Objectives:

The focus in this course is reading various genres of texts and writing short responses, as well as essays that are germane to the topics in individual selections, as well as each overall collection. Specifically, we will be actively reading varied texts for what they say explicitly, as well as the logical inferences that can be drawn.

Additionally, we will analyze literature and informational texts from varied literary periods to examine:

- text craft and structure
- elements of literature
- arguments and claims supported by textual evidence
- power and impact of language
- influence of history, culture, and setting on language
- knowledge of eighteenth-, nineteenth-, and early twentieth-century works of American literature, as well as study of Shakespeare
- personal critical and aesthetic response

Students will be writing for varied purposes, such as:

- developing and supporting argumentative claims
- crafting coherent, supported informative/expository texts
- responding to literature for personal and analytical purposes
- writing narratives to develop real or imagined events
- writing to sources using text-based evidence and reasoning

Students will also be engaging in effective listening, speaking, and viewing strategies with emphasis on the use of evidence to support or refute a claim in multimedia presentations, class discussions, and extended text discussions.

Assignments will coincide with the following thematic units:

- Collection 2: Gender Roles
- Collection 4: Seeking Justice, Seeking Peace
- Collection 3: Voices of Protest
- Collection 6: Finding Ourselves in Nature

Students will be using the following electronic resources this school year in order to complete assignments, both in class and at home:

class time to work on the assignments, but some vocabulary will need to be completed at home. The amount of time given to complete a vocabulary assignment will correlate to thing amount of words on the list.

 - Students will utilize this resource to receive customized SAT practice
- Canvas
 - Students will use Canvas to take online quizzes, complete discussion questions, complete assignments, view notes and files pertaining to the class, and group collaboration.

Students will explore a diverse section of literature and informational texts, such as:

- "The Wife of Bath's Tale" from The Canterbury Tales
- "The Pardoner's Tale" from The Canterbury Tales
- "Speech on the Vietnam War"
- "A Modest Proposal"
- "Civil Disobedience"
- "The Crisis"
- "Living Like Weasels"

Additional texts from the *Collections* textbook in each of the above-mentioned collections will be utilized.

Quizzes:

Quizzes will be scheduled to monitor student progress throughout the semester. All scheduled quizzes will be announced one week in advance. There may also be unannounced quizzes given throughout the semester.

Tests:

Assessments will be administered at the end of each selection and/or major unit of study. Students will be notified a minimum of one week in advance.

Classwork/Homework and Late Work Policy:

Classwork and Homework is due on the date assigned by the teacher, at the beginning of class. Work that is not handed in at the beginning of class will be considered late. If you are found to be working on an assignment during class that was due at the beginning of that class period, it will not be accepted for any credit. Late work is not accepted for full credit. Late work will be accepted with deduction, per SBBC policy. Papers turned in without a name will be disposed of, so make sure all work is

labeled clearly with your name.

Classwork and homework must be completed in blue or black ink, or pencil.

Students who are absent are expected to inquire about and complete any missed classwork and assignments. It is not the teacher's responsibility to seek the student for missed work.
