# Applying for Financial Aid & College Admissions Information

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is used by most colleges and universities in the U.S. to determine a student's eligibility for federal, state, and college-sponsored financial aid programs. Undocumented students do not qualify for federally funded scholarships and grants. Undocumented students include DACA recipients and Dreamers.

If you are an undocumented student, make sure you do NOT:

- ▶ Submit a FAFSA form to the government.
- ▶ Provide any false information on applications for college, university, or financial aid.

# Eligibility

What determines eligibility for state and federal financial aid programs is the immigration status of the student, and NOT that of their parents. Therefore, if a student is a U.S. citizen or permanent legal resident but one of more of his or her parents is undocumented, the student is eligible for federal student aid.

Remember:

- ▶ College and university applications will never require students to provide a Social Security Number (SSN); it is optional.
- ▶ A SSN is required to complete the FAFSA. It is against the law for people to use a SSN that is not their own or is false.

Be aware some private scholarships may ask students to submit a FAFSA to prove financial need. You should consult an admissions officer from the college or university you are applying to for advice before submitting any documentation

# A couple of questions to take into consideration:

- ▶ Does applying for an Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) make a student less safe?
  - ▶ ITINs are issued by the IRS to individuals who do not qualify for a Social Security Number (SSN), such as undocumented immigrants and foreign investors. The IRS does not share the information they gather with the Department of Homeland Security. Therefore, applying for an ITIN will not compromise a student's safety. - ▶ Does a student need to come out as undocumented in order to be eligible for resources available to undocumented youth?
  - ▶ No, students do not need to reveal their immigration status to access resources catered towards undocumented youths.
- ▶ What if a financial aid/admissions advisor asks my student to fill out the FAFSA?
  - ▶ If a financial aid/admissions advisor asks your student to fill out the FAFSA and he/she does not have a social security number, he/she can fill it out but SHOULD NOT send it to the government. Remember, undocumented students do not qualify for federal aid and submitting FAFSA forms with false information is against the law.



# Private Scholarships, Colleges & Universities

Many private scholarships are available to undocumented students. These scholarships tend to be highly competitive. It is important that you maintain high grades and participate in extra-curricular activities while in high school so you can distinguish yourself from other applicants when applying for scholarships.

Many private schools are able to provide need-based scholarships and financial aid to students, irrespective of their immigration status. In contrast, public colleges and universities, for the most part, can only provide merit-based scholarships to undocumented students who must compete for the scholarships with the rest of the student body on the basis of their academic achievements and talents. Ask the colleges where you are applying if they offer private scholarships and what the requirements for eligibility are.

You could even ask about what resources are available to undocumented applicants. Research different community centers, churches, and local schools to find out if they offer scholarships. Remember to apply to as many scholarships as possible, no matter how much (or little) the financial award, because scholarship money adds up quickly.

# In-State Tuition Policy

On June 9, 2014, Governor Rick Scott signed HB 851 into law. The bill grants undocumented students out-of-state fee waivers if they meet the following criteria:

- ▶ Attended a Florida secondary school for 3 consecutive years immediately before graduating from a Florida high school
- ▶ Applied for enrollment in an institution of higher education within 24 months after high school graduation
- ▶ Submitted an official Florida high school transcript as evidence of attendance and graduation

A student granted an out-of-state fee waiver is still considered a non-resident student, is not eligible for financial aid, and cannot be reported as a resident for tuition purposes. In addition, this bill also states that a dependent child who is a U.S. citizen may not be denied classification as a resident for tuition purposes based solely upon the immigration status of his/her parent. Unfortunately, federal financial aid is unavailable for undocumented students.

Nineteen states have passed laws that offer in-state tuition rates and grants to undocumented students. States that offer in-state tuition rates for undocumented students in addition to Florida: California, Colorado, Connecticut, Illinois, Kansas, Maryland, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Oklahoma, Oregon, Rhode Island, Texas, Utah Virginia and Washington.

# FLORIDA IN-STATE TUITION LAW FOR UNDOCUMENTED STUDENTS



If you are an undocumented student in **FLORIDA**, or if you have received DACA, this law might allow you to pay fair tuition rates at state colleges and universities.

## WHO QUALIFIES?

Students that attended and graduated from a Florida High School (GED is not eligible) for at least 3 years AND have applied to a higher education institution within 24 months of graduation.

## MYTHS ABOUT IN-STATE TUITION LAW

- 1. Does this mean I am an “in-state student?”** No. You will be categorized as a non-Florida resident with a partial tuition waiver.
- 2. Am I eligible for financial aid?** No. This law DOES NOT grant eligibility for government financial support. Students are encouraged to seek financial aid from private, non-government scholarships.

