CLASS OF 2020

As the end of high school approaches, many students will still be taking upcoming standardized tests. They may be Advanced Placement exams for college credit, or the SAT or ACT in order to get a higher score to qualify for various scholarships. Scoring high on these standardized tests can mean saving thousands of dollars on tuition, so these tests can be high stakes.

There are various principles that will help students score well on any standardized test, not only in high school, but the standardized tests one may encounter in college and beyond. This is a broad guide to help students

maximize their performance on standardized tests.

Firstly, some standardized tests test specific content knowledge, e.g., A.P. Microeconomics, and other standardized tests test generalized verbal and math skills, though the math skills themselves do necessitate knowing the content of the math subjects tested, e.g., algebra.

With tests that test specific content knowledge, students are well advised to utilize books, software, videos, flashcards, etc., that are specifically designed to help on those tests. If one can afford to do so, there are test preparation courses which one can attend, e.g., Kaplan, Princeton Review, and others, (some of them have offered scholarships on occasion), as well of course as private tutors. What is available depends upon the specific content. In A.P. Microeconomics which I currently teach, there are books and videos, but no software. In other A.P. courses, there is sometimes software. Many of the resources have model tests, and sometimes released prior tests. Often the resources have detailed content knowledge outlines, and they sometimes come with a planned study program. One should take a model or released test under simulated test conditions for diagnostic purposes to spotlight one's weaknesses and strengths and thereby know what to focus on. Also, one needs to know the percentage breakdown of the content that is tested so one can focus on content that is more tested with numerous questions as opposed to content where there may only be one or two questions concerning it.

Of course, the key to successful preparation for standardized testing is lots and lots of practice and studying! But one's practice has to be intelligently engaged in. When one errs and gets a question wrong, one must understand and study precisely where and how one made an error, and precisely why the credited response is correct.

Time is of the utmost importance on standardized tests, and by frequent practicing one can learn to pace oneself. Also, please keep in mind that on many standardized tests -- not all -- multiple choice questions get more difficult as one progresses through the test, so the questions towards the end of the section may be the most difficult ones even though they're worth the same as the earlier, easier questions. Standardized tests are typically timed, and, typically, all questions within a section may have equal point value, for example, all the multiple choice questions are often worth the same. Time is of the essence, and one needs to learn that when one encounters a tough question, one should not spend all of one's time on it, but rather, skip to the next questions -- without misnumbering your answers on the answer sheet -- and come back to it later if one has time. Also, some tests have no penalties for wrong answers, so guessing if one doesn't know is recommended, while other tests have penalties for wrong answers, and one should only guess if one can eliminate at least one choice.

Here's what one ought to do to maximize performance:

- If it's a content area test of specific knowledge, there is no way around this, one MUST master the content through study.
- -Use test preparation guides and prior released tests, if available, to know what specific content to focus on.

- -If available, use software, flashcards, and videos to shore up your content knowledge.
- Take a diagnostic practice test under simulated test conditions to learn your strengths and weaknesses.
- Focus on remediation in your weak areas.
- Learn how the testmaker thinks...understand exactly why the right answers are right and why the wrong answers are wrong.
- Study the prior released tests and model tests you've taken. Understand why you erred and precisely why the right answers
- If there are essays in the test, one must practice writing these essays under test conditions and try to find someone who can constructively critique them.
- Practice and preparation are the key. If one has taken a lot of practice tests under simulated test conditions, the actual test situation that you'll find yourself in will be familiar. If you're well prepared, there will be fewer surprises to throw you off.

There is no royal road to doing well, other than intelligent earnest efforts.




CLASS OF 2022
