## ILLNESSES

Please remember to keep your student home if he/she is ill. Sick students can easily infect others. If a child becomes ill at school, and after a period of rest in the clinic, cannot return to class, you will be noti-fied to pick up your student.

Children cannot remain at school when ill. Any student having or suspected of having a communicable disease will not be permitted to attend school. Any student returning to school after having a communicable disease must provide a doctor's note indicating that return to school is safe.

# TITLE 1

There has been extensive research conducted in the area of parental engagement. One study yielded the following: "When schools, families, and community groups work together to support learning, children tend to do better in school, stay in school longer, and like school more (Southwest Educational Development Laboratory)." The report, a synthesis of research on parent involvement over the past decade, goes on to find that, regardless of family income or background, "students with involved parents" are more likely to:

- $\sim$  Earn higher grades and test scores, and enroll in higher-level programs.
- $\sim$  Be promoted, pass their classes, and earn credits.
- $\sim$  Attend school regularly.
- $\sim$  Have better social skills, show improved behavior, and adapt well to school.
- $\sim$  Graduate and go on to postsecondary education.

Title I, Part A provides for substantive parental involvement at every level of the program, such as in the development and implementation of the State and local plan, and in carrying out the local educational agency (LEA) and school improvement provisions. Section 1116 contains the primary Title I, Part A requirements for state educational agencies (SEA), LEAs and schools related to involving parents in their children's education. It is this section that identifies critical points in the process of improving teaching and learning where parents and the community can assist in school improvement. Although section 1116 is wide-ranging in scope and has many requirements for LEAs and schools, the intent is not to be burdensome.

These provisions reflect good practice in engaging families in helping to educate their children, because students do better when parents are actively involved in the education process, both at home and school.

## Our Parent Engagement Program is designed to:

- I. Inform parents about Title I regulations.
- 2. Involve parents in local Title I decisions.
- 3. Provide literacy training.
- 4. Offer parents training in schools and the community on ways to work with their children at home to raise student achievement.

## Tips for avoiding the summer slide... From Scholastic

## I. Full of Summer Reading Fun

"Visit your local public library because there is so much going on and the enthusiasm of the librarians is infectious. So many libraries do wonderful summer reading programs for all ages. We actually have a program called 'Teens & Tots' where older kids read to younger kids — it's great to make that connection between kids, and both generations really enjoy it. We also hold a lot of activities at night, like story hours, so parents can come after work with their children — and we encourage parents to volunteer, which really shows the kids that reading is important to adults as well."

## 2. Show Children That Reading Is Important to You

"Model, model, <u>model</u>. It cannot be emphasized enough that children who observe their parents reading become readers themselves. Make sure there are plenty of reading materials scattered throughout the house - not just novels, but magazines and newspapers as well."

## 3. Make Summer Reading a Way to Connect

"Some children respond better when they know other children are going to read and respond to a book, which is why **book discussion groups** are great. I also think parents should be required to read what their children read at all ages so they can really connect with their child and be able to answer questions and instigate discussion. This is one of the reasons parent/child book groups are so great." - John Peters, Central Children's Room, The New York Public Library

## 4. Set Reading Times and Find the Fun in Books

"The number-one golden rule is to make time to read over the summer — parents should designate an hour a day just for books or set aside a time once a week to go to the library. There's so much going on in the summer, so much temptation to be outside, that it's important to schedule time just for reading. Have kids keep a reading journal — even if it's just the book titles. Once the journal gets filled up, there's a real sense of accomplishment that's very rewarding."

## PRE-KINDERGARTEN

We are fast approaching the end of the school year!! The preschool has so much to look forward to. Wednesday, May 26, we will have a virtual Kindergarten Roundup. Those students returning to Pasadena Lakes Elementary in 2021-2022 will get to virtually meet some of their teachers and see the classrooms. As we get closer to the end of the school year, we will begin to reflect on all that we have learned. Our students have flourished so much, and they are really beginning to show off how much they have learned and how much they have grown! There will still be plenty of time to continue working on our letter and number recognition skills, as well as our social skills-taking turns and being kind to our friends. Look out May, here we come!!!

## KINDERGARTEN

Can you believe we are almost at the end of Kindergarten? Oh how our students have grown this year! This month we will be reviewing everything we have learned this year in reading. For math, we will begin learning about 2-dimensional and 3-dimensional shapes. Please continue reading with your child every night and practice sight words. Thank you for all you do at home to ensure your child's success!

# FIRST GRADE

We'd like to take this time to thank all of our wonderful parents for an awesome school year despite the uncertain times we've all gone through!! We've been honored to have taught your child this school year. We appreciate all of your support and hard work! If you should have any questions and/or concerns, please contact your child's teacher. J A message about summer school was sent out from the district to all parents, should anyone be interested in having their child attend.

**Reading:** Students will be reviewing critical content and standards taught in preparation for the next grade level. They will continue reading higher level passages to increase their reading fluency and comprehension skills. They love reading those chapter books.

# Writing: Students will be reviewing narrative writings in which they recount two or more appropriately sequenced events, include some details regarding what happened, use temporal words to signal event order, and provide a sense of closure. Students will participate in shared research and writing on a given topic and use them to write a sequence of instructions.