## HOW?

Your college or university provides an out-of-state tuition waiver so you can pay the same as every other student.

## WHAT'S THE BIG DEAL?

Out-of-state tuition can be more than **DOUBLE** the amount of in-state tuition.

# Scholarship Applications: Tips for Students

## List your accomplishments

Before you start, make a list of your accomplishments you can refer to as clear, concrete examples of your strengths in your essays.

## Research the scholarship

Research the individual or institution offering the scholarship to find out what they look for in applicants. Clearly articulate these qualities in your essays to show you are an ideal and deserving candidate.

## Get to the point!

Answer questions clearly and directly. Adhere to the word and page limits. You may choose to mention your immigration status and the obstacles you had to overcome because of it or explain you are ineligible for federal aid for higher education.



# Scholarship Applications: Tips for Students

## Comb through and edit

Proofread your essays: spelling mistakes and bad grammar are unacceptable. Ask at least two people to read through your work before sending it in.

## Prepare for interviews

Many private scholarships require face-to-face interviews with their applicants. It is a good idea to start practicing public speaking and interview techniques.

## Find an advocate to help you

Many scholarships require letters of recommendation for teachers or counselors. Make sure whomever you ask knows you well and understands your immigration situation.

# Scholarship Applications: Tips for Students

## Is there an appeal process?

If you are awarded a scholarship but the award money is not enough to cover your costs, be aware some scholarships have an appeal process in which you may receive additional aid under special circumstances.



# Further Alternatives for Funding

## Crowd-funding:

Online crowd-funding websites are useful for targeting a large number of people at one time. Most websites allow people to post a short story about themselves and their funding mission to persuade others to support their cause. Students can post a personalized crowd-funding link to their Facebook page, Twitter, and other social media platforms they may use to connect with their friends and family.

## Donation Letters:

Students could draft a donation letter asking family, friends, and local businesses to support them financially and help them achieve their educational goals. Students should specify why they are pursuing higher education, what they hope to do with their education, and outline the financial struggles they foresee as they work towards their degree.

## Private Loans:

Some banks offer private loans to undocumented immigrants. However, these banks typically require qualified undocumented borrowers to have a credit-worthy U.S. citizen or permanent resident co-sign the loan. Students and their families should be aware loans usually come with high interest rates.

# Speaking with Admissions

Speaking directly with an admissions officer or financial aid advisor will be extremely valuable. When calling an admissions or financial aid office, ask if there is a member of staff who specializes in working with undocumented students.

Listed below are some questions you may want to ask:

## Admissions:

- ▶ How should an undocumented student respond to the citizenship question on your application? Should an undocumented student leave the SSN field blank or enter zeros?
- ▶ Can students leave fields blank on your online application or will they need to submit a paper application?

# Speaking with Admissions

## Financial Aid:

- ▶ Are undocumented students eligible for any institutional financial aid? If so, are there any additional forms they need to complete?
- ▶ Do you offer fee or tuition waivers and if so how may students apply for them?
- ▶ How can students qualify for in-state tuition?

# Speaking with Admissions

## Scholarships:

- ▶ Do you offer institutional scholarships for undocumented students? How about private scholarships?
- ▶ What qualifications are needed to apply to these scholarships? Should students submit any additional forms?
- ▶ If a student is awarded a scholarship, what must he/she do to keep it? Will he/she lose the scholarship as a result of poor grades?
- ▶ Are these scholarships valid for the entire duration a student is enrolled at your school? What if a student takes longer than four years to graduate? Do you have any scholarships for transfer students?

# Speaking with Admissions

## Programs of Study:

- ▶ Are there any majors that are unavailable to undocumented students because of their immigration status?
- ▶ Does applying to this school/major require a background check?
- ▶ After graduation, can undocumented students work with this type of degree? Or would they need to get a background check, certificate, or state licensure that they would be ineligible for because of their immigration status?

# Questions to Ask When:

## Completing Applications:

- ▶ Does the application ask for a social security number?
- ▶ If a student does not have a social security number should they use zeros or leave blank?
- ▶ Does the application have an appropriate “box” for an undocumented student on the screen that asks about citizenship?
- ▶ If a student does not/can not answer all the questions on the on-line application will it be submitted or will they need to complete a paper application?
- ▶ Can a student submit an on-line application if they are using a fee waiver?

