- GA can help to develop your idea by facilitating a group brainstorming meeting, conducting a needs assessment and creating a program plan.
- GA can help to identify funding opportunities through the Grant Funding Newsletter, cultivating donors, and providing individual research.
- GA can work with you to ensure a timely submission, seek School Board review and approval of the grant, and provide editing and writing support.
- GA can help set-up the grant account, support the grant agreement review and approval process, provide donor stewardship, and support media outreach efforts.
- GA can help you to manage the award by supporting the reporting process.
- If applicable, GA will liaise with the Accounting & Financial Reporting Department for assistance with the final financial report.

## FLDOE Awards Grant to Support Struggling Readers

With a grant from the **Florida Department of Education (FLDOE)** of **\$2,928,821**, BCPS will address the needs of VPK through third grade students who are reading below grade level and have been disproportionately impacted by the coronavirus pandemic. Grant funds will support the *Systematic Instruction in Phonological Awareness, Phonics, and Sight Words (SIPPS)* program that will be taught to groups of students with similar needs and allows teachers to target exactly what students need to know next. SIPPS will also provide teachers with structured lessons, systematic instructional routines, and ways to provide immediate corrective feedback which will accelerate students' proficiency in foundational skills. Thank you to the Elementary Learning department and the Charter School Management & Support office for working collaboratively with GA staff on the proposal.



## Teacher Wins \$50,000 for Atlantic Technical College and Technical High School

The **Harbor Freight Tools** for Schools program aims to drive a greater understanding of and investment in skilled trades education, believing that access to quality skilled trades education gives high school students pathways to graduation, opportunity, good jobs and a workforce the country needs. Congratulations to Kevin Finan, a machining teacher at Atlantic Technical College and Technical High School (ATC), for being named a winner of the Harbor Freight Tools for Schools Prize for Teaching Excellence. He was awarded **\$50,000** for his program. "For the past 10 years, Mr. Finan has

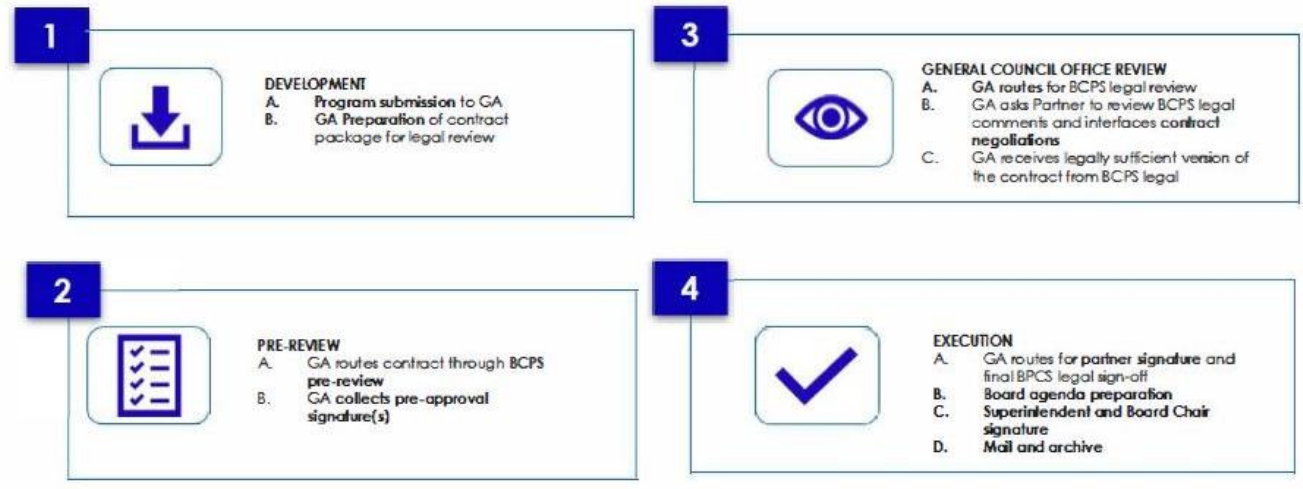


## **OFFICE OF Elementary & Secondary Education** BCPS Wins Magnet Schools Assistance Program Grant

BCPS has been awarded a **\$14 million** grant from the **U.S. Department of Education's Magnet Schools Assistance Program (MSAP)**. The five-year grant will increase school choice options and assist six schools in implementing a new magnet program called Achieving Career Equity for Students (ACES). The ACES program places a strong emphasis on career exploration by allowing students to participate in instructional models with a career emphasis that is tailored to their interests and by presenting career-based curricula that link studies and experiences to potential academic pathways.

