With all of the social media, violent video games, and television shows teaching violence, our little ones are exposed to absorbing words, phrases, thoughts and ideas into their minds. Sometimes those thoughts and ideas carry over to their school environment and are verbally passed on to other students through conversation, play, or aggression. Florida Laws are extremely strict with a zero tolerance for communicating any threat of violence (to one's self or others) or disruption of any school environment/function. Please know that even playing around with friends and saying these things are not acceptable in any way and are taken very seriously. A reason such as "I was just joking around" as well as any other excuses when communicating threats or violence are non-acceptable. School administrators and police have a mandatory obligation to immediately investigate, report, and act on these types of incidents. We encourage you to talk to your children to make them aware of the seriousness of such comments as well as the serious consequences following. We also encourage you to tell your children it is ok to report or tell an adult of any thoughts, words, comments, etc. that they may have heard throughout their day. How You Can Help Your Child Prepare for Assessments

Assessments are some of the ways schools and teachers monitor student learning. It's important that your child do their best. These tests can provide you and your child's teacher with insight into their progress, helping you identify areas for improvement.

Successful test-takers tend to be students with good attendance, homework, good reading habits, and study skills. This is why your daily assistance with homework and attitude toward school have the biggest impact on your child's performance. However, there are key ways you can develop these abilities.

Brain power.

Students who struggle the most tend be those who do not get enough sleep or a good breakfast. When they are physically or mentally unprepared they often struggle.

Encourage good study habits and challenge critical-thinking skills.

Monitoring overall academic progress and staying in good communication with the teacher will keep you informed on how you can better assist your child. Good reading skills factor heavily in a timed assessment, so encourage reading (magazines, newspapers, or even comic books if they shy away from books) as much as possible. Testing also measures critical thinking ability, so ask your child to discuss ideas or voice their opinion with evidence and reasoning to encourage higher order thinking.

Look at your child's past performance and provide opportunities for practice.

If your child struggles in a particular area, you may want to provide them with exercises that reinforce that skill or area. Study sessions while setting small goals, such as learning five new words or math facts each session, will help measure progress and boost confidence.

Be positive.

The most important thing you can do is to let your child know you believe in them. Celebrate successes and encourage them to meet their academic goals.
