### **Technical Colleges Receive Grants**

Congratulations to Atlantic Technical College, McFatter Technical College and Sheridan Technical College for jointly receiving more than \$2.4 million in CARES Relief Act funds! These awards will help ameliorate the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. More than 50% of the funds will be given directly to students enrolled at the technical colleges.

#### National Endowment for the Arts Awards Grant

The **National Endowment for the Arts** has awarded a grant of **\$16,000** to BCPS to support visual arts projects at lowest performing elementary schools. Through the "Art Reaching Today's Youth – Breaking Down Barriers" project students will explore their creativity, diversity, social-emotional development, and cultural heritage aboard buses converted into mobile art studios. Instruction will incorporate arts and core curriculum standards in creating puppets, large scale paintings, and mixed media. ### **Sprint Increases Support to BCPS**

**Sprint's 1Million Project** aims to bridge the digital divide and help close the "homework gap" for one million low-income K-12 students lacking technology and internet access at home. Through a five-year partnership with Sprint valued at **\$2.25 million**, BCPS can provide 12,500 high school students with personal devices and up to 10GB of high-speed long-term evolution data per month. In response to the COVID-19 emergency, Sprint has expanded the program to include elementary and middle schools. ## Florida Education Foundation Supports Distance Learning



The Florida Education Foundation (FEF) is supporting Florida's teachers, learners, and leaders as they navigate the challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic by providing grants that support distance learning. # Grant Writer in Action

Name: Guy Barmoha

Position: Director, Secondary Learning

**Years of service:** 25 years

How many grants have you been awarded and what is the total dollar amount awarded?

More than 10 grants totaling more than \$5,000,000

### Which grant-supported project is your favorite?

Community Foundation of Broward, Reimagining Middle Grades. This grant is a three year \$3M award to change with the work of changing the pedagogical philosophy of middle grades teachers to provide more project-based learning experiences. As well as compliment the curriculum with wrap around social-emotional learning strategies. While I have worked on many grants in the past this grant is the one that involves the most collaboration between departments in the District. Secondary Learning, OSPA Middle School Cadre Directors, Strategic Initiative Management (SIM), Student Assessment & Research, Employee Evaluations, Applied Learning, and Innovative Programs worked together to implement this initiative.

### What is your process for filling out a grant application?

First you have to find the grant that fits your initiative and determine the return on investment as it relates to the work to get the grant competed and the probability of getting the grant awarded. Once it is determined that it is a fruitful opportunity, we begin by building a budget for the grant and writing a grant narrative.

### Do you have any grant writing tips?

Find a good team of people to help put together the narrative and budget. The Grants Administration department has a tremendous staff that will not only locate grants but also assist in the creation submission of the grant. Having support from the Grants Administration department has allowed me and my team to focus on the content of the initiative while the Grants team manages the logistics. I have also relied on Dr. Lisa Milenkovic, Curriculum Supervisor STEM & Computer Science, for advice on identifying and completing grant applications. Dr. Milenkovic's knowledge of grant writing and budget creation has been an asset to me and my team as well as the District as a whole.

## **Grant Writing Glossary**

- 1. **501(c)(3)** is the section of the Internal Revenue Code that defines nonprofit, charitable, and tax-exempt organizations. BCPS can partner with The Broward Education Foundation (BEF) since public schools do not have 501(c)(3) status.
- 2. **Audited Financial Statements** are annual financial statements which have been prepared and certified by a Certified Public Accountant. The District's audited financials can be **FOUND HERE**.
- 3. **Capacity Building Grants** help organizations to increase their capacity to achieve their mission. This may include the funding of new staff positions; and the costs of consulting to help the organization learn how to manage their boards, increase their fund-raising capacity and expand services.
- 4. Capital Grants fund building of endowments, building renovations and similar activities, construction or equipment.
- 5. **Concept Paper** is a two- to three-page description of your organization and program. A concept paper often includes a need statement, project narrative, and budget.
- 6. **Corporate Giving Programs** have very specific causes they will fund (the arts, environmental education, youth, health). Some companies have their own charitable giving department, while others have a separate foundation.
- Direct Costs are costs allowable by the funding organization, and are directly tied to the operation of the project.
- 8. **Eligibility Criteria** is usually available on a grant funder's website. Before spending a lot of time and effort on a grant proposal, thoroughly read whether your organization or program is eligible for funding.
- 9. **Evaluation** is how the organization assesses whether their project made a measurable difference.
- 10. **Form 990** is an IRS form that tax-exempt organizations are required to file annually for public record of financial information. Public schools are not required to have a Form 990.
- 11. **General Support or Unrestricted Grants** are for general operating costs rather than specific projects.
- 12. **Goals** are expressed as the overall vision of what you want your project to accomplish. Be careful about having too many goals because this could be viewed as either being too ambitious or too unfocused.
- 13. Indirect Costs/Indirect Cost Rate (Sometimes referred to as "overhead" or "Facilities and Administrative Costs) are costs that support the management systems of the organization including public relations, accounting, payroll, marketing, registration and records, and counselor. Grant funders may or may not allow indirect costs.
- 14. **In-Kind Contribution** is a noncash donation to a project.
- 15. **Letter of Intent or Letter of Interest (LOI)** is a document that provides a brief description of the project or program for which funding is being requested.
- 16. Matching Funds are cash or in-kind support contributed by the grantee to carry out a project. Some grant proposals

require a match before funding a proposal.

17. **Objectives** are what specifically will change, improve, decrease, or increase because of your project activities. Many grant writers use the SMART model: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, and Time-Bound.

- 18. **Request for Proposals (RFP) or Request for Applications (RFA)** is a type of solicitation notice in which a donor announces that grant funding is available and provides specifications required in the grant proposal/application.
- 19. Restricted Funds are funds that must be spent for a specific purpose, as determined by the funder.
- 20. Unallowable Costs are costs and categories of costs that cannot directly or indirectly be offset by grant money.
- 21. Unrestricted Funds can be used for any purpose without any requirements or restrictions.

Classics for Kids Foundation: Instrument Matching Grant works to empower young people to shape positive futures through music and to build and strengthen sustainable stringed instrument music programs. To support this goal, this program will provide matching awards for the purchase of high-quality stringed instruments for use by children in grades K-12. Instruments eligible for purchase include violins, violas, cellos, and double basses. Grant deadlines are June 30, September 30, December 31 and March 31 every year.
