Dear Morrow Families,

I am proud to say that our school year is off to an exceptional start! Since our students returned in August, they have actively engaged in a variety of academic and Social Emotional Learning (SEL) experiences. We are excited about the growth we are already seeing from our Patriot students!

Safety continues to be our priority here at Morrow. We would like to thank you for your adherence to our safety protocols, including our arrival and dismissal procedures. Please be aware that every student is required to wear an ID badge the entire day at school. All safety drills and school related updates will be communicated via Parent Link. Please stay connected to what is happening at Morrow by regularly checking our website at www.browardschools.com/morrow and by following us on Twitter at @MorrowElem. In addition, please check your child's backpack daily for flyers and announcements.

Parents, please remind your children and grandchildren regarding safety procedures and the importance of <u>NOT</u> making threats to schools, students, and employees. All threats will be taken seriously and investigated by the school district and law enforcement agencies. Based on the findings, students may be subject to school discipline as well as criminal charges. Please review the attached safety procedures and letter that was sent by Superintendent Runcie regarding the mobile apps for reporting suspicious activity. The arrival and dismissal safety procedures at Morrow is also attached and a reminder that <u>All</u> visitors to our campus will be required to present a picture identification for entrance.

All compulsory age students are required to attend school every day of the 180-day school year (based on Florida State Statute). A student has a "pattern of non-attendance" if he or she is absent from school a total of 30 hours (5 days) in any one marking period or 60 hours (10 days) within 90 days. Unexcused absences, excused absences, tardies, or early sign-outs add up to non-attendance. Please ensure that your child is in school every school day before 8:00 a.m. and plan family activities after 2:00 p.m. to allow students the opportunity to participate in all learning activities. If there is an emergency and you need to pick up your child prior to 1:30 p.m., please allow enough time, you will need to wait for a staff member to escort your child to the office. Your patience and cooperation with this procedure is greatly appreciated. Early dismissal will not be allowed after 1:30 p.m.

Thank you for supporting our Annual Back to School Event, our Title I Open House, and our Family Literacy and Technology Night. These events were a great success. I encourage you to continue to be active participants in the decision-making process. Please get involved in the School Advisory Council (SAC), PTA, and the School Advisory Forum (SAF). In addition, volunteers are always welcomed and needed. There are many opportunities for you to become involved in our school. Please call the school to indicate your interest in volunteering and participating. Please join us on October 30th, 2018 for our Fall Family Night, SAC, SAF, and PTA meetings beginning at 5:30 p.m. The SAC agenda is attached.

- 1. **Read Regularly** Try to read with your child or have your child read to you every day. Children should read for at least 20 minutes each day to build stamina. You might aim for a bed time reading for a peaceful end of the day. Or curl up together with a book when you get home from work.
- 2. Ask Questions Pick a book and read a few sentences or pages to or with your child. Ask them about what is happening or what they think will happen next. Having your child think about the story or topic will deepen their understanding.
- 3. **Digital Reading Resources-** Morrow Elementary offers a variety of Home-School Connection Resources. Every student has access to MyOn digital books as well as iReady Learning in Reading and Math. These are great ways for students to bring the classroom home. Talk with your student about MyOn Lexile goals and increasing their scale score on iReady. Grade Level Happenings

Headstart and Pre-K

Tips to Develop children's early reading skills

1. Read several stories every day

The more children are exposed to literature, the more reading will become part of their daily life. A child is introduced to new information, concepts, and phonemic awareness with every story.

2. Surround your children with reading material

Children with a large collection of reading resources in their homes score higher and perform better on standardized tests. Provoke a reading habit in your child by having a large array of interesting books and magazines at her reading level.

3. Encourage a wide variety of reading activities

Make reading an essential part of your children's lives. Let them read menus, movie name, roadside signs, game guides, weather reports, and other practical everyday information. Always try to make sure your children have something to read in their spare time.

