

### **Grant Development Process and How Grants Administration Can Help You**



- GA can help to develop your idea by facilitating a group brainstorming meeting, conducting a needs assessment and creating a program plan.
- GA can help to identify funding opportunities through the Grant Funding Newsletter, cultivating donors, and providing individual research.
- GA can work with you to ensure a timely submission, seek School Board review and approval of the grant, and provide editing and writing support.
- GA can help set-up the grant account, support the grant agreement review and approval process, provide donor stewardship, and support media outreach efforts.
- GA can help you to manage the award by supporting the reporting process.
  - If applicable, GA will liaise with the Accounting & Financial Reporting Department for assistance with the final financial report.

### **Update on Grant Contract/Agreement Review and Approval Process**

All grant contracts, agreements, terms of reference or other legal documents that require a signature from a BCPS authorized representative are <u>required</u> to go through the District's legal review, approval, and signature process. Please reach out to GA staff for support.



Grant contracts and funds will not be awarded without Board approval. A copy may be submitted via e-mail to **grants@browardschools.com** or via pony mail to GA to the 4<sup>th</sup> Floor of the K.C. Wright Administrative Building. All grant applications **MUST** support the District's Strategic Plan Goals.





### Thank you, NFL Foundation, NFL Players and the Miami Dolphins Foundation!

Research shows that students who have home computers perform better academically and take higher level courses. Yet, a report from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting ("Connected to the Future") suggests the Digital Divide has not yet closed and may potentially widen for some students. As technology becomes more important in the lives of students, particularly during the COVID-19 pandemic, strategies to address the "digital divide" in students' homes and schools become increasingly more critical. Through a generous grant of \$100,000 from the NFL Foundation, NFL Players and the Miami Dolphins Foundation, BCPS will provide 1,500 homeless students with both a hotspot and laptop to use for their digital needs.





### JP Morgan Chase Expands Support to BCPS

JP Morgan Chase's goal is to help young people attain the credentials that position them to compete for skilled employment opportunities and put them on a successful career pathway. In the past six years, BCPS has utilized grant funding from JP Morgan Chase to support work-based experiences for youth in 11th and 12th grades. A new grant from JP Morgan Chase of \$332,500 will support Talent Forge foster the establishment of a locally resilient and sustainable talent pipeline for Broward County. Talent Forge will implement a talent development strategy with local employers inclusive of businesses, local governments, and non-profits focused on sustaining and expanding work-based learning experiences including paid internships for BCPS high school students. The grant also supports pre-apprenticeships and apprenticeships for youth ensuring the preparedness and depth of a local workforce bench positioned to meet the needs of quickly evolving and emerging industries.

JP Morgan Chase also awarded BCPS with a grant of \$125,000 to support internship experiences for students enrolled in Career Technical Education (CTE) education pathways including career-themed academies in the following areas: engineering, business and finance, hospitality and tourism, health science and information technology. Through this work students are exposed to rigorous, industry-validated curriculum that incorporates current industry standards and practices while fostering customer service, employability skills and social capital. What is your process for filling out a grant application? My process for filling out a grant application is to really know the schools needs for the funding. Also, to make sure the grant dollars impact students (either achievement, performance, behavioral, and/or attendance). When we look

at the grant application, I make sure I am meeting with the Leadership team along with Administration to figure what the ask is and the necessary budget to achieve the maximum goal of the grant.

**Do you have any grant writing tips?** Make a timeline of when you will complete certain sections of the grant and, if possible, have a grant writing buddy. For me, this is a key component to successfully writing the grant request also:

- Don't over think it! Get to the point of what your request is and give as many details as possible.
- Be clear about your budget request. Make sure that your budget matches your project request.
- Once you receive the grant, make sure you send the foundation your progress in achieving your goals sending measurable outcomes to the funder.
- One last thing, believe in the project you are writing the grant for. For me, I think it is super important for our students to have opportunities we cannot provide in the school's general budgets (performing at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., sending teachers to arts integration professional development in other states, bringing in National teaching artists, etc.). If you believe the work is important then funder will see your passion and provide support.

Once you get the funding, you really can see the positive impact on teachers and students. So, go for it!! It is definitely worth the effort.

### TIP for the Day: Tips for Writing a Winning Proposal

Grants, to be successful, should be part of your overall fundraising plan, have a calendar, and a dedicated grant writer, either on staff or contracted. Grants come from a variety of sources such as a foundation, a corporation or a government agency, but most require similar information. There are also at least three different types of proposals, ranging from a letter to a full-blown proposal.

Executive Summary The executive summary comes after your cover letter. It helps the grantor to understand at a glance what you are asking. Aim to be complete but brief. The summary gives a taste of the proposal to come and should entice the reader to keep going.

Need Statement The statement of need is the meat of your grant proposal. You must convince the funder that what you propose to do is essential and that your organization is the right one to do it.

Use your expertise to explain it, but make it simple to understand.

Goals and Objectives Your goals and objectives explain what your organization plans to do about the problem. State what you hope to accomplish with the project (goals) and spell out the specific results (objectives) you expect to achieve. Brush up on SMART objectives.

Methods, Strategies or Program Design Walk the grantor through exactly HOW you will achieve the goals and objectives you've set out earlier. Be as detailed as you can with a timeline and specifics about who will do what and when.

Evaluation Section Funders want to know that their dollars had an impact. So decide now how you will evaluate the outcomes of your project. Include what records you will keep or data you will collect, and how you will use that data.

Project Budget Attach a short budget showing expected expenses and income. The expenses portion should include personnel costs, direct project costs, and administrative or overhead expenses.
