Notes from Guidance – Ms. Nguyen



Good Day Parents, Students, and Staff:

Our first round of Student Success Skills Counseling groups just ended. We will focus on academic and test taking strategies during our second round of groups. If you are interested, please contact Ms. Nguyen, School Counselor, for more information about enrolling your child in this group.

Congratulations to January's Student of the Month winners, they were nominated by their teachers for being respectful. In February, we will honor our students with the character trait of Honesty. Please emphasize how important it is to have this character trait and praise them if they were honored at school each month for displaying the trait.

Our schoolwide assembly, the "NED" show, was held on Friday, January 26th, 2018. The show focused on positive character traits and it was done through visual and active interaction with our students. The Broward Standards Assessments (BSA) testing began on January 23rd, a letter was sent home indicating the specific days of testing for your child (ren) in grades 3-5. Please ensure that they have a restful night, at least eight hours of sleep and a good healthy breakfast every morning. This will assist our students to be successful in school. In addition, please encourage your child (ren) to try their best on all assessments. The Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) in writing for students in grades four and five will be March 6, 2018.

Assessment data provides the evidence of student learning. Based on this information, decisions are made that will enhance student learning. Likewise, behavior management is addressed in a leveled or tiered approach where decisions are made about the best behavioral interventions to employ. A problem-solving method of decision-making is employed and results of efforts are documented. *Response to Intervention (RtI) process* is intended to result in better learning opportunities and higher achievement for all students. If you have questions regarding assessment results or RtI, please do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher.



Response to Intervention (RtI) is defined as "the change in behavior or performance as a function of an intervention (Gresham, 1991). RtI is implemented as a leveled or tiered approach to instructional delivery that includes interventions of increasingly higher intensity, based on a student's need: that is, a **Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS)**.



Dear Parents,

You are your child's first teacher and reading with your child is a proven way to promote early literacy. Helping to make sure your child is reading on grade level by third grade is one of the most important things you can do to prepare him/her for the future. By reading with your child for 20 minutes per day and making a few simple strategies a part of your daily routine, you can make a positive impact on your child's success in school. We all know that standardized tests can be tough. But we can help our students choose to do well by helping them to be prepared. Here are six ways to help your child move towards proficiency.

- 1. Read daily. Students need to build stamina for reading for extended periods. This can be done by having your child read for 20-30 minutes each day. Students have free access to myOn Reading. Log on through your child's SSO account.
- 2. Play a game in which you say a word and your child has to break apart all the sounds. Ask your child to stretch out a word like dog and he/she can pretend to stretch a word with a rubber band. Your child should say /d/ /ŏ/ /g/.
- 3. Play Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes with sounds. Say a word and have your child touch his/her head for the first sound, shoulders for the second sound, and knees for the third while saying each sound.
- 4. Labeling words When reading with your child, keep Post-it notes handy. Every so often, have your child choose one object in the picture and write the word on a Post-it. Put the note in the book to read each time you come to that page.
- 5. Make your own books of favorite songs for child to practice "reading". This builds confidence and helps your child identify him/herself as a reader.
- 6. Before reading Point out the title and author. Look at the picture on the cover and ask, "What do you think is going to happen in this story? Why?" This will help your child set purpose for reading.

In reading we have been working on improving our reading fluency and comprehension skills by practicing our sight words, using our phonics knowledge to decode new words, and identifying the main idea and supporting details. In science we have been learning about our planet earth and space, while in social studies we have been learning about people and events that help to shape our history. Math has us grouping objects in "tens" and "ones" and representing numbers up to 120 in different ways. Please encourage your children to read for at least 15 minutes each evening. Thank you.

Greetings Parents! We are now half way through our school year! We are very excited for all that the children have learned and their progress to date. Remember that our upcoming field trip is on February 20th to Flamingo Gardens. This is a great time for the kids to learn more about the plants and animals that are native to Florida.

Recommendations for Parents:

Reading aloud is an effective way of developing vocabulary. The more opportunities for ELLs to have encounters with words, the more words they can add to their vocabulary. Literature books, trade books, poems, rhymes, etc. are filled with wonderful examples of language, words, and content. Reading aloud has been traditionally implemented as a strategy for only young students, yet it can play an effective role in the classroom at any age. Picture books are excellent resources for students of all ages to build vocabulary.

Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day Program Guidelines Background and Eligibility



Broward County Public Schools (BCPS) observes Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day on **Friday**, **February 2, 2018**. This year's theme is "Positive Agents of Change," encouraging students to take advantage of positive opportunities that come their way.

Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day is a nationwide learning program that allows students to explore career industries, form ideas about their futures and learn what it takes to be successful in a business environment.

Local companies and organizations are encouraged to participate, and help students see how what they are learning in their classrooms applies to the workplace. In addition, all BCPS schools, centers and departments and administrative offices will provide employees the opportunity to bring their daughters and sons to work.

BCPS joins other local school districts (Miami-Dade and Palm Beach counties) in observing Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day on Friday, February 2, instead of the national observance date in April, due to date conflicts with the state-mandated Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) testing periods. BCPS students who participate in Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day must complete the Student Log and Activity Form. Activity packets are available at schools and on the District website, browardschools.com.

Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day is a District approved field trip and will not be considered an absence. Students should follow the guidelines in the current Code of Student Conduct booklet concerning pre-approved absences for educational reasons. Students going to a workplace with a parent, adult relative, or adult family friend are on a field trip and are excused as described in the Code of Student Conduct.

Students who have prearranged an excused absence for February 2, 2018, have the responsibility to turn in all assignments on the day after the missed day, unless other arrangements have been made with the child's teacher(s), as delineated in the Code of Student Conduct booklet. Following participation in the Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day, students will be encouraged to share their experiences during classes (must be approved by teacher).

Morrow Families are encouraged to participate in the student-led conference and then take their children to the workplace to allow our students the opportunity to learn and explore different careers.
