



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


2023-2024 EDUCATIONAL EQUITY ACT PLAN The School Board of Broward County, Florida

The responsibilities of the Florida Department of Education, Office of Equal Educational Opportunity (OEEO) include compliance oversight of the Florida Educational Equity Act, Section 1000.05, Florida Statutes, and other federal and state legislation relating to equity in education.

The Florida Educational Equity Act (FEEA), and other federal and state legislation such as Title IX, Title VI, Title II (ADAAA), Section 504, prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age or marital status against students and employees. The FEEA and the State Board of Education Rules 6A-19.001 – 19.010 require OEEO to monitor public school districts' compliance with the statute. The Annual Educational Equity Update is a reporting tool that enables the OEEO to monitor and ensure adherence to provisions of the laws, and that educational resources are equitably distributed.

For 2023-2024, Districts will continue to focus on increasing minority enrollment in Advanced Placement (AP), including International Baccalaureate (IB), and Advanced International Certification of Education (AICE), Dual Enrollment (DE), Honors and other Level 3 courses. The districts should evaluate progress over the last five-year period, from 2018-19 to 2023-24. In addition, beginning with 2017-2018, Districts are required to report enrollment data for students identified as English Language Learners (ELL). The plan is divided into seven (7) parts and includes the following:





Evaluation of Methods and Strategies

For the 2023-2024 Annual Update, districts will evaluate the effectiveness of their methods and strategies according to data-driven evidence of success based on the 2018-19 benchmark data and accountability measures through 2023-24 in the following program areas:

- I. Increasing the percentage of Black, Hispanic, Black male, and Hispanic male students enrolled in Advanced Academic programs, Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) courses (Grades 9-12).
- II. Increasing the percentage of Black, Hispanic, Black male, and Hispanic male students enrolled in Dual Enrollment (DE) courses (Grades 9-12).
- III. Increasing the overall percentage of Black, Hispanic, Black male, and Hispanic male students enrolled in Advanced Academic programs AP, IB, AICE, and DE, along with honors, and other Level 3 courses.

EVALUATION OF METHODS AND STRATEGIES

The following percentages reflect within race/ethnicity calculations for students enrolled in AP/IB/AICE courses. In 2018-19, 37% of Whites, 17% of Blacks, and 31% of Hispanics, 32% of White Male, 13% of Black Male, and 26% of Hispanic Male were enrolled. In 2023-24, 43% of Whites (an increase of 6 percentage points), 23% of Blacks (an increase of 6% percentage points), 36% of Hispanics (an increase of 5 percentage points), 38% of White Males (an increase of 6 percentage points), 19% of Black Males (an increase of 6 percentage points), and 31% of Hispanic Males (an increase of 5 percentage points) were enrolled.

The evaluation reveals progress in increasing enrollment in AP/IB/AICE courses for Black and Hispanic students in grade 9-12th. Black students increased by 6 percentage points, from 17% in 2018-19 to 23% in 2023-24; Hispanic students also increased by 5 percentage points, from 31% to 36% for the same time period.

Methods and Strategies for Continued Elimination of Enrollment Gaps:

- The high school Advanced Academic team consisting of the principal, assistant principal, guidance staff and department heads will monitor the participation and performance of Black, Hispanic, Black male and Hispanic male students, and English Language Learners (ELLs LY, LP, and LF) enrolled in Advanced Academic programs, Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) courses in grades 9-12 as well as Dual Enrollment (DE)
- The high school Advanced Academic team will identify achievements gaps in incoming 9th grade students. In conjunction with the middle schools, they will develop strategies to narrow and eliminate these gaps at the middle school level.
- Use of student grades, standardized test scores and teacher recommendations along with tools like College Board's AP Potential for identification of students that are ready for Advanced Academic courses and subsequent enrollment in AP, AICE, IB, and DE courses which also includes the identification of English Language Learners regardless of English language proficiency level.
- Develop a District monitoring tool and reporting procedures for enrollment in Advanced Academic programs in low-income schools. Ensure schools have properly placed all students in appropriate Advanced Academic courses.
- 5. Encourage and support school-based initiatives to increase parent awareness of AP, IB AICE, and DE courses in the district's top languages (English, Spanish, Haitian Creole, Portuguese).
- Develop a distance learning program that will allow schools with low student participation to offer AP/IB/AICE courses via a remote learning program. This will enable schools to offer AP/IB/AICE courses not available at their location.
- 7. Advanced Academic teachers will participate in the Advanced Academic PLC program which focuses on improving teacher content-area knowledge and advanced pedagogical practices.
- 8. Identify eligible ELLs (LY, LP, and LF) at the time of registration based on previous transcripts regardless of English language proficiency.
- 9. Increase awareness of the Advanced Academic Leadership Team's use of ELL accommodations, scaffolds, and language acquisition strategies through training.

