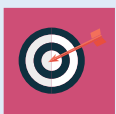


Good News!

Dillard 6-12 Receives Grant of Music Instruments



In 2016, Keith Urban donated 100 guitars from his signature guitar collection that **The Mr. Holland's Opus Foundation** distributed to five school districts across the country. New Grant Program for Coconut Creek Schools



The School Grants Program at the **Seminole Coconut Creek Education Foundation (SCCEF)** is designed to assist public schools and their teachers with programs and projects that inspire learning, enrich teaching, and enhance opportunities for Coconut Creek students. SCCEF's vision is to maximize student potential, provide a competitive advantage and ensure Coconut Creek students are well equipped to meet the challenges of education, work and life. The Foundation recently granted BCPS **\$136,142** for 42 teacher and school-wide grants at the following schools:

- Elementary Schools: Coconut Creek, Tradewinds and Winston Park
- Middle Schools: Lyons Creek
- High Schools: Atlantic Technical, Coconut Creek and Monarch

All grants support reading readiness, STEM, college preparation and/or the arts. Garden Grant is Awarded to Everglades High School



Congratulations to Marsha Eichel, Teacher – Exceptional Student Education (ESE) at Everglades High School on your **\$3,000** grant from the **Whole Kids Foundation** to support the school's garden. With this grant, 70 students and ESE teachers will participate in a garden program including watering the garden daily, doing weekly weeding, and upgrading and installations monthly. During the school breaks or summer, students will come in from Best Buddies or the department and earn community service hours. The garden will be used to teach all Access math, HOPE, career experience and Self-Determination. Curriculum standards will correlate to lessons. The food that is grown will be integrated into lessons. Students will be able to label/identify the parts of the herb, fruit, or vegetable. Teachers will do food demonstrations and students will eat the food raw or cooked or incorporated into a smoothie and even added as a component to a dish.

Helios Education Foundation Supports Rising First Graders



The BCPS Summer 2021 experience for the District's youngest learners got a boost, thanks to a **\$250,000** grant from **Helios Education Foundation** to help ensure students are prepared to be successful in first grade through a reading acceleration initiative at Challenger, Driftwood, Lakeside, Stirling and Tradewinds Elementary Schools. Each of these schools also served as a feeder site, welcoming their students and students who attend other District schools during the regular school year. GA staff provided proposal development and submissions support, donor stewardship and oversaw the grant contract review process. Thank you, Dr. Nicole Mancini, Director – Elementary Learning and team for working collaboratively with GA staff on this important endeavor.

Centers for Disease Control (CDC) Approves Grant to BCPS



Schools play a critical role in promoting the health and safety of young people and helping them establish lifelong healthy behaviors. The **Centers for Disease Control (CDC)** has approved additional funding of **\$358,697** for the provision of Youth Mental Health First Aid course to approximately 1,575 BCPS staff. Mental Health First Aid is a training program — like regular First Aid or CPR — designed to give people the skills to help someone who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. The course uses role -playing and simulations to demonstrate how to recognize and respond to the warning signs of specific illnesses. Mental Health First Aid helps people know that mental illnesses are real, common, and treatable and that it's OK to seek help. Congratulations and thank you Sebrina James, Instructional Facilitator, Sexual Health Coordinator – Equity & Diversity Department and colleagues for working on such an important program and grant.



Grant Writer in Action ...In Their Own Words!

Name: Rachel Silber

Position: Secretary II including Partners in Education Liaison and Student Affairs Liaison at Hollywood Hills High School

Years of service: 5 years as BCPS employee and 17 years as schools' volunteer

How many grants have you been awarded and what is the total dollar amount awarded? As a PTSA / PTSO President, at Stirling Elementary, Attucks Middle and Hollywood Hills High, I have been awarded about \$100,000 altogether. As a Community Outreach Liaison, in the last three years, about \$40,000. In-kind donations have been more than a million dollars. Over eight years, Publix has provided nightly their "day old" bakery goods and after Holidays' Inventory. For over five years, Panera Bread donates every unsold item at the end of that night!

Which grant-supported project is your favorite? There are no favorite Grants since all are funding the needs of our school. The students, staff and their families enjoy the bakery goods, and I am called the cupcakes / cookie Lady. Just like little kids, our students are looking forwards for the sweet that they could not afford to purchase or just enjoyed it because their teachers wanted to celebrate a special occasion. Regardless my daughter's warning that one day the students will blame me for being Diabetic and their parents will provide me with their Dentists' bills!

Anyone can ask a store for an in-kind donation - just go and ask the manager if your school can benefit from their generosity. Remember that you are doing them a favor by removing it from their store for better use and not trashing it all. But you must be committed to their schedule and collect their bakery goods accordingly. Many times, I cannot

pick up the donation so the task is delegated to someone else who can. If the school is closed, we will still collect the goods and bring them to Broward Homeless Shelters or the Jubilee House.

What is your process for filling out a grant application? First, look at the list of grants available and pick up the best fits your school or club needs. Read all requirements, once and twice again. You must be honest with the request and complete the application to the best of your knowledge. Remember that spelling and grammar is very important, do not be afraid to show it to a friend or co-worker to double check prior to submission.

Do you have any grant writing tips? It is very simple. Grant application is just like your resume, must be honest and to the point. Never ever “create a story” just to receive the funding. Self-motivation is important and your passion to achieve your goals must be expressed while writing the reasons for requesting the funds. Your reputation is valuable more than anything else – never lie about anything nor exaggerated. When applying for a grant for a school’s club – get the student members to be involved in the process and ask them to write why are the ones to be entitled to receive the funding.

Most important – Thank the corporation who provided you with the funding, brag about it in social media. Regardless how small and insignificant your gift was... thank them back kindly. In conclusion – I know I am far from being a great writer, but I am always an amazing listener, eager to learn more about improving my passion in providing for my “babies” the Spartans of Hollywood Hills High School for better community.

What do I do next after receiving an award notification from the funding agency? Contact our department! We will work with your school and the Budget Department to set up the grant account and get your project underway.

Can my school principal sign the grant application form? Principals must sign application forms when their signature is specifically requested.

Can my school principal sign a grant contract, Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) or agreement? No, if the form asks for the signature of the Superintendent, Executive Director, Chief Executive Officer, or Authorized Official, then **only** the Superintendent and School Board Chair can sign. Reach out to GA to request support through the internal contract review, approval and signature process.

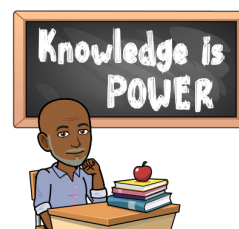

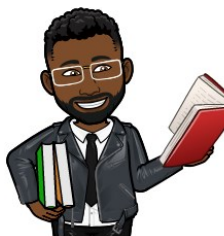

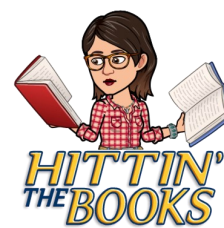
