Please let me be among the first to congratulate our learners on their hard work and the grit that they showed during the 2016-2017 school year which resulted in our school moving up and achieving letter grade of a C, as awarded by the Florida Department of Education. I am proud to share that the collective efforts of our students and dedicated staff members paid off in a BIG way as we increased 60 points overall from the results achieved in 2016.

A letter grade of a B is well within our reach and that is our goal for the 2017-2018 school year. In order to do this, we will have a deliberate focus on the progress of each individual to ensure that we are meeting the needs of all of our learners.

It's that time of year again! As our leaners are settling into school, our teachers are providing small group instruction and reading centers that will provide targeted instruction at the pace our learners need to master various literacy skills.

As we look ahead to another school year of assisting students to narrow their reading achievement gap, we are profoundly aware of the significance of children reading with their parent or guardian at home. Reading at home with your child is instrumental to their academic development. Research has shown that one-on-one reading time and access to books are key predictors of future literacy skills and future educational outcomes.

Here are some easy ways that parents or guardians can support their children in becoming stronger and proficient readers:

k Read at home.

Reading regularly at home provides children with the practice they need to become great readers.

- Make a special reading spot.
 Designating a special reading spot at home for children to read with you is not only exciting, but this is also a great way of creating a spot where children can concentrate.
- Become a great reading partner for your child! As children it is no fun to read when you are mandated to read. Building trust and supporting your children reading habits is crucial. Show your children that reading is entertaining by reading with them.
- Surround your child with books. When children have access to books at home, they become acquainted with books and the act of reading daily, successfully giving them a head start in learning.
- Bring books everywhere.
 Incorporating books into everyday activities will continue to assist children in becoming better readers.
 Place books everywhere in your home and even in the car.
- Communicate with your child's teacher and get involved at Westwood Heights Elementary. Communicating with the teacher also informs parents and guardians in what areas of reading they are succeeding in and what areas they may need additional help with. You can also volunteer in the classroom or attend a class fieldtrip.

Science Corner

Welcome back to school for what promises to be another exciting year at Westwood Heights! I would like to start by congratulating last year's 5th grade learners on improving our school Science score by 3%! We look forward this year to improving that score by more than 3% this year! Additionally, we have been crowned as the 2017 Annual Science Brain Brawl Showdown CHAMPIONS! We look forward to defending our title in May of 2018! As the year begins the following are some of the standards that are the focus for our learners:

Kindergarten Learning Target

· Identify and describe the five senses

1st Grade Learning target

 \cdot Make observations of living and nonliving things, including identification of the major parts of plants and the interaction between plants and animals and their environment.

2nd Grade Learning Target

•Compare and describe changing patterns in nature that repeat themselves, investigate and observe the Sun's energy, water evaporation, and the air and the relationship between weather and the properties of water in all its states.

3rd Grade Learning Target

- Identify and describe the role of the sun in weather system.

4th Grade Learning Target

Identify and describe the physical properties of common earth-forming minerals and rocks and how these minerals change over time through weathering and erosion to shape Earth's structure.

5th Grade Learning Target

Distinguish among the following objects of the Solar System -- Sun, planets, moons, asteroids, comets -- and identify Earth's position in it.

Math Corner Grades 3-5

Intermediate Math Article The beginning of the school year brings with it new content to be taught in our intermediate math classes! This year grades 3-5 will focus on 1 standard a week to ensure an extensive amount of time is given to each standard and opportunities for success grow.

Below is a list of some of the standards your child is learning in their respective grade levels:

3rd Grade Standards

Fluently add and subtract within 1000 using strategies and algorithms based on place value, properties of operations, and/or the relationship between addition and subtraction. MAFS.3.OA.1.1 - Interpret products of whole numbers, e.g., interpret 5×7 as the total number of objects in 5 groups of 7 objects each. For example, describe a context in which a total number of objects can be expressed as 5×7 .

Apply properties of operations as strategies to multiply and divide. Examples: If $6 \times 4 = 24$ is known, then $4 \times 6 = 24$ is also known. (Commutative property of multiplication.) $3 \times 5 \times 2$ can be found by $3 \times 5 = 15$, then $15 \times 2 = 30$, or by $5 \times 2 = 10$, then $3 \times 10 = 30$. (Associative property of multiplication.) Knowing that $8 \times 5 = 40$ and $8 \times 2 = 16$, one can find 8×7 as $8 \times (5 + 2) = (8 \times 5) + (8 \times 2) = 40 + 16 = 56$. (Distributive property.)

4th Grade Standards

Write simple expressions that record calculations with numbers, and interpret numerical expressions without evaluating them. For example, express the calculation "add 8 and 7, then multiply by 2" as $2 \times (8 + 7)$. Recognize that $3 \times (18932 + 921)$ is three times as large as 18932 + 921, without having to calculate the indicated sum or product.

Compare two fractions with different numerators and different denominators, e.g., by creating common denominators or numerators, or by comparing to a benchmark fraction such as 1/2. Recognize that comparisons are valid only when the two fractions refer to the same whole. Record the results of comparisons with symbols >, =, or , =, and < symbols to record the results of comparisons.

5th Grade Standards

Explain patterns in the number of zeros of the product when multiplying a number by powers of 10, and explain patterns in the placement of the decimal point when a decimal is multiplied or divided by a power of 10. Use whole-number exponents to denote powers of 10.

Compare two decimals to thousandths based on meanings of the digits in each place, using >, =, and < symbols to record the results of comparisons.

Fluently multiply multi-digit whole numbers using the standard algorithm.

Math Corner Grades K-2

K-2 Mathematics The first week of school was targeted on assessing students to identify attainment of the foundational skills or the lack there off for each grade level. The following information gives a brief outline of the standards and the skills being targeted for student achievement, Kindergarten through Second Grade.

Kindergarten Read and write numerals from 0 to 20.

When counting objects, say the number names in the standard order, pairing each object with one and only one number name and each number name with one and only one object.

First Grade

Use addition and subtraction within 20 to solve word problems involving situations of adding to, taking from, putting together, taking apart, and comparing, with unknowns in all positions, e.g., by using objects, drawings, and equations with a symbol for the unknown number to represent the problem. •

Apply properties of operations as strategies to add and subtract.3 Examples: If 8 + 3 = 11 is known, then 3 + 8 = 11 is also known. (Commutative property of addition.) To add 2 + 6 + 4, the second two numbers can be added to make a ten, so 2 + 6 + 4 = 2 + 10 = 12. (Associative property of addition.) •

Second Grade

Determine whether a group of objects (up to 20) has an odd or even number of members, e.g., by pairing objects or counting them by 2s; write an equation to express an even number as a sum of two equal addends.

Use addition and subtraction within 100 to solve one- and two-step word problems involving situations of adding to, taking from, putting together, taking apart, and comparing, with unknowns in all positions, e.g., by using drawings and equations with a symbol for the unknown number to represent the problem.

Fluently add and subtract within 20 using mental strategies.
