Letter for your summer reading. There are several versions of the book available at the public library; however, the novel is also available online for free <u>here</u>. Turn in your summer reading project to the Dropbox in the "Class of 2021" Course in D2L by August 23, 2019. This due date is for ALL juniors, regardless of when they take English (Honors or Dual Enrollment) during the school year.

You will do a project that has two components. This will be your first major grade, so take this seriously. The first component of the project is a short essay (1-2 pages). The second component is a visual representation. (It can be created by hand or computer.) Please refer to the "Class of 2021" D2L for the details of the project as well as the grading rubric. Students who do a tangible visual representation should take a picture of their artwork and submit it to D2L as well as bring it to school.

Info For Rising Seniors

If you have spoken to any graduating seniors, you will know that they all would give you the same advice for senior year—

GET READY FOR THE COLLEGE EXPERIENCE EARLY, SO YOU AREN'T SCRAMBLING AT THE END OF SENIOR YEAR!

Remember—<u>FIU</u>'s application usually comes online on July 1. Most of the other applications come online on August 1. If a college has a deadline (like <u>UF</u> and <u>FSU</u>), you need to have everything in by the deadline. For UF and FSU, I believe you can use the Nov./Dec. tests, if you have one test score already into the college. If a college has rolling admissions, like most of the other state schools, (first-come, first served), the earlier you have everything in, the better!

Timing is everything!



Florida Memorial University

<u>Florida Memorial University</u>, Miami Gardens, FL - If you have a 3.6 unweighted GPA, no matter what your test scores are, you can get FULL TUITION. FMU only looks at your test scores for placement. They also have a five-year nursing program. You will receive a B.S. in Biology and Nursing. They relate to FIU & UM for Nursing Program.



US Coast Guard

Check out the US Coast Guard's Culinary

<u>Program!!!</u> Boot camp is eight weeks in New Jersey. Culinary Specialist School is 13 weeks in California.

The signing bonus once you finish school is \$30,000. You don't have to know how to swim in order to go into the Coast Guard. Contact Mrs. DiAlberto for details.





Test Scores

SAT/ACT

Juniors, if you are on the <u>National Lunch</u> <u>Program</u>, you should have a total of <u>2 SAT</u> <u>waivers</u> in your <u>College Board portal</u>. If you are on National Lunch Program, you need to get the <u>ACT waivers</u> from Mrs. DiAlberto. You are entitled to 2 in your lifetime.

Please remember that parents need to reapply for National Lunch Program in the fall. If you qualify, you will receive 2 free SAT's, 2 free ACT's, <u>NCAA waiver</u> (if you are an athlete), and college application fee waivers.

Khan Academy and <u>ACT Academy</u> are free tools to help you prepare for the tests.

If you haven't sent your <u>SAT/ACT</u> scores to schools to which you will be applying, do so now! Go on the <u>CollegeBoard</u> or <u>ACT</u> website and have your scores sent. Make sure that you put schools down that you would like your scores to be sent when you register for SAT/ACT.

Please do your BRAG Sheets in <u>Naviance</u>, so that you can make a resume. Also, you need 2-3 letters of recommendation from adults who like you a lot, who will say wonderful things about you, and who know your character. This could be teacher, coach, sponsor of organization, someone you volunteer for, someone you work for, and/or an adult family friend. Financial Aid

If you are planning on attending college in the summer of 2020, <u>FAFSA</u> should be done NOW! Timing is everything!

Step 1: Student and parent must create an FSA ID. Go to: <u>https://fsaid.ed.gov/</u> The parent FSA ID must be created with a different email address from the student's email address.

At the end, it will send a "secure code" to your email address. You will have to go to your email, get the code, and enter it into the FSA website. This is the last step in creating your FSA ID.

Step 2: Go to: <u>fafsa.ed.gov</u>. Click "Start a new FAFSA." You will be doing the 2019-2020 FAFSA if you will be starting college in the summer of 2020.

Student Demographic Information

If you are male, you MUST select "yes" to register with the selective service.

What will be your grade level when you begin the school year? Never attended college/ 1^{st} yr.

School Selection - Choose up to 10 schools. You will be able to add schools/change your selections later if you need to by logging back in

and choosing "add a school." Dependency Status - Most of you are Dependent on your parents (per Federal law). If your parents were never married: the parent that you lived with most during the last 12 months, if you did not live with one parent more than the other, provide info about the parent who provided more financial support during the last 12 months, or during the most recent year that you actually received support from a parent. If your parents are unmarried and both parents live together: you need info from both your parents.

If your parents are married: you need info from both your parents.

If your parent is remarried after being widowed or divorced: you need info from your parent and stepparent.

If your parents are divorced or separated: you need info from the parent that you lived with most during the last 12 months. If you did not live with one parent more than the other, provide info about the parent who provided more financial support during the last 12 months, or during the most recent year that you received support from a parent.

If your parent is widowed: you need info from your parent.

Parent Financial Information - Linking to the <u>IRS</u> <u>Data Retrieval Tool</u>: Use the PARENT FSA ID to link to their taxes. Make sure "filing status" and address match EXACTLY as they were reported on the taxes, for it to transfer successfully. If you cannot link to the IRS Data Retrieval Tool, use form 1040, 1040A, or 1040EZ to complete this section.

Student Financial Information - If student did not file taxes, answer "not going to file" from the drop-down menu. For any question, if the answer is "0," answer "0."

Sign and Submit - You will receive an email when it has processed successfully. Look at your <u>Student Aid Report (SAR)</u> to see what federal aid you are eligible for.

You will receive an <u>EFC (Expected Family</u> <u>Contribution)</u>. The closer the EFC is to 0, the more financial aid you will receive.

Contact FAFSA at 800-433-3243 if you have any questions, or do not receive an email with your SAR Report.

BRACE Cadet Application Announcement

Broward County Public Schools is committed to creating a vibrant college and career going culture, and in preparing all students for thriving lifestyles after high school. To accomplish this, School Counseling and BRACE is recruiting its second cohort of BRACE Cadets. BRACE Cadets are peer influencers and visionary leaders who use their knowledge and influence to help their peers prepare to succeed in college, career, and life after high school.

What is a BRACE Cadet?

BRACE Cadets are high school students who implement special projects in their schools to help their peers get ready for college, career and to succeed in life after high school.

Who is eligible to be BRACE Cadet?

All high school students in grades 9-12 are eligible to apply.

What are the requirements to apply to be a BRACE Cadet?

All BRACE Cadets must be acting to prepare for college, career and life after high school, and have at minimum completed the following at the time they apply.

Naviance: Complete the Naviance learning style inventory and career interest profiler; create a scholarship list and add 3 scholarships you want to apply for this/next school year.

Application: Complete the BRACE Cadet application link in Naviance.

What will the BRACE Cadet do?

The BRACE Cadet will design and implement 2 projects/campaigns to help peers take important action to get ready for college, career, and life after high school. These projects will focus on one of the priority areas (see below); will be something the BRACE cadet feels passionate about and is excited to do; and can be accomplished in the required time. BRACE Cadets will work closely with their BRACE Advisor; and use social media to help build the BRACE Cadet brand and promote college and career success.

What are the priority areas for the BRACE Cadets?

BRACE Cadets will develop projects in one or more of these priority areas:

Naviance: assist students become confident in using Naviance to prepare for college, career, and apply for scholarships.

College Readiness: educate peers on the college application process, how to find the best-fit

colleges, and help them to complete at least 3 college applications.
