Why is it important to earn your AICE diploma?

One of the most asked questions that is heard when we talk about the Cambridge AICE Diploma is "Why?" Earning an AICE diploma requires you to take 7 different rigorous courses and pass their corresponding college-level exams within 3 school years. If you polled our current AICE diploma seeking students at EHS, almost all of them would tell you that they are working towards their AICE diploma for 3 reasons:


- 1. Our rigorous AICE courses help to prepare them for college.
- Each passed AICE exam earns at least 3 college credits, so an AICE diploma means leaving EHS with at least 21 college credits.
- 3. The AICE Diploma is an automatic qualifier for the Bright Futures Scholarship

(with the completion of 100 hours of community service), regardless of SAT/ACT score.

Spotlight from Ms. Shadeed's AICE U.S. History Class:

l introduced the lesson, "How to write a Paper 1 essay" to my 8th period students for the very first time about two weeks ago. We read the primary sources together in class, I modeled and illustrated how to underline, annotate, and evaluate primary sources, using a previously posted level 5 sample paper online. A week later, I then split up my class into different groups and allowed the students to work collaboratively on completing a Paper 1 essay together before assigning each student to write an essay on their own. Much to my surprise, the students performed better than expected. The average passing score was an 80%!!!!! With more practice and exposure to writing Paper 1 essays, I have no doubt that these students will achieve even higher scores in the future. I am very proud of them :)
