Coral Park Elementary is off to a "KIND" start to the school year. As part of our **#chooseKIND** initiative, our students and staff are being recognized with "KIND Referrals". Anyone can write a KIND referral when they catch someone in the act of demonstrating one of the character traits of kindness, citizenship, self-control, tolerance, responsibility, and honesty. Also, our entire staff is reading the book "Wonder" by R. J. Palacio. A New York Times bestseller, WONDER tells the incredibly inspiring and heartwarming story of August Pullman, a boy with facial differences who enters fifth grade, attending a mainstream elementary school for the first time. The staff has been given the challenge of reading the book and passing it on to a student or another adult when they are done reading it. These are just some of the ways we are working to spread "kindness" and invite our entire Coral Park community to do the same.

The start of the school year also brings the start to many of our additional student programs. We have officially kicked off our Play Pal Program, where we have over 75 third, fourth, and fifth grade students who provide peer mentoring to students in all grade levels who could benefit from additional academic or social support. We have started our Debate Club, as well. We are looking forward to having our 4th and 5th grade students participate in District competitions. We are in the process of establishing our Student Council and Math Club. These programs provide opportunities for our students to develop and sharpen their leadership skills.

# Reading

The CPE teachers and administrators recommend that students are read to or read for at least 20 to 30 minutes daily. Students can choose a book at their independent reading level, a magazine or a newspaper to read.





The teachers and administrators at CPE highly suggest that students practice their math facts daily to ensure fact fluency. Students at the Students at the primary level should be working on addition and subtraction facts, and intermediate level students should be focusing on their multiplication and division facts.



Administration and teachers at CPE suggest that our students utilize i-Ready Reading and Math each week at home for 20 to 30 minutes daily to promote academic success!



# Read about Grade Level Happenings Below . . .

Play Pals began on October 23rd. Our third, fourth and fifth graders have been trained and are very excited to work in our school community with Coral Park's special needs friends.

#### Pre-Kindergarten

During the month of November, we will be continuing our unit of study on "Balls". Children love balls. They play with them in many different ways. The throw them, catch them, kick them, and roll them. Through our investigation of balls the children will learn how natural forces, such as gravity and friction, affect the movement of balls. During this study, we will let the children's interests in balls help them explore social studies and science concepts related to the features and nature of balls, and to use skills in literacy, math, and the arts as they investigate. We also will be discussing families and the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday throughout the month of November. We will continue to practice identifying uppercase and lowercase letters, as well as letter sounds. Many math concepts will be taught and reviewed this month. These math concepts include counting, making sets, making simple patterns, and identifying shapes. Please review these concepts with your child at home. Hooray for Pre-K!

Ms. Soares would like to thank her parents for attending Open House. During the month of November, her students will be focusing on concepts such as, same and different, letters and sounds, matching objects with one to one correspondence, daily routines, and vocabulary.

It is an exciting month in third grade! On November 7th, we are going on a field trip to the Coral Springs Center for the Arts to watch Junie B. Jones. In math, we are moving into division while still working on multiplication facts. Please make sure to study the facts 5-10 minutes daily with your kids. In addition, we are reviewing subtraction with regrouping and rounding to the nearest ten and hundred. In reading, the standards we are focusing on are using text features. In third grade, we study the role text features play in our reading. For example, how do they (text features) relate to the text? Why did the author use this text feature in the text? In closing, please make sure to have your child read at least 30 minutes

#### 4th Grade

For the month of November fourth grade is working on the following:

Reading: The focus in reading will be on vocabulary. Students will be reading both fiction and non-fiction passages, and they will work on using context clues and other strategies to figure out the meaning of unknown words.

Math: We will continue to work on multiplying by one and two-digit numbers and then move on to division, dividing by 1-digit numbers.

Science: We are wrapping up the study of science and will be working on energy.

Social Studies: We are continuing to work on the DBQ - Cabeza de Vaca, How did he

Survive?

Writing: As we wrap up the basic Grammar rules and the DBQ document analysis is complete, students will be working on writing an informational essay. This essay will detail the reasons Cabeza de Vaca survived, with evidence from the documents for support.

The kindergarten classes went on their first field trip in October to Tradewinds Farm. The students had a great time seeing, petting, and learning about the farm animals. In reading, we are continuing to work on identifying the beginning sounds of words. We have now added identifying the ending sounds to words. The students have been progressing nicely with learning their sight words. They are working hard to learn the name and function of the punctuation marks - period, question mark, exclamation mark, and quotation marks. In math, we have been learning about the different ways to represent the numbers 11-20 and comparing them using the terms greater, more, fewer, less, and same as. We are wrapping up our science unit on the practice of science and the five senses and moving onto matter (solids, liquids, and gases). During the month of November, we will be learning about Veteran's Day and Thanksgiving.