Accountability Measures:

- Develop procedures to create and monitor individual school enrollment in Advanced Academic courses at the beginning of the school year. Ensure all potential students are enrolled in the appropriate Advanced Academic course.
- 2. Continually monitor enrollment in Advanced Academic programs to measure corrections in AP, AICE, IB, and DE course enrollment through the use of school enrollment reports.
- 3. Develop a District assessment tool to assist schools in evaluating their Advanced Academic program.

EVALUATION OF METHODS AND STRATEGIES

The following percentages reflect within race/ethnicity calculations for students enrolled in Dual Enrollment Courses. In 2018-19, 14% of Whites, 11% of Blacks, and 11% of Hispanics, 11% of White Males, 7% Black Males, and 9% of Hispanic Males were enrolled. In 2023-24, 17% of Whites (an increase of 3 percentage points), 11% of Blacks (remain the same), 11% of Hispanics (remain the same), 14% of White Males (an increase of 3 percentage points), 8% of Black Males (an increase of 1 percentage points), and 10% of Hispanic Males (an increase of 1 percentage points) were enrolled.

The evaluation reveals progress in increasing enrollment in Dual Enrollment courses for Black and Hispanic students in grades 9-12th. Black students remain the same, from 11% in 2018-19 to 11% in 2023-24; Hispanic student also remain the same from 11% to 11% for the same time period.

- The high school dual enrollment team consisting of the principal, assistant principal, guidance staff and department heads will monitor the participation and performance of Black, Hispanic, Black male and Hispanic male students, in addition to English Language Learners (ELLs LY, LP, and LF), enrolled in dual enrollment courses.
- Encourage and support school-based initiatives to increase parent awareness of dual enrollment courses in the district's top languages (English, Spanish, Haitian Creole, Portuguese).
- Increase dual enrollment course offerings with post-secondary institution partners by identifying specific college and career pathways
- 4. Develop a distance learning program that will allow schools with low student participation to offer dual enrollment courses via a remote learning program. This will enable schools to offer dual enrollment courses not available at their location.
- Identify eligible ELLs (LY, LP, and LF) at the time of registration based on previous transcripts regardless
 of English language proficiency. Encourage student preparation for required assessment, if necessary
 (i.e., ACCU-PLACER, PERT, SAT, and ACT)

Accountability Measures:

- Develop procedures to create and monitor student progress in dual enrollment courses by high school
 at the beginning of the school year. Ensure that all eligible dual enrollment students have access to a
 dual enrollment course.

EVALUATION OF METHODS AND STRATEGIES

The following percentages reflect within race/ethnicity calculations for students enrolled in all Level 3 Courses. In 2018-19, 77% of Whites, 55% of Blacks, and 68% of Hispanics, 72% of White Males, 47% of Black Males, and 64% of Hispanic Males were enrolled. In 2023-24, 82% of Whites (an increase of 5 percentage points), 70% of Black (an increase of 15 percentage points), 77% of Hispanics (an increase of 9 percentage points), 80% of White Males (an increase of 8 percentage points), 65% of Black Males (an increase of 18 percentage points), and 74% of Hispanic Males (an increase of 10 percentage points) were enrolled.

The evaluation reveals progress in increasing enrollment in Level 3 courses for Black and Hispanic students in grades 9-12. Black students increased by 15 percentage points, from 55% in 2018-19 to 70% in 2023-24; Hispanic students also increased by 9 percentage points from 68% to 77% for the same time period.



