Attendance Counts! All Day, Every School Day

Encouraging regular school attendance is one of the most powerful ways you can prepare your child for success—both in school and in life. When you make school attendance a priority, you help your child get better grades, develop healthy life habits, avoid dangerous behavior and have a better chance of graduating from high school.

When kids are absent for an average of just two days of school per month—even when the absences are excused— it can have a negative impact. These absences can affect kids as early as Kindergarten. For example, young elementary school students who miss an average of just two school days per month often have difficulty keeping up with their peers academically and tend to fall behind in reading. But when students are able to read on grade level by the end of third grade, which is when kids transition from learning to read to reading to learn, they are three to four times more likely to graduate high school and attend college, post-graduate, or professional development classes than their peers who struggle with reading. Students who attend school regularly also feel more connected to their community, develop important social skills and friendships.

As a parent, you can prepare your child for a lifetime of success by making regular school attendance a priority. By figuring out the reasons for your child's absences—whether they're physical or emotional—and taking advantage of support services—such as tutoring, counseling and afterschool activities— you can help set your child on the path to success.




We are looking forward to our trip to JA Biztown on December 19th and are still in need of volunteers. We would love to have you and you will love participating. Contact your child's teacher for more information.

Reading in 3rd Grade

Many reading lessons in 3rd grade are dedicated to writing and talking about the meanings, lessons, and important ideas in texts. Third graders are encouraged to develop their own points of view about books they read, and to discuss their ideas about a text or characters. Series books are important in 3rd grade, because they allow students to make connections between different books and talk about how certain characters develop. As 3rd graders explore a greater range of books and longer texts, they become more fluent readers and learn to read, define, and pronounce complex words.

To build reading skills, your 3rd grader:

*Reads multi-syllable and grade-appropriate, irregularly spelled words*Reads grade-level text with appropriate pace, accuracy, expression, and understanding.*Self-corrects mistakes and re-reads when necessary.*Talks about and answers questions about a text using specific examples from the text and connects different parts of a text.*Reads a variety of texts including, fiction, non-fiction, fables, and poetry, and understands and talks about their main ideas and lessons.*Begins to understand the difference between literal and non-literal text such as metaphors and analogies.*Uses the text and context to determine the meaning of words.*Is able to express his own point of view about characters or a text.

Bonus Reading Activities

Get Serious About Series: Find a series that interests your child and begin to read it together. You can read to your child, your child can read to you, or he can read a chapter independently. You can even interview each other as you read — ask about main ideas, events, and thoughts you each have about the books and characters.

Look It Up: When your child encounters a word, she doesn't know the meaning of, look up the meaning together. Use a grade-appropriate tool like a dictionary — or you can even keep your own family dictionary, recording words and their definitions. Use the word yourself or encourage your child to use that word in a sentence sometime during the day.

Learn About an Author: As your child develops favorite authors, look online for that author's website. He can email or write a letter to the author (under your supervision), or the author may even be at a book signing or other events in your neighborhood that your family can attend.



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Sensational 2nd Grade

It's already November! Time is really flying. We are having a blast learning new things in second grade!

In English Language Arts, we are working on reading, writing, speaking and listening about texts on a variety of topics and genres which helps to build knowledge about the world. We are incorporating our Native American Unit into Social Studies and into ELA. Your child will be reading, writing, and creating artifacts to learn all about the cultures of different Native American Tribes. We are also going to be learning about immigration, American symbols, citizenship, contributions of famous women, African Americans, and veterans!

In Math, we are working to strengthen our fluency in addition and subtraction facts through 20 using mental strategies. We will be finding sums of 2-digit numbers with and without regrouping. We will be using various strategies including the standard algorithm.

In Science, we will be working on force and motion and changes in properties.

Please make sure to read with your child every night and complete reading and math i-Ready lessons at home. Reflex Math and flash cards are great resources to use for math fluency. It is vital that your child knows his/her addition and subtraction facts through 20 fluently.
