



How comfortable are you speaking to other students in your class? Are you willing to walk up to a classmate and begin a conversation, or do you wait until someone approaches you? Do you feel like you know how to start a conversation or do you struggle with what to say? Majority of students I have spoken with have shared the challenges they feel in social settings and connecting with their peers. Many feel lonely, isolated, and lack confidence in social settings, which then further enhance the feelings of loneliness and isolation. So what can you do?

Find ways to get connected to school – Club Rush is taking place on October 5th, and is a great opportunity to learn about the many clubs ATC has to offer. Clubs allow you to meet your peers who have similar interests as your own in a smaller social setting. Not only do clubs help build social connections, they also look great on your resume. Colleges, scholarship foundations, and jobs are looking for students who have leadership experiences and extracurricular involvement. Many clubs can also help link you with volunteer opportunities for community service hours (which are a requirement for graduation). I challenge you to join at least 1 club this year!

Build your communication skills – Put your phone down and start having conversations. Finding common ground can be a great place to start "small talk." Talking about class, school, or homework can be a safe common ground for many students (that is the one thing everyone at school has in common). Giving compliments or commenting on something pleasant can also help draw connections. Still unsure what to do? Observe your peers or practice conversing with your family. Sometimes the only way to learn is to practice – and don't worry if you feel like you mess up, it will only help you next time.

Be an active listener – An important part of a conversation is being a good listener. It helps to follow the flow of conversation by helping you ask follow-up questions. It also helps the person you are talking to know you are engaged and interested. How do you become an active listener? Give your friend your full attention, use your non-verbal cues to show you are paying attention, do not interrupt, and ask questions based on the topic.

Be aware of your body language – As mentioned above, a component of being an active listener means using your non-verbal cues and body language to show you are paying attention. Research has shown that 60% of how a person communicates is made up of non-verbal language. Maintain appropriate eye contact, face the person you are speaking with, be mindful of your facial expressions, monitor your tone, and most importantly, put your phone down!!!

Hope these tips help you feel more confident and give you the courage to start connecting!




Moderna & Pfizer vaccines—how do they work?

It's important to know that scientists had a head start making these COVID-19 vaccines.



Scientists at the National Institutes of Health and the University of Pennsylvania started working on these vaccines after previous coronavirus outbreaks.

They isolated one part of the virus—the spike. This would help them make the vaccines.






These COVID-19 vaccines are mRNA vaccines. Basically, they're instructions for bodies to make examples of COVID-19 spikes.

HERE'S HOW THE VACCINE WORKS IN YOUR BODY





Your immune system will recognize the spikes as new and unusual.





THE SECOND SHOT HELPS THE VACCINE BECOME EVEN MORE EFFECTIVE.



Without vaccine, your immune system won't be fast enough to recognize that the COVID-19 virus is bad. While your immune system desperately works to protect your body, the virus has plenty of time to spread and make you sick.



With vaccine, your body already knows to be on the lookout for the spike. If the virus enters your body, your immune system quickly gets to work destroying the virus.



You won't get sick when your body builds spike examples because the spikes aren't virus. The vaccine does NOT involve injecting you with the COVID-19 virus and it does NOT change your DNA or your genetic code.

After vaccine, you might have some side effects—they will go away in a few days. Side effects are normal signs your body is building protection. Side effects include:

- · Pain and swelling on the arm with the shot.
- Fever, chills, tiredness and headache.