As we develop character traits of our students and keeping in line with our "Kindness" theme, the 5th grade team has chosen to spread kindness worldwide. We are working with an orphanage in Haiti, and we will be collecting washcloths, bar soap, and packs of bubble gum to send to the children. Please help us in lead by example in choosing kindness wherever we can. As we continue to identify our students' strengths and areas of growth, we have established a routine of support and enrichment with the following teachers: Mrs. Worthington, Ms. Paul, Mrs. DeRusha, and Mrs. Theriault.

### Our academic focus for November:

Language Art/Reading- We are wrapping up Main Idea & Summarizing, and moved on to Inferencing. Students will be explaining relationships in scientific and historical texts. We are also engaging in novel studies, essay writing, Readworks.org and reading complex texts. Mrs. Letvinchuk is supporting the student's daily needs through a multi-sensory approach that aligns with the Florida State Standards.

Math- We concluded Place Value and Introduction to Decimals. We are deepening knowledge in Decimals by incorporating multiplication and division of decimals.

<u>Social Studies</u>- After studying the regions of the United States, we are continuing their knowledge of the regions with the Native American tribes from those regions. The students will be working on projects to demonstrate their knowledge of the tribes.

Science- We are ending the Water Cycle and progressing into Weather and Climate.

<u>Technology</u>- As part of our Blended Learning Model, we continue to use many digital and

online resources in class. At home, the students are to use the Single Sign-On (SSO) to access; Canvas, NewsELA, Vocabulary.com, iReady, Khan Academy, Discovery Education, myOn, Code.org and Online Textbooks with Resources. We also recommend Study Jams/Scholastic, BrainPop, Xtramath, Digital Readworks.org, National Geographic, and http://www.sheppardsoftware.com/web\_games.htm.

As the holidays in November approach, the 5th grade team would like to wish our students and their families a Happy Thanksgiving. This is a time to be grateful for all that we have and appreciate the little things.

### 1st Grade

This month, first grade will continue to work on the practices of science, which is the practice of asking questions about the world around us, and investigating to find those answers. First grade will enjoy learning an investigation of popcorn and how it changes using our senses. Yay! In Social Studies, our students will be learning a little about the history of the United States as we study Thanksgiving. First grade students are continuing to work on practicing sight words, good readers' strategies, such as get your mouth ready for the first sound and chucking words. While working on comprehension skills, we are asking questions to help students focus on retelling stories with details from the story. While writing, we are practicing sentence structures that tell Who is doing What, Where, or Why. Finally, the students are focusing on addition and subtraction strategies to help solve problems. We are writing equations and understanding that addition means to bring together to make a larger sum. We are also working to building fluency within addition.

Second grade is starting the second quarter by incorporating this season's holidays into our language arts and social studies curriculum. We will be comparing folktales and characters, as we continue asking who, what, where, when, and why questions. We will compare a Native American Cinderella story entitled <u>The Rough Faced Girl</u> to the traditional French version to understand how characters respond to major events and challenges. We will further explore comprehension questions that focus on making a "text to world" connections, as well as concepts like, antonyms and synonyms, contractions, textual evidence, locating facts in non-fiction, using dictionaries, and main idea. In math, we will add and subtract fluently up to 100, and add up to four 2-digit numbers using place value regrouping. We will be able to explain why addition and subtraction strategies work using place value and properties of operation. In science, we will study the Earth's surface and classify soil types including understanding weather patterns and how to prepare for severe weather. The instructional technology program, "Science 4 Us" is up and running. You can access it through the "Broward Single Sign On" using your child's 10-digit "06" number. The password is 123. Continue to read with your child, ask your child to retell the story, use "I-Ready" reading and math at home and practice math fluency facts.

Music

Pre-Kindergarten, kindergarten, and first grade students have been working on steady beat. They are playing rhythm band instruments, such as sticks, shakers, and triangles. They can demonstrate beat competency by doing various movements to music activities. They are also working on their ability to sing a variety of songs alone or with others. Also, second and third graders have been working on their ability to match pitch in order to sing notes in tune. They are beginning to read rhythmic patterns and can demonstrate this by identifying and saying rhythms. They also play the different rhythm patterns on various rhythm instruments, including tubanos and other drums. Additionally, fourth and fifth graders have been working on music literacy by playing tubanos. They are learning the correct drumming technique. They are also learning to play and create a variety of rhythmic patterns.

Art
Pre – K students are exploring colors and shapes. Kindergarten, first, second grade students have been working on cutting and gluing skills, while learning about the artists, Wassily Kandinsky and Georges Seurat.

Third, fourth, fifth grades are collaborating on "Circle Paintings." These group paintings are

being personalized with each student's voice.