The District also presents and attends many minority recruiting job fairs seeking applicants for instructional and non-instructional positions.

Talent Acquisition & Operations (Non-Instructional)

The School Board of Broward County, Florida (SBBC) is committed to the provision of equal access to all students, employment and business programs, activities, services, and operations that are operated or provided directly by the Board, as well as those operated or provided by another entity on behalf of the Board under contractual or other arrangements.

 In communicating how the ethnic and gender representation in administrative positions reflects the District's population/workforce, Broward County Public Schools (BCPS), employs a diverse population/workforce. - 2. In the District's ongoing efforts to ensure actions are in place to address ethnic or gender representation, the School Board of Broward County, Florida has policies reinforcing efforts to meet the growing needs associated with a diverse student and employee population. The Talent Acquisition & Operations (Non-Instructional) team fosters a recruitment and employment model designed to ensure exceptional efforts are carried out to identify a diverse applicant pool and subsequent selection of the best qualified candidates. Specifically, interview panels are made up of a minimum of three (3) panelists representing a diverse background. As necessary, interview panels will consist of external stakeholder groups. For the 2023-24 School Year, the Talent Acquisition & Operations (Non-Instructional) launched an initiative geared towards gathering additional baseline data to phase in any sort of behavior modification programs for the 2024-25 School Year.
- 3. In attracting and retaining minority employees, we utilize sourcing platforms to assist in recruitment efforts. The District has job descriptions that identify job preferences that align with industry standards and includes bi-lingual as a preferred qualification. In some instances, job descriptions are written to specific mandatory requirements of bilingual skills to ensure we are attracting and providing a superior level of service to all stakeholders. When applicable, the District works with recruitment firms to assist with hard to fill positions. The Non-Instructional Team works closely with hiring managers to best understand their hiring needs and incorporates those needs in the Full Cycle Recruitment process (e.g., talent search, talent selection, and shortlisting the applicant pool for consideration of interviews). Again, ongoing collaboration with schools and departments ensures interview panels consist of members of diverse background. In addition, the team implemented a Diversity Plan "I am Open", which enhances the teams' collective efforts of being open to: (1.) New Ideas and Perspectives; (2.) Being More Flexible; and (3.) Willingness to Learn New Skills. In addition, the 4 C's in Success: 1. Communication 2. Collaboration 3. Cultural Diversity 4. Compassion. This plan is geared towards supporting a healthy and vibrant workforce.
- 4. In the District's ongoing efforts to assist schools in diversifying their staff, Non-Instructional works collaborative with schools and leadership teams that may have unique student demographics and/or when faced with difficulties in filling hard to fill positions. This is supported in School Board Policy and allows for community and stakeholder engagement. In addition, Non-Instructional works directly with the internal leadership and professional development departments to provide support and bill a pipeline of qualified candidates.
- 5. The District's employment outreach efforts include working closely with external stakeholders like Council of the Great City Schools, BROAD (Urban Education), Not-for-Profit Organizations, CareerSource of Broward, Community Partners, Police Benevolent Association, Union and Meet & Confer Groups and the utilization of a multitude of other recruitment outlets. Saff attends career days and events that promote career readiness in the K-12 Environment. In addition, with the start of the 2023-24 School Year, the District implemented a new robust applicant tracking system (SuccessFactors) that enhances the overall recruitments including but not limited to visibility, outreach, ease, and accessibility that strengthens our ability to attract a diverse workforce.

