- 3. Respond to the quotations, focus on the ways in which the author uses language to create an effect. Focus can be tone and theme.
- 4. What is it about the language that stands out and makes the passage distinctive?
- 5. How does the passage reflect the author's style and reveal larger themes of the work?
- 6. I expect responses to be developed thoughtfully and intellectually. Responses should be approximately 60 words in length.

- Clear and Vivid: You'll know many of the people in these conversations they are luminaries in our culture. Some you may not know. But what links them all is their powerful ability to relate and communicate. With his unique blend of humor and insight, Alda explores the ways we can connect better with one another in every area of our lives. Something we need now more than ever.

- Radiolab: Radiolab is a show about curiosity. Where sound illuminates ideas, and the boundaries blur between science, philosophy, and human experience.
- StarTalk Radio: Radio program devoted to all things space and is hosted by renowned astrophysicist Neil deGrasse Tyson
