Below are assignments that MUST be completed based on the book you have read.

1. Complete TWO character analysis organizers:

- a. one for the protagonist (main character)
- **b.** one for the antagonist (character opposing the main character).
 - i. Use the attached model based on *The Grinch* to see how to fill out these organizers. NOTE: Pay close attention to the topic headings in the boxes as they are not all the same. Use questions #1-3 listed at the top of the graphic organizer to assist with filling in the boxes.

2. Write a brief Summary (at least 3 paragraphs):

- **a.** Overview of the book
- **b.** Include a beginning, middle, and end
- c. Include characters, settings, conflicts, and themes

You may choose 1 of the 2 assignments listed below to complete along with the above.

Option 1: Create either a movie poster or new book cover for your novel. Make sure whatever design elements you choose are representative of your book. Your artwork, photography, or design MUST be original (no cut and paste, tracing, or etc...). Don't worry – you are being assessed on your CREATIVITY and EFFORT, not your artistic skill.

Option 2: Present a book talk (under two minutes) in which you tell your audience why they should read your book. Not sure what a book talk is? Below is a quote from Nancy Keene (who is the queen of book talks), she says: "The purpose of a book talk is to "sell" the book. You want to give enough of the plot to interest the listeners but you are not giving a summary of the book. You certainly never want to give away the ending. You want to highlight the interesting points... The main purpose of a book talk is to grab the audience's interest and make them want to read the book."

Family	v background/Upbringing	How s/	he is treated vs. how s/he wants to be treated
	We aren't told much about The Grinch's family; he seems not to have any family left. He is alone except for his little sidekick. We can infer he didn't receive much love growing up because he seems very bitter and unhappy. At least in the beginning in the story, The Grinch is bitter and unhappy. The Grinch's bitterness infects his behavior: he seems not to be able to care about anyone else, so he plots to steal from the townspeople, to ruin their Christmas (possibly because he believes his Christmas will be lonely and unhappy, and he is lashing out).	1.	<u>The Grinch is alone</u> except for his little sidekick, who simply obeys him (not having any other choice). It's not clear at the beginning of the story how he wants to be treated since <u>he's not used to dealing with</u> <u>people</u> , but later, <u>the townspeople welcome</u> <u>him and treat him with the love he was</u> <u>missing</u> .

1. 2. 3.	There is no mention of The Grinch's work. If he does anything, we can infer that it is not too meaningful or helpful to others because he does not seem to care about other people—at least, at the beginning of the story. Not having work he loves may be a factor in why The Grinch seems so unhappy at the beginning. Not having work he loves seems to poison The <u>Grinch's character</u> . Also, he does not know how to deal with other people constructively. He lacks people skills.		At the beginning of the story, <u>The Grinch</u> values material goods more than relationships with other people. The Grinch plans to steal the Christmas presents of the townspeople. At least initially, The Grinch is selfish and greedy. Later, he learns a lesson and changes.