# BCPS Grant Writer in Action!

**Name:** Luciana Gentile

**Position:** Literacy Coach, Ramblewood Elementary

**Years of service:** 18

**How many grants have you been awarded and what is the total dollar amount awarded?** The first grant I applied for was the \$700.00 Target Field Trip grant. With this grant, I was able to take my students to the Museum of Discovery and Science and the IMAX theater. It was an amazing experience. Since then, I have applied for and been awarded the Target Field Trip grant two additional times. I also received the Aldi's grant three times for creative activities in the class. Another grant I have applied for and been awarded for the last five years, is the Broward Education Foundation Adapter, Innovative Teacher, and Disseminator grant. This grant allows me to implement engaging learning experiences for students. In addition to

that, I also applied for a \$1,000.00 TGIF grant for the last three years. This grant allowed me to attend conferences in and out of state. The newest grant I have received was the Walmart grant. This grant will fund creative spaces for students.

**Which grant-supported project is your favorite?** Every grant creates memorable experiences for students. Since I am a Literacy Coach now, my latest grant funded project "Phonemic Awareness Multisensory tools" is for our teachers. The grant allowed me to set up a hand on "store" in which teachers could learn how to use multisensory tools to teach phonemic awareness and "shop" for the tools. This was so much fun! Our teachers were so excited to implement the new lessons, and it promoted engagement and whole brain learning for our students!

**What is your process for filling out a grant application?** I try to research the grant before I apply. I read everything on the website and look at examples from prior winners. As for the idea for the grant, I keep a journal of ideas throughout the school year. I start with a standard or a cluster of standards and then think of a creative and engaging way to teach it. I love project-based learning, so I design a plan for students to learn by actively engaging in real-world meaningful projects. Once I have a clear vision of my idea, I think of the materials that would be needed to implement it. I then write up the project explaining it in a way that anyone can easily understand. Often, the committees granting the funds are not comprised entirely of educators, so it's important to be clear in demonstrating the need and explaining how the grant will help meet that need. Ultimately, everyone involved just wants to know how the grant will benefit the students. When I write the narrative for the grant, I don't just explain the academic impact, often I include the social-emotional impact as well.

**Do you have any grant writing tips?** Yes, it's important to include in the narrative a strong objective and assessment piece. I include a pre and post assessment when appropriate. In addition, I embed assessments throughout each part of the granted project. When writing the grant, I include a detailed explanation of the embedded assessments in order to explain how I will analyze the impact of the grant. Assessments can include products, performance tasks, and portfolios. This part is important because it supports the claim for a need and gives evidence of the positive impact of the grant funds. Another important area is to explain in the narrative how each of the items requested will be used. For example, if I am asking for a green screen, it should be clear in the narrative how it will be used as part of the project. I do this for every item before submitting a grant.

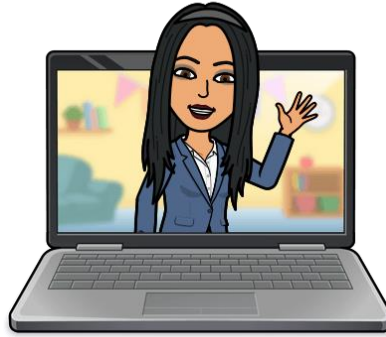

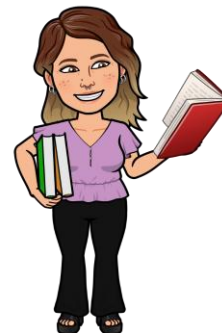