- 6. The District is not limited to where advertisement of its vacancies occurs. Specifically, vacancies are advertised via the District's Career Page, LinkedIn, Indeed, Council of Great City Schools, BROAD, Colleges, Universities, Special Career Boards (e.g. Police Associations, Fire Associations, CareerSource of Broward, etc.), Radio, Television, School Marquees, and a host of free and paid job boards. In addition, the District's new applicant system "SuccessFactors" has absolutely expanded our access to job boards. This includes the utilization of marketing campaigns. Most current campaign for advertisement and recruitment yielded nearly 3,000 Registrants. Ongoing stakeholder feedback is gathered to enhance the level of quality services.
- 7. The District has proactive partnerships with colleges, universities, student organizations, professional organizations, etc. to promote employment opportunities, which include but not limited to participating in various career fairs with local universities, technical colleges, CareerSource of Broward, cities/local municipalities, and attending other recruitment events working closely with individuals with disabilities and veterans. We utilize colleges and universities to promote employment opportunities for a diverse applicant pool (inclusive of the District's Fully Accredited Technical Colleges and High Schools). We implemented a Leader Tracking System, which further supports our efforts to monitor future leaders for employment opportunities.

The School Board of Broward County, Florida – **2022-2027 Strategic Plan** consists of Goals and Guardrails that are student outcome-focused. We strive to ensure that we recruit a highly qualified workforce and provide resources for development and opportunities for professional learning, to ensure long-term success. Overall, initiatives and safeguards are in place to cultivate an equitable, inclusive, and diverse environment for all stakeholders.

In our efforts to maintain continuous improvement, our District will continue to adhere to equal opportunity policies, foster a cohesive environment and utilize various outlets to ensure we address any ethnic or gender underrepresentation we may encounter.

Talent Acquisition & Operations (Instructional)

Our District continues to utilize various outlets to ensure we address all ethnic or gender underrepresentation we may encounter. During the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic the district's recruitment initiatives were adjusted to ensure safety of our candidates and staff. We have effectively tailored our recruitment efforts to incorporate one-on-one virtual interviews and virtual career fairs.

The School Board of Broward County (SBBC) is committed to hiring and maintaining a diverse workforce reflective of the diversity of Broward County residents. The Talent Acquisition and Operations (Instructional) team implements a variety of recruitment and retention efforts to ensure a variety of ethnicities and genders are attracted to positions within SBBC. The recruitment team works closely with the District's Equity & Diversity department to ensure our commitment to equity & diversity is evident and demonstrated throughout our processes. We work to attract minority candidates by utilizing media outlets that specifically advertise within platforms trending higher population of minority representation, participating in minority-focused recruitment events, and collaborating with historically Black colleges and universities.

Local recruitment efforts include District-organized events, as well as external career fairs with non-profit organizations, such as CareerSource Broward. To further expand our employment outreach efforts throughout the country, we organize virtual fairs, participate in national career fairs, and continue to enhance our International Exchange Teacher program (Philippines & Spain). Vacancies are shared via our newly implemented recruitment and career site, SuccessFactors, print publications (The Sun-Sentinel), social media (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, etc.) and professional networking and university job boards (LinkedIn, Indeed, Employ Florida, Handshake, etc.). We have also increased our targeted marketing efforts to include video testimonials that depict the diverse workforce currently within SBBC as an additional method to attract even more diverse candidates.

SBBC has a proactive partnership with all the university and colleges in the tri-county area. Multiple recruitment events are held throughout the year. We work closely with the career offices and the university placement professors. In addition, we have established partnerships with universities outside of the tri-county area that provide us with an additional pool of candidates. We continue to fortify our relationship with established teacher organizations (i.e. Future Educators, Florida Fund for Minority teachers, etc.,) connecting us to candidates from various backgrounds and experiences. We work closely with the university and colleges to place student teaching interns and field experience students in as many Broward County Schools (BCPS) as possible. We have established our "Grown Your Own" initiative to attract current SBBC paraprofessionals to become teachers. We are also developing a "Teacher Apprenticeship" program with one of our local colleges. These programs allow us to leverage current employees to enter the pipeline to increase our diversity recruitment efforts. As a district proudly serving a diverse population, we will continuously strive for representation and cultural awareness in the classroom environment.

