Grant Development Process and How We Can Help You



- GA can help to develop your idea by facilitating a group brainstorming meeting, conducting a needs assessment, and creating a program plan.
- GA can identify funding opportunities through the Grant Funding Newsletter, donor cultivation and providing individual research.
- GA can work with you to ensure a timely submission, seek School Board review and approval of the grant, and provide editing and writing support.
- GA can help set-up the grant account, support the grant agreement review, approval, and signature process, provide donor stewardship, and support media outreach efforts.
- GA can help you to manage the award by supporting the reporting process.
- If applicable, GA will liaison with the Accounting & Financial Reporting Department for assistance with the final financial report.

South Plantation Wins McCarthey Dressman Teacher Development Grant



Through a grant of \$29,400 from the McCarthey Dressman Education Foundation, South Plantation High School teachers will obtain updated professional development and create a comprehensive Environmental Science Pathway for students. The grant will allow teachers the time to work collaboratively with their peers to identify common student challenges, develop shared goals for the pathway, gain the skills needed to implement these goals, revise and enhance pathway curriculum and lessons, and refine the curriculum based on student outcomes. The teachers will also benefit from an environmental advisory committee to be made up of local,

Grants in the Spotlight



"Two of the biggest problems facing low-performing schools are (a) many children arrive at school each year unprepared for the literacy expectations of their grade level and (b) many teachers are unprepared to address the needs of struggling readers. Past attempts to address these problems have tended to rely on one-size-fits-all curricula, superficial professional development efforts, and supposed quick fixes, none of which have led to sustained changes." (continue reading the full article from the University of Florida Literacy Initiative HERE).

The James Patterson Literacy Challenge at the University of Florida has awarded \$622,000 in-kind services to ten District elementary schools to

address persistent problems in early literacy by working with schools to change their literacy culture. UF will accomplish this through transformative professional learning experiences for teachers and school leaders. Participating schools will be encouraged to adopt evidence-based curricula and methods for literacy instruction and intervention at all grade levels.

In addition, UF will assess each school's needs and work with them to develop a customized literacy acceleration plan. The plan will focus on professional development needs, but they will also address the overall literacy environment (e.g., core curricula, classroom libraries, schedules). Name: Jody Berman, Ph.D.

Position: Teacher – South Plantation High School

Years of service: 13

How many grants have you been awarded and what is the total dollar amount awarded? As an individual teacher at South Plantation High School I have been awarded 2 grants (NOAA Planet Stewards and Broward County Farm Bureau) totaling \$2,750. In collaboration with others on our Magnet team, we were awarded Lowes and Target grants totaling close to \$6,000.

Which grant-supported project is your favorite? Although implementation has not yet begun, I am hopeful that the NOAA Planet Stewards grant will become my favorite. This project is really one of my own design - allowing me to build upon existing initiatives, engage students in service learning, and make a lasting difference for our school, community, and planet.

What is your process for filling out a grant application? I tend to start with the section that focuses on the action part of the grant. Focusing first on what we hope to achieve and why it matters tends to make the rest fall into place much more easily. Once I have a draft I feel is a solid start, I seek input and critiques from peers as this helps to assure that I have answered all of the required questions and that the project that I am describing is as clear as it can be. To me, collaboration is key to developing a good proposal.

Do you have any grant writing tips? The first tip is to make sure that you give yourself enough time to complete the application and have it reviewed by everyone who might have input and/or the responsibility of oversight - this always takes longer than you think and yet is essential to project success. The second tip is is to look for grants to support something you are already doing or that you want to do rather than designing projects to match the funding source - to me this is key to making sure that you can build upon your strengths and interests and making sure that grant projects are enhancements rather than burdens.

Contact our department! We will work with your school and the Budget Department to set up the grant account and get your project underway.

Can my school principal sign the grant application form?

Principals must sign application forms when their signature is specifically requested.

Can my school principal sign a grant contract, Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) or agreement?

No, if the form asks for the signature of the Superintendent, Executive Director, Chief Executive Officer, or Authorized Official, then <u>only</u> the Superintendent and School Board Chair can sign. Reach out to GAGP to request support through the internal contract review, approval and signature process.
