parents to support their child's reading development by:

- Spending time reading to your child and talking about books
- Spending time listening to your child read
- Giving books as gifts for holidays, birthdays, surprises, or anytime
- · Visiting your local library and getting a library card

Communicating with Children Using Math Language

Talking About Math:

Talking about mathematics with your child – whatever their age – helps strengthen their mathematical reasoning and understanding. Some ways to keep the talk

engaged and focused while you support your child include:

Revoice - Repeat what you heard your child say, then ask for clarification (e.g., "So you are saying it's an odd number?").

Repeat/Restate - Ask your child to restate your reasoning (e.g., "Can you repeat what I said in your own words?").

Reason – Ask your child to apply their reasoning to someone else's reasoning (e.g., "Do you agree or disagree? Tell me why.").

Adding On – Prompt your child to participate further (e.g., "What more would you add to that?").

Think Time – Wait several seconds (try five) to give your child time to think (e.g., "Take some time to think."). You may be surprised by how hard it is to stay silent during that time!

**Artist Corner** Ms. Laden



Why We Teach Art

We know why students often look forward to their art classes: it is a change and fun! It is a time when there is no right or wrong answer; as long as they try, it is impossible to fail. Research has shown that students who participate in the arts (visual arts, music, dance, and drama) perform better in other fields of study. Students can be encouraged to develop creative solutions; it is incredible how inventive they can be. The higher-order thinking skills and problem-solving abilities increase as a result.

The students have been painting with watercolor, distinguished from tempera paint by its transparency. We discussed the

intensity and how lighter and darker values are controlled by the amount of water added to the color. We discussed how to use a paintbrush by using a back-and-forth motion.

Everyone is an Architect... the students designed rectangle shapes on a page to create a "grouping of architectural houses." The lines, shapes, colors, textures, values, and forms are uniquely different for each student. Some students embellished their paintings with oil pastel crayons.

I had the opportunity to teach a lesson on "Henri Matisse - Drawing with Scissors"... the students were introduced to the French Artist and his body of artwork of "Collage" (scissors, paper, and glue). We used scissors to create geometric and organic shapes on a small piece of paper in the style of Matisse. The students did a fantastic job exploring the concept of "Drawing with Scissors." Their practice sample shapes were used to create a composition displayed in the hallway.

The Art Club has been a bounty of creativity! The students draw, paint, and make Play-Doh sculptures, beaded jewelry, weaving, STEAM kits, hair accessories, homemade play dough, and slime. Each afternoon is new and exciting!

Students who are frequently absent in Kindergarten do less well in first grade. Absences add up in elementary school. Research shows that missing 18 days in a school year or two days every month can result in lower test scores and possible retention in later grades.

Regular attendance fosters a classroom community between teachers and children. Students who attend school are more likely to succeed academically. Students gain background knowledge from discussions while learning in school. Attending school also provides time for social interactions with peers.
