- GA can work with you to ensure a timely submission, seek School Board review and approval of the grant, and provide editing and writing support.
- GA can help set-up the grant account, support the grant agreement review and approval process, provide donor stewardship, and support media outreach efforts.
- GA can help you to manage the award by supporting the reporting process.
- If applicable, GA will liaise with the Accounting & Financial Reporting Department for assistance with the final financial report.

Student Health at Cross Creek Education Center Gets A Boast from State Farm

Cross Creek Education Center has been awarded, a \$25,000 grant from State Farm. Funding will be used to create a hub for mental health wellbeing for students and staff. The new Zen Room will be an aesthetic space with multi-sensory items that will create a therapeutic atmosphere where services will be provided. Mindfulness, therapy groups, and a safe space are some of the features of this cathartic room. The Zen Room project will help students gain the skills needed to achieve a healthy balance of well-being that will help to improve grades, attendance, and reduce behavioral incidents. BCPS Receives Grant to Support Struggling Readers

With the High-Impact Reading Interventions and Targeted Supports (HIITS) grant of \$2,928,821 from the Florida Department of Education (FLDOE), BCPS will address reading loss among students disproportionately affected by COVID-19, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care by implementing a Systematic Instruction in Phonological Awareness, Phonics, and Sight Words (SIPPS) program. The SIPPS program will be taught in groups of students with similar needs and allows teachers to target exactly what students need to know next. SIPPS provides structured lessons, systematic instructional routines, and immediate corrective feedback which will accelerate students' proficiency in foundational skills. GA staff worked collaboratively with Vicky Saldala, Director – Bilingual/ESOL Department, Elementary Learning (Task-Assigned) and her team to develop and submit the proposal. Congratulations to Ms. Saldala and team on your grant success!



Elementary School Supports Parents through Grant

Ramblewood Elementary School has received \$500 from ALDI Cares Community Grant program. Grant funds will be used to support the school's monthly informational meetings with parents. The monthly meetings with parents have already been a great success as seen by the growing number of parents who participate. Increased parental engagement also contributed to the overall school grade increasing by three letter grades! Grant Funding Opens Doors at BCPS Technical Colleges

The **FLDOE** awarded **\$500,000** to Atlantic, McFatter and Sheridan technical colleges and technical high schools to enroll and support students in short-term, in-demand workforce/career and technical education credentialing and certification programs. Studies show that career and technical education (CTE) programs improve career opportunities by providing students with hands-on training and the soft skills necessary to succeed in the labor market. CTE programs can also improve core academic skills by fostering student engagement and motivating students to attend school more regularly. BCPS Grant Writer in Action!



Name: Alicia Jaramillo

Position: School Counseling Director/Cross Creek School

Years of service: 19

How many grants have you been awarded and what is the total dollar amount awarded? 4 grants totaling \$34,100.

Which grant-supported project is your favorite? Find Your Center: Mindfulness Zen Room because it provides students and staff with a dedicated space to relax, learn and build community.

What is your process for filling out a grant application? First, I find grant opportunities that pertain to my ideas. I carefully review the requirements and get a sense of what the donor is looking for. Then I take my project idea, clearly define, describe, and modify it to meet the criteria of the grant opportunity. I consider the outcomes that I will use and ensure that they are observable and measurable and list them in my grant application. Many grants require you to attach a budget proposal, so I make sure that I have my list of items/services that I'd like to purchase for my project and check the requirements to see if I must use an approved vendor. I learned that it is best to make the budget as detailed as possible and include item numbers and price, because this will be required in the long run. Once I am certain that I have answered all questions and have clearly provided all the information requested, I send it to our grants manager to review before I submit.

Do you have any grant writing tips? I find it best to work collaboratively with our grant's liaison in the Grants Administration department, my school administration, and my colleagues when writing a grant proposal. I keep in mind that the donors are not likely educators, so I use laymen's terms and spell out acronyms. I strive to paint a clear picture of my project to help the donor understand: the unmet need at my school, the student population (include percentage data ex: % of poor attendance, free/reduced lunch, below grade level etc.), how the donation will be spent (detailed budget), and the measurable outcomes that show how the project will benefit students (increase attendance, improve grades, etc.). There is sometimes a word limit, so I try to be detailed, but succinct. Some grant applications allow you to include photos, and that can greatly help to document the vision of your project. The goal is to clearly demonstrate to the donor how their contribution to the project will benefit the students. Most importantly, be confident, and believe that you can do this! Believe in your project, apply for as many grants as you can using the same content, and be patient while awaiting the response. Do not give up if you don't win right away. Stay positive, motivated, and know that your grant will be funded!

What do I do next after receiving an award notification from the funding agency?

Contact our department! We will work with your school and the Budget Department to set up the grant account and get your project underway.

Can my school principal sign the grant application form?

Principals must sign application forms when their signature is specifically requested.

Can my school principal sign a grant contract, Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) or agreement? No, if the form asks for the signature of the Superintendent, Executive Director, Chief Executive Officer, or Authorized Official, then only the Superintendent and School Board Chair can sign. Reach out to GA to request support through the internal contract review, approval and signature process.