The District currently has three different locations that offer assistance and guidance to pregnant and parenting students (Charles Drew Resource Center is a part of Dave Thomas Education Center, Henry D. Perry Education Center, and Seagull Alternative High School.) Contact persons for this area are Synithia Crawford, Principal, Dave Thomas Education Center and Charles Drew Family Resource Center, Kristin Baltazar, Principal, Henry D. Perry Education Center, and Charisse E. Merchant-James, Ed. S, Principal, Seagull Alternative High School. The following pages provides the District's response to the above three (3) questions from each location:

<u>Dave Thomas Education Center and</u> <u>Charles Drew Family Resource Center</u>

1) How does the district make provisions for pregnant students to complete the coursework necessary to earn a high school diploma? How are ancillary services (such as childcare, health care, social services, parent education, and transportation) provided?

Charles Drew Family Resource Center follows the Florida Department of Education's graduation plan. In our efforts to adhere to this plan, we offer multiple diploma options as well as flexible scheduling for our students. Using a competency-based approach, our students can earn credits at their own pace, often leading to course recovery and on-time graduation. Schedule changes are done as students complete courses allowing them to immediately move on to the next course needed in their graduation plan.

Full-time childcare is offered at no cost to our students/parents. Wraparound services for our parents/students and their children include events such as Mommy and Me/Daddy and Me parenting classes. We have a School Social Worker available to support our students. Broward County Schools' transportation is available to our parents/students and their children. A car seat is provided for each child to ensure their safety as they are transported each day. Furthermore, teen parent students have an opportunity to join mentoring programs such as: Women of Tomorrow.

2) If the district operates a separate program for pregnant and parenting students, how are students informed of the different curricula, services, or other options available through the program versus what is available to students not in the program? (Please attach brochure (s) used to inform pregnant and parenting students of their educational options).

There is no specific curriculum separating pregnant and parenting students from traditional students without children. They must meet the same graduation requirements based on their diploma option.

However, the methods in which we reach these curricula needs differ from traditional schools in that credits are earned through a competency-based system of approach. Through this method, we can meet each students' individual needs.

Please see the attached brochure that describes our teen parent program and our available services. Additional information can also be found on our website at www.davethomaseducationcenter.com.

3) How are school counselors and administrators trained to effectively advise pregnant or parenting students of their options to participate in regular classroom activities or enroll in a special program, and their access to curricular, extracurricular, and ancillary service programs?

Administrators, school counselors, social workers, and family counselors all attend district training related to credit evaluation, testing, and graduation requirements. In addition, the staff is trained in the Response to Intervention (Rtl) process to assist our parents/students should they be experiencing needs beyond what is traditionally addressed at a Tier 1 level for all students. School counselors and school social workers attend monthly district teen parent seminars and guidance trainings. Morning Announcements and Parent Link calls are made to inform students of activities and events.



1) How does the district make provisions for pregnant and parenting students to complete the course work necessary to earn a high school diploma? How are ancillary services (such as childcare, health care, social services, parent education, and transportation) provided?

Henry D. Perry Education Center follows the Florida Department of Education's graduation plan. In our efforts to adhere to this plan, we offer multiple diploma options as well as flexible scheduling for our students. Using a competency-based approach, our students can earn credits at their own pace, often leading to course recovery and on-time graduation. Schedule changes are done as students complete courses allowing them to immediately move on to the next course needed in their graduation plan.

Full-time childcare is offered at no cost to our students/parents. Wraparound services for our parents/students and their children include events such as the Finding Balance and Milk & Cookies Literacy Initiative. The Finding Balance Seminar consisted of Drown Prevention Education, Broward Healthy Start Connect Program including Light of the World Clinic. Also, teen parent students participate in the Literacy Initiative Milk & Cookies and Mommy & Me in which they are educated on the importance of reading to their babies. Our teen parent students are also invited to the Community Baby Shower presented by the district for teen parents in which they received further parenting education and were showered with resources. In addition, we work with Memorial and their partnering agencies to provide medical assistance and healthcare to our parents/students, often supporting the needs of uninsured students. We have two full-time School Social Workers available to support our students. Broward County Schools' transportation is available to our parents/students and their children. A car seat is provided for each child to ensure their safety as they are transported each day. Furthermore, teen parent students have an opportunity to join mentoring programs such as: Women of Tomorrow and Boys II Men Mentoring group.

