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

Here are some ways we are learning to add and subtract!

# Strategies for Addition & Subtraction

#### Make a Ten

In Make a Ten for addition, you 30+13=43 take from one addend (number in an addition problem) and give it to the other addend to make it ten. 30+13=43 2.63+1.59 2.63+1.59

28 + 15 22 30 + 13 = 43 50, 28 + 15 = 4

2.63 + 1.59 0.17 3 + 1.42 = 4.42 50, 2.83 + 1.59 = 4.42

In Make a Ten for subtraction, you decompose the number being subtracted so that it will make a ten when you subtract one part and then subtract the rest.

94 - 17 94 - (14 + 3) 94 - 14 = 80 80 - 3 = 77 50, 94 - 17 = 77

#### Count Up/Back

In Count Up or Count Back, you start at the first number in the problem and then count up (addition) or (back) with the second number in the problem. 57 + 24 = 61

#### Doubles/Near Doubles

In Doubles, you know what the number plus itself is. 6 + 6 = 12

In Near Doubles, you think of the two addends as the double problem it is close to and then adjust at the end.

> 7+7=14 14+1=15 So, 7+8=15

#### Compensation


In compensation for addition, you think of one of the addends as a friendly number and then adjust at the end to compensate for the change at the beginning.

In compensation for subtraction you adjust both numbers by the same amount to make the first added a friendly number (10 or 20) and then subtract.

# Partial Sums/Differences

In Partial Sums, you break apart each number by place value, add the pieces, and then put them back together.

$$9.85 = 9 + 0.8 + 0.05$$
  
 $-3.2 = 3 + 0.2$   
 $6 + 0.6 + 0.05 = 6.65$ 



# Think Addition (Subtraction Only)

In Think Addition, you think of what would be missing if it was an addition problem.

## READING CORNER

Thank you to all the moms who joined us for our "Muffins with Mom" event! At the event, we shared a few of the activities from Broward County Schools' "Read-At Home Plan" to support literacy at home. The activities are listed below and find the complete plan on our school website.

<ul> <li>Help your child think of a number of words that start with any specific sound. For example, words that start with the /m/ or /p/ sound (mat, paper).</li> <li>Make up silly sentences with words that begin with the same initial sound. For example, you could say "Nobody was nice to Nancy's neighbor."</li> <li>Practice syllables using clapping games with names of family members, names of common objects found around the house, places you are going or have been.</li> <li>Use sand or playdough to create letters and match their sounds.</li> <li>Have your child find objects around the house with the same initial sounds. For example, have your child find items that begin with /b/.</li> <li>Play Hot Potato with synonyms. Choose a word and a family member has to think of another word that means the same thing. Take turns until no one can think of another word.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Hunt for words. Choose a blend (for example bl) and have your child hunt for five items beginning with the blend. As each object is found, help your child write the words in a list (blanket, blue pen).</li> <li>Play a phonics race by setting the timer and competing to come up with the most words with a blend (cl, pr, bl) in one minute. Compare your word lists and play again! Your child will be eager to beat his/her last score.</li> <li>Record the reading. Use a cell phone or MP3 device to record your child's reading. Once recorded, invite your child to listen to his/her reading and follow along in the book.</li> <li>Select a new word each week to learn and use in every-day language. Create a point system with family members on who uses the word the most that week.</li> <li>Build vocabulary by introducing a new word and offer its definition or use it in a context that is easily understood. For example, say "I think I will drive the vehicle to the store. I am too tired to walk."</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Practice clapping out words with three or more syllables (fish/er/man; par/a/graph; el/e/va/tor).</li> <li>Ask your child to find objects around the house that are compound words (football, headboard, watermelon). Help your child write a list of the words and break them apart to show the two parts of the word.</li> <li>To increase fluency speed, use a stopwatch to set a timeframe to read any given passage or text. Have your child record their time and encourage him/her to read the passage again to beat the last time.</li> <li>Play a word collection game with family members by having each family member collect as many interesting words they read about or came across that day. At the dinner table, have each family member go around and share their word. Discuss the meaning, and practice using the word in spoken language.</li> </ul>











