Creative Summit

Our friends at [YoungArts](#) tipped us off to the upcoming [Creative Summit](#).

The 11th Creative Time Summit, an annual convening for thinkers, dreamers, and doers working at the intersection of art and politics will be held in Miami for the first time this November 1-3, 2018. Titled *On Archipelagos and Other Imaginaries—Collective Strategies to Inhabit the World*, it takes coalition as a central theme, and utilizes the archipelago as a framework to delve into Miami’s historical connection to the Caribbean and, by extension, to Latin America and the entire world. The topics under discussion will range from immigration and borders to climate realities, notions of intersectional justice, gentrification, tourism as an enabler for neocolonialism, and the roles art and activism can play in all these pressing issues.

The Summit will be made up of four thematic sections: “Facing climate realities, reimagining a green future,” “Toward an intersectional justice,” “Resisting displacement and violence,” and “On boundaries and a borderless future.”

These themes will be explored through community-driven breakout sessions, social events, roundtable discussions, workshops, panels, field trips, interactive performances, screenings, and other creative formats designed to share tools, strategies, and actions with over 1,000 international and local attendees.

The Summit will hold its inaugural Film Series in Miami-Beach, featuring showings by

filmmakers from the Miami-Florida area, the Caribbean, Latin America, and beyond, highlighting the richness and diversity of independent filmmaking. The selected films broadly engage with the major themes of this year's Summit, encouraging thoughtful conversations around borders and migration, ecological struggles, gender politics, and economic inequality. 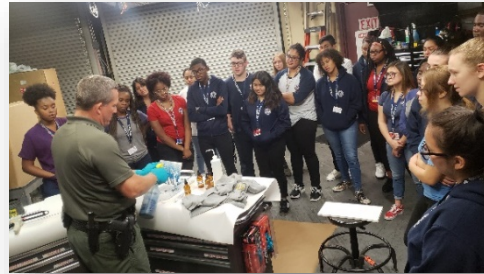

FORENSIC AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE

Forensic and Environmental Science



Law and Order: STHS Edition

Last month, I took my Forensic Science class on an exclusive behind-the-scenes trip of the new [Broward County Judicial Complex](#). We were treated to an overview of the criminal and legal process – from evidence collection, to processing, and finally into the courtroom. Students prepared for weeks, researching and writing well-crafted questions for all the experts they'd meet. They interviewed Ballistics Experts, a Toxicologist, DNA Analysts, Forensic Investigators, and a Criminal Judge. I'm proud of the thought-provoking questions asked and grateful for the opportunity to extend my classroom out into the real world.

Students toured the Crime Scene Unit where they got to speak first-hand with actual forensic scientists and observe them on the job. Though we only stood outside of the massive three-story evidence vault, we did get to observe the toxicology lab and tour the ballistics lab. State-of-the-art equipment was in use all around, including gas chromatography analyzers, comparison microscopes, and all kinds of monitors and digital instruments. Hearing the scientists respond to the students' questions it

was obvious they're incredibly competent individuals who take great pride in a job incredibly well done. Sergeant Joe Torok and Detective Dave Currie then treated the class to an interactive demonstration of techniques they use out in the field as Forensic Investigators, including fingerprinting and presumptive blood tests. *Jackeline Villavicencio* asked whether they've worked any life-changing cases. Side note – these men share approximately fifty years of combined job experience. Without hesitation, they responded “the Marjory Stoneman Douglas tragedy.” As Sergeant Torok is nearing retirement, Chris Lyons asked what qualities he expects of his replacement, to which he replied: “someone who has compassion and empathy, because it is our job to speak for those who no longer have a voice.”

The class was then ushered into the courtroom of the Honorable Judge Ilona Holmes. She led an incredibly candid Q&A session where she shared personal experiences leading to her success. “Learn to love to read,” she urged students. As the longest-serving black judge in Broward County, she is an inspiring role model, and a few moments in her presence prove she's a force to be reckoned with. “Learn the law, so it can work for you,” and “march to your own beat,” she commanded. It was a truly empowering experience. Just ask Makeda Drummond, as seen in the front row of the class picture, holding the Judge's gavel!