2) If the district operates a separate program for pregnant and parenting students, how are students informed of the different curricula, services or other options available through the program versus what is available to students not in the program? (Please attach brochure(s) used to inform pregnant and parenting students of their educational option.)

There is no specific curriculum separating parents/students from traditional students without children. They must meet the same graduation requirements based on their diploma option. However, the methods in which we reach these curricula needs differ from traditional schools in that credits are earned through a competency-based system of approach. Through this method, we can meet each students' individual needs. Please see the attached brochure that describes our teen parent program and our available services. 3) How are school counselors and administrators trained to effectively advise pregnant or parenting students of their options to participate in regular classroom activities or enroll in a special program, and their access to curricular, extracurricular and ancillary service programs?

Administrators, school counselors, social workers, and family counselors all attend district training related to credit evaluation, testing, and graduation requirements. In addition, the staff is trained in the Response to Intervention (Rt]) process to assist our parents/students should they be experiencing needs beyond what is traditionally addressed at a Tier 1 level for all students. School counselors and school social workers attend monthly district teen parent seminars and guidance trainings. Canvas announcements, Gator Pack Video Announcements, and Parent Link calls are made to inform students of activities and events. Quarterly club days are scheduled to allow students to learn about our clubs and provide opportunities for them to join.

Seagull Alternative High School offers pregnant and parenting teens an array of services including to but not limited to:

- a. Transportation (door-to door) round-trip
- b. Licensed childcare facility (6 weeks to 5 years old)
- c. On-site clinic with registered nurse
- Free breakfast (all students/toddlers) and free/reduced lunch for student and toddlers
- e. Full-time Family Counselor (case management/referral services)
- f. Full-time Social Worker (resources and home visits)
- g. University of Florida Extension Services (nutrition, healthy lifestyle workshops)
- Mentoring programs (My Safety Starts with Me, Hosanna 4 Youth, Women of Tomorrow)
- i. Parenting/Peer Counseling courses
- j. Job Coach (District assigned)
- 2. If the district operates a separate program for pregnant and parenting students, how are students informed of the different curricula, services, or other options available through the program versus what is available to students not in the program? Please attach the brochure(s) used to inform pregnant and parenting students of their educational options.

Upon enrollment at Seagull, every student meets with a certified school counselor that reviews transcripts and graduation requirements/goals. During the consultation, diploma options and course offerings are discussed. Students and parents are advised that Seagull is a competency-based, work at your own pace program whereby credits or courses may be earned or completed prior to the close of the marking period or quarter unlike traditional schools. Students are also advised about the childcare services and requirements to enroll their baby/toddler in the program. Additionally, student orientations are held quarterly where essential staff (i.e., administration, guidance, support services, etc.) present an overview of services performed by that department.

3. How are school counselors and administrators trained to effectively advise pregnant or parenting students of their options to participate in regular classroom activities or enroll in a special program, and their access to curricular, extracurricular, and ancillary service programs?

School counselors and administrators follow state and district directives/memorandums regarding changes and procedures for all programs including pregnant and teen parent programs. Additionally, information is shared during monthly department chair/leadership team meetings with administration, Literacy, STEM, Literacy Coach, SAC chair, Guidance/ESE, social services, and childcare departments to review, update, train on policies/procedures relevant to the disciplines.

Entry Guidelines

Students in 6^{m-12m} grade that are over age for grade level and not succeeding in the traditional setting or delicient in credits or GPA and/or may have gaps in their educational history are candidates for admission into Seagull Alternative High School. Seagull also enrolls pregnant and parenting leens, males and females.

Seagull accepts ESE students pursuing a standard high school diploma (non-Access points) and needing academic support due to insufficient credits and/or low GPA. Our low ESE staff-to-student ratio increases opportunities for student assistance.

Students are referred by school counselors and will be reviewed for eligibility to enroll. Students with exceptionalities or an IEP will require a staffing*.

Seaguli students are provided with a variety of options that can lead to graduation and are supported by services for the student and their immediate family that are essential to success.

 A staffing between sending school and Seagull is required prior to withdrawing an ESE student from their home school.





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
