Legislative Report: Session Overview

2022 SESSION OVERVIEW

After completing today's business, the Florida Legislature adjourned Sine Die 1:03pm concluding the 2022 Legislative Session.

The Session included:

- 3,735 Bills filed
- 1,896 Amendments filed
- 4,324 Votes taken
- 285 Bills passed both chambers.

Please find an overview of the budget below followed by key education legislation that has passed.

The budget also includes \$500K for BCPS Mentoring Tomorrow's Leaders program (subject to the Governor's approval). Two hundred million dollars has also been allocated for the "School Recognition Program"; however, twelve school districts, including BCPS, may not qualify for these funds (further analyses will be provided).

LEGISLATION

HB 7 – <u>Individual Freedom</u>: Provides that subjecting individuals to specified concepts under certain circumstances constitutes discrimination based on race, color, sex, or national origin; revising requirements for instruction on the history of African Americans; requiring the department to prepare and offer certain standards and curriculum; authorizing the department to seek input from a specified organization for certain purposes; prohibits instructional materials reviewers from recommending instructional materials that contain any matter that contradicts certain principles; requires DOE to review school district professional development systems for compliance with certain provisions of law. Effective Date: July 1, 2022

HB 235 – <u>Restraint of Students with Disabilities in Public Schools</u>: Prohibits school personnel from using mechanical restraint on students with disabilities. Effective Date: July 1, 2022

HB 395 – <u>"Victims of Communism Day"</u>: Requires Governor to proclaim November 7 of each year as "Victims of Communism Day"; requires a day to be observed in public schools & by public exercise; requires day other than November 7 to be observed by public schools under specified circumstance; requires high school students to receive specified instruction; requires SBE to adopt specified revised social studies standards. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 461 – <u>Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program Student Service Requirements</u>: Authorizes student's service requirements for award under Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program to be paid rather than volunteer; authorizes, rather than requiring, student to identify specified interest or develop plan for his or her service requirements. Effective Date: upon becoming a law

HB 777 – Local Tax Referenda Requirements: Requires referenda elections related to tourist development taxes, tourist impact taxes, children's services & independent special district property taxes, increases in county & municipal ad valorem tax millages, ninth-cent fuel tax, local option fuel taxes, & certain school district millage elections to be held on day of general elections. Effective Date: October 1, 2022

HB 1421 – <u>School Safety</u>: This bill modifies both state-level oversight of school safety requirements and school district-level emergency response procedures. The bill increases school safety oversight and accountability in the event of non- compliance of school safety requirements by a school district. Effective Date: July 1, 2022

HB 1467 – <u>Education:</u> This bill would establish term limits for school board members; deleting a requirement that district school boards maintain a specified list on their websites; requiring certain meetings relating to instructional materials to be noticed and open to the public; revising requirements for the department relating to the development of training programs for the selection of materials used in schools and library media centers; revising district school board requirements for the selection and adoption of certain materials. Effective Date: 7/1/2022

HB 1557 – <u>Parental Rights in Education:</u> This bill is a continuation of last year's bill. The bill requires districts to provide more information to parents regarding their student's educational experience. The bill would also limit discussions regarding LGBTQ+ issues in PreK-3 classrooms. If districts violate the provisions of this bill, parents may sue school districts for damages and legal fees. Effective Date: 7/1/2022

SB 758 – <u>Charter Schools:</u> The bill would establish a Charter School Review Commission within the Department of Education. The Commission would be authorized to sponsor charter schools. Effective Date: 7/1/2022

SB 1048 – <u>Student Assessments</u>: The bill would transition from the FSA to a student progress monitoring system. Elements of the accountability system, such as school grades, student retention, promotion, and teacher evaluations, would remain in place; however, the bill would establish a baseline in the first year for future improvement ratings. Effective Date: Except as otherwise expressly provided in this act, and except for this section which shall take effect upon this act becoming a law, this act shall take effect July 1, 2022
