

Students will be given the **READING INVENTORY** growth measure assessment in their reading classes on the week of **January 17**.

The Reading Inventory is a **low-stress**, **high-accuracy reading comprehension assessment**.

- To prevent frustration and build on success, the complexity of questions grows as students demonstrate mastery.
- The framework is a scientifically proven tool for simultaneously measuring reading ability and text difficulty.
- Students are tested on text they will encounter both in and out of the classroom to ensure readiness for both college and career.



CURRICULUM & ASSESSMEN

What assessments do our ESE students take to determine their academic strengths and weaknesses? We use multiple assessments throughout each school year as data to support our students' overall growth, and gaps they need to overcome. The assessments include I-Ready which is taken 3-4 times within a school year to determine growth. System-44 assessments for students that take an intensive reading course, the Diagnostic Assessment of Reading (DAR) which breaks down each reading component to determine root area to work on together, and this year we are taking the BAS for Reading and Math. This allows each teacher to each students' determine growth.

Our unique school code is McNicolhixon22. Let's show up and show out Hawks! This will be a fun event for a great cause!







WHITE FRAGILITY

What does it mean and how can you overcome it?

White fragility refers to feelings of discomfort a white person experiences when they witness discussions around racial inequality and injustice. For example, people of color may find it difficult to speak to white people about white privilege and superiority. The white person may become defensive, and the person of color may feel obligated to comfort the white person because we live in a white-dominated environment.

White fragility differs from both white privilege and white supremacy. White privilege refers to the fact that white people have advantages in society that others do not. White supremacy is the belief that people with white skin are superior.

Racial stressors may cause a range of defensive behaviors and emotions. White people may act in certain ways when people of color discuss racism. Their reactions may include:

- anger
- fear
- guilt
- arguing
- silence
- leaving the stress-inducing situation

By behaving in this way, white people may prevent people of color from attempting to talk about racism with them.

Hands, Body, Objects (HBO)

A punch in the arm, a push in the hallway, throwing a pencil at a classmate: we see this behavior at school sometimes. It's quite common to see horse play between good friends. However, these kinds of behaviors can be threatening to students' safety, even if nobody gets hurt in the end. At McNicol, we use the term HBO to mean that students should keep their HANDS, BODY, and



OBJECTS to themselves. Being socially conscious about boundaries is a life skill, and students need to respect each other's boundaries. What begins as horseplay can escalate into something more serious such as a fight or an injury. With about 700 students in our school, everyone needs to do their part to ensure that we do not have any incidents that can cause unwanted trouble or safety concerns. It all comes down to our Four Bs: Be Safe, Be Responsible, Be Respectful, and Be a Learner.

PBIS Incentives

We have schoolwide PBIS (Positive Behavior Intervention and Support) incentives on a monthly basis to motivate our students to make good choices. In February, we will be having popcorn on the lawn and doing fun activities outside.

RESPECT

Dear Parent:

Respect is a critical element in all healthy relationships. When children respect others, they treat people with consideration and courtesy and do not violate them physically or verbally. Respect for others should be woven into the fabric of each student's life and characterize all of their relationships. It is a fundamental character quality that prepares children to live productive lives as they relate to and work with others.

Respect for others is based on self-respect and self-respect in children comes from being treated with respect by their parents and other adult role models. Teaching children self-respect does not mean complimenting everything they do. They also need honest criticism. When we do criticize, we should focus on things they have done, not on them personally.

What You Can Do:

- Encourage your child to build a positive identity that focuses on his/her integrity and talents.
- Emphasize that character is built upon the decisions and actions a person takes.
- Help your child reach his/her full potential by encouraging him/her to develop their talents, set reachable goals and honor themselves as a unique person.
- Teach your child how to choose good values.

Six Ways to Teach Respect:

<u>Do as I do</u> - Children learn from the example show them. <u>Do as I say</u> – Do as I say will be better received after "do as I do" has been taken care of.

<u>Show them respect</u> – Respect is not only about showing people who are older than you regard. It's about establishing in everyone's mind the dignity of the human person. <u>Teach them at an early age</u> – It's never too late to teach and model respectful behavior but always start as soon as possible.

<u>Negative and Positive Responses</u> – Learn to show disapproval when they talk or act disrespectfully to others. When they act respectfully ALWAYS show your appreciation or approval of their actions.

<u>Monitor their environment</u> – When people come to your house, let them know that bad manners are strongly discouraged. The goal of your home is to make everyone feel respected.
