Mission Statement

Engagement of Parents and Families

It is our goal to involve parents in all aspects of the Title I programs. The School Advisory Committee (SAC) has the responsibility to develop, implement, and evaluate the school level plans, including the School Improvement Plan and Parent and Family Engagement Plan. More than 50 percent of members of SAC are parent (non-employee) representatives. Additionally, parents are given the opportunity to review the plan and offer input prior to approval. To develop the PFEP, all parents are given the opportunity to complete the Annual School Parent Survey which seeks input on activities, training, and materials used to help their children. Results of parent surveys are reviewed by SAC to determine changes as needed. During the SAC meeting where SIP and PFEP are developed, parental input is used to determine how parental involvement funds will be used.

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Flexible Parent Meetings

Other Activities

The school quarterly Newsletter which includes a calendar listing of upcoming events and meetings scheduled for the month. Flyers in multiple languages are also sent home announcing SAC meetings, Parent Conferences, Reading, Math, Science and Technology nights, as well as activities with our Community Partners. Emails and Parentlinks are also sent for these activities. Parents will be encouraged to participate in our Volunteer Program, helping in the classrooms, student productions, field day, and class trips.

Communication

The Annual Title I Meeting in conjunction with the Driftwood Elementary Open House will be held in August/September. Information regarding Title I programs, curriculum and standards, academic assessments and other pertinent information is presented. Parents will learn about school wide programs, scheduling parent-teacher conferences, and opportunities for participation in decision related to the education of their child. Parents are invited to their child's classroom to meet the staff. Teacher's will provide additional information on their subjects of instruction, standards, assessment plans, and how parents can help at home. Informational packets containing all the material shared will be sent home for all parents unable to attend. If a parent should be unsatisfied with the schoolwide program plan under section 1114(b)(2) they will be given an opportunity to provide comments to the Administration, who will forward concerns to the district. The school will also update and maintain the Driftwood Elementary Website and Facebook page. Teachers have a minimum of two Parent-Teacher Conferences. Teachers are available in the mornings and afternoon to return parent calls and answer emails. Another means of communication are Agendas and Home notes.

Accessibility

<u>Driftwood Elementary School</u> will provide full opportunities for participation in parent and family engagement activities for all parents, guardians, and family members (including parents, guardians and family members with limited English proficiency, disabilities, and parents, guardians and family members of migratory children). Student agendas are the best means of communication about schoolwide activities. Students are required to have their agendas signed daily. Forms or flyers that are sent home announcing SAC meetings, Parent-Conferences, Family Nights, and Community Partner activities are in multiple languages. Parents receive emails and Parentlinks as reminders of all upcoming activities. With many staff members that are bilingual, communication with parents in Creole and Spanish is facilitated. Written communication will be provided for parents in English and Spanish. Translators will be available at all parent meetings and in the school offices to ensure the parents are able to participate fully. The LEA will ensure that an individual is available to provide those services in Spanish or Haitian Creole. The LEA and school personnel will run a Language Survey Report to determine any needs that have changed based on the population we serve. The school is fully handicapped accessible.