**Math:** Students will continue reviewing numbers, patterns, and addition and subtraction concepts. They will identify and describe three-dimensional shapes according to defining attributes. They will compose new shapes by combining three-dimensional shapes. They will identify two-dimensional shapes on three-dimensional shapes. They will be identifying and counting coins to add up to \$1.00, as well as having an understanding of fractions with equal and unequal parts.

**Science:** They will raise questions about the natural world, investigate them through free exploration, and generate appropriate explanations based on these. They will describe the need for water and how to be safe around water. They will recognize that some things in the world around us happen fast and some happen slowly.

**Social Studies:** Students will review basic map facts using key elements including cardinal directions and map symbols (map of their bedroom, classroom, a route to school). They will describe how location, weather, and physical environment affect the way people live within our community. (effects it has on their food, clothing, shelter, transportation, and recreation). They will also review a variety of physical features using a map and globe. (oceans, peninsulas, lakes, rivers, swamps, and gulfs).

## SECOND GRADE

**Reading:** 2nd grade is busy building reading stamina to get ready for the End of the Year Reading Test in May. You may have noticed passages and pair questions have been assigned for homework. It is important that your child complete these homework assignments on their own and you as the parent check the work when they are finished. Please continue to encourage your child to read at home nightly and log onto I-Ready Reading for at least 15 minutes a day.

**Math:** In math we are finishing data. We will be moving on to 3-D shapes (cube, rectangular prisms etc.) Please remind your child to log onto Reflex Math and I-Ready Math for at least 15 minutes a day. Math is everywhere, real life world problems build math fluency. Take the opportunity at a grocery store to add two products, use addition, and remember to place the decimal in the right place. Talk about shapes in

buildings, subtract different denominations of cents from a dollar. Make it fun!

**Science**: Our young scientists will be learning about the life cycles of living things.

# THIRD GRADE

Summer is almost here!

As the final quarter for the 2020-2021 School comes to a close, 3rd grade students will focus on completing their Keystones and reviewing critical comprehension and numeracy skills. Please continue to reinforce the use of taught strategies for comprehension and using good study habits for their transition to 4<sup>th</sup> grade. Additionally, mitigate summer reading and numeracy loss by starting plans for summer learning activities and projects!

You can help your 3<sup>rd</sup> grader by facilitating their participation in authentic practice of the skills they have been learning. Let them measure the size of a living or bedroom, help them to use measuring and fractions in a cooking or baking activity, ask them to calculate change based on a purchase made or tell you the time from an analog clock in the home. You can reinforce time elapse skills by asking them to tell you how many minutes from home to school or a place of interest. Have them read a book to you each night, alternating between a factual book and a fictional book each night. Consistency is the key to academic success!

Towards the end of the quarter, we will introduce some 4<sup>th</sup> grade skills to prepare them for the next school year. As such, attendance and punctuality remain critical for the remaining weeks of the guarter.

Let us make their transition to 4<sup>th</sup> grade a success by being present and on time every day!

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## FOURTH GRADE

Our fourth-grade students have been working extremely hard this year! As we enter the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, we are focusing on standards where our students could use more practice in ELA, Math, and Science. Please help encourage your child at home by helping them practice utilizing the information given to them (brochure, editing task, and practice packets). Also, speak with your child about putting forth effort and doing their very best as we enter into the last phase of the school year. FSA Writing took place on April 12. We are preparing our students or FSA ELA which will take place on May 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> and FSA Math will take place on May 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup>.

Please ensure students arrive to school on time and they eat a healthy breakfast the morning of the test. As always the fourth grade team would like to say "Thank You" to our parents for all the support you have given to us!!

# FIFTH GRADE

Fifth grade is busy reviewing standards and skills and prepping for the upcoming FSAs. The dates for the assessments are as follows:

ELA (Reading) – May  $5^{th} - 6^{th}$ Math – May  $12^{th} \& 14^{th}$ Science – May  $19^{th} - 20^{th}$

# S. T.E.M. (SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING, MATH): Ms. Organo

Wow, can you believe we are almost done with this very different school year? The STEM Department would like to thank you for your support of your children. The students are now considered "Engineers" as they can build and explain different types of structures. The students are also learning all about Life Sciences in this fourth quarter.

As we continue to teach in the E-Learning Model, grades K-I will be learning about Physical Science and grades 2-3 students will be learning about different types of energy. Both 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students will be learning Life Science concepts that are critical for them to understand moving forward into each grade level. Fifth grade is preparing to take the FSA Science Test and I am getting them ready by reviewing all science content. The students are also observing and actively asking questions to better understand the teacher in-class demonstrations. The students are now utilizing hands-on experiences in the STEM Class-room.





The students will be focusing on Low Organizational Games for the next few weeks.



## SCHOOL COUNSELOR: Ms. Thomson

One of the 7 Habits of Happy Kids is "sharpen the saw." May can be a stressful month for students as there is a lot of testing and students are getting ready to transition into the next grade level. At students may times feel overwhelmed. It is important for students to find self-care strategies that work for them. Some ideas for self-care include coloring, going on a bide ride, journaling, spending time with a pet, or listening to music. Some basic self-care that all students should do is get enough sleep, eat healthy, drink water, and exercise.

Sharpening the also saw includes improving the self and continuing to learn. Even during summer months, students can continue learning. Parents can encourage their children to find a hobby that they would enjoy or books about something that interests them.

May is also mental health awareness month. Although it occurs less commonly in children than adults, children can experience anxiety and depression.