4. Let them choose what they read

Reading for pleasure is one of the best ways for a child to improve his performance at school but teaching a child to love reading involves a lot more than simply handing him a book. Letting children have choices in their reading material goes a long way in raising life-long readers. Kids who choose what they read, regardless of whether it's a novel, a comic book, or a magazine, are more engaged with what they are reading and more likely to retain the information.

5. Help them choose age-appropriate books

Help your kids choose age-appropriate books on topics that interest them to spark a passion for reading. Take them to the library or even show them e-readers that provide entire libraries of options at the touch of the screen. Access to a wide-variety of options helps make it easier for parents to help their children find the stories that give them that toehold into the world of reading.

The Kindergarten Team is looking forward to a successful year of learning for all our students! In our daily instruction, we are using research-based curriculum materials to best ensure student success. One of our tools is Fundations, a multi-sensory structured language program, which focuses on foundational skills. These skills are phonemic awareness, phonics, word study, comprehension strategies and more. As our students continue to gain foundational skills it is extremely important for the "at home" connection. We thank you for helping to ensure that homework is completed nightly. Also, reviewing the letters and their corresponding sounds strengthens students' foundational skills. Please also read for at least 20 minutes every night with your child. We look forward to speaking with in parent teacher conferences! Remember that you are your child's first teacher.

Grade Level Happenings



Hello Morrow Families,

First grade is currently learning how to identify the differences between fictional and nonfictional books through the integration of social studies and science. As we learn how to look for key details in a text, the students are learning how to use and incorporate different reading strategies to become better readers.

This year the students will continue to use iReady, and we will use the data to drive their instruction, as well as help develop rigor in the content presented to the students.

In math, the first-grade team is working to help students learn different strategies to add and subtract within 20, while also developing fluency with adding and subtracting numbers to 10.



Greetings Parents!

The second graders have been busy learning high frequency words, new vocabulary words and many skills to improve their reading and comprehension skills. They're learning how to ask and answer questions as who, what when, where, why and how to demonstrate understanding of key details in a text. In addition, they are learning how to identify the main idea and details in the text. These skills will help improve their comprehension skills, therefore promoting a higher level of thinking.

The students are working on fluently adding within 20 using mental strategies. They are also learning how to read and write numbers to 1,000 using base-ten numerals, number names and expanded form. Throughout the year, the students will be learning how to solve math word problems.

Please check your child's planner and take-home folder for homework, graded papers and important information. If there's a change in transportation for your child, please inform your child's teacher prior to dismissal. Thanks for your support.

Hello Morrow Family!

Third grade is off to a great start! Please continue to encourage your child to be the best they can be. This includes staying focused and participating in all classroom activities. It is expected that your children complete their homework and returns it by the due date. Encourage your children read every night for at least 30 minutes. Please continue to check your child's planner and sign it nightly.

Fourth Grade



It has been a very busy start to the 2018-2019 school year in 4th Grade. Our learners are adjusting to a new grade level with new academic expectations. We have been focusing on informational text in Reading, working on identifying main idea, supporting details, cause and effect relationships, summarizing and drawing conclusions. For math it is extremely important that students know and practice their basic multiplication facts since we are taking math to the next level and multiplying up to four-digit numbers by a one-digit number. Be sure to ask your child the different strategies they are learning that you may not be familiar with.

Extra practice in Reading and Math can be done at home using the online programs - iReady and Reflex Math. These sites are additional resources that can be accessed through the Student's Single Sign on (SSO) account. Use www.browardschools.com/sso to visit these and more. Please use your child's daily planner to keep up to date with homework assignments and communicate with your child's teacher. We look forward to working together to help all students achieve their best.

Fifth Grade

Dear Parents,

The new school year in 5th grade has had a great beginning. The students attended their first field trip of the year at JA BizTown. They had a firsthand experience of the business world and experienced how it feels to be a part of a working society which allowed them to work, shop and eat.

In the classroom, we are going deeper into the reading standards. The students are identifying more than one main idea in a text and are making inferences; why an author include certain information in a text.

In Math, we are dividing to the thousands with two-digit divisors. So, knowing their multiplication facts will help to make the student very successful in math.