# Questions to Ask When:

## Researching Colleges & Developing a List:

- ▶ Are there any state laws which bar undocumented students from colleges & universities?
- ▶ Does the college or university admit undocumented students?
- ▶ Does the university require students to submit a social security number and proof of residency?
- ▶ Is there a point person in admissions that the student/counselor can contact with questions?
- ▶ Are other undocumented students enrolled in the college/university?
- ▶ Does the institution have a policy regarding whether or not it will report undocumented students?
- ▶ Will the institution consider undocumented students for institutional or private aid?
- ▶ Is an undocumented student eligible for merit aid?
- ▶ Does the institution offer any special scholarships for international students? Can undocumented students apply?

# Questions to Ask When:

## Applying for Financial Aid & Scholarships:

- ▶ Does the institution require all applicants, even those who are undocumented, to complete a FAFSA in order to be considered for institutional scholarships?
- ▶ Will the institution accept the College Board CSS Profile or an institutional form instead of the FAFSA?
- ▶ What other forms must be completed?

## Considering Majors:

- ▶ Does the major require a background check?
- ▶ Does the major lead to certification or state licensure for which an undocumented student would be ineligible?
- ▶ Are advisors and career development staff aware of these?

You can also narrow your search criteria using the 'Special Circumstances' drop down menu and choose 'Immigrant' or 'International Student'.

## Tip Sheet for Undocumented Students



Undocumented students face unique challenges in their quest to obtain postsecondary education. This tip sheet is designed to help this population with some of the pressing questions they have while contemplating whether or not they can enroll in school.

Question	Answer
1. I just finished high school and want to go to college. Will the fact that I am an undocumented student prevent me from continuing my education?	Generally speaking, your status will not prevent you from being admitted to college or a vocational program, or from enrolling in classes. Your status as an undocumented student limits the type of financial aid you receive and could impact your tuition charges (See Questions 2, 3, 4, 7 and 8 below).
2. I am an undocumented student, but I have lived in the U.S. since I was three years old. Am I eligible for	As an undocumented student, you are not eligible for federal financial aid such as Federal Pell Grants, Federal Work-Study, and Federal Direct Student Loans (Direct Loans). However, you



## College Guide for Undocumented Students.

### How to Fill out the FAFSA as an Undocumented Student

- The FAFSA does not require the citizenship status of the applicant's parents, but does request their SSNs. Applicants must write in "000-00-0000" as the SSN for any parent or legal guardian who is undocumented.
- Applicants will encounter the following question: "Are you a U.S. citizen?" Undocumented students must check the box for "No, I am not a citizen or eligible noncitizen."
- The form also features questions about the "legal state of residence" for the applicant and their parents. The correct answer will vary, as each U.S. state has different requirements for legal state residency. Applicants should consult their high school career counselor before completing this section.
- The online FAFSA form features an IRS Data Retrieval tool that allows applicants to submit their tax information and that of their their parents. If the applicant or their parents did not file an income tax return during the previous year, then tax information may be entered manually.

## Resources for Undocumented Students

Many undocumented students are unsure of how to find free money for college.

When completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at [fafsa.gov](http://fafsa.gov), students must select the option that indicates their citizenship status.

Select U.S. citizen if you are a citizen or U.S. national.

Select Eligible noncitizen if you are:

- A U.S. permanent resident, with a Permanent Resident Card (I-551), or a conditional permanent resident with a Conditional Green Card (I-551C)
- Other eligible noncitizen with an Arrival-Departure Record (I-94) from the Department of Homeland Security showing any one of the following designations: "Refugee," "Asylum Granted," "Parolee" (I-94 confirms that you were paroled for a minimum of one year and status has not expired), T-Visa holder (T-1, T-2, T-3, etc.), or "Cuban-Haitian Entrant"
- The holder of a valid certification or eligibility letter from the Department of Health and Human Services showing a designation of "Victim of human trafficking"
- A resident of the Republic of Palau (PW), the Republic of the Marshall Islands (MH), or the Federated States of Micronesia (FM)
- A Canadian born Native American under terms of the Jay Treaty

Select "Neither citizen nor eligible noncitizen" if you are in the U.S. and have:

- Been granted Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA)
- A F1 or F2 student visa
- A J1 or J2 exchange visitor visa
- A G series visa (pertaining to international organizations)
- Other categories not included under U.S. citizen and eligible noncitizen

## Financial Aid and Undocumented Students

### *Questions and Answers*

---

The questions and answers that follow provide information about student financial aid for undocumented students as well as guidance for a specific group of undocumented students who have received Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA). We have grouped the questions and answers into two categories: "Eligibility for Financial Aid" and "Completing the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA®) Form."

#### **Eligibility for Financial Aid**

**1. As an undocumented student or DACA student, am I eligible for federal student aid?**

No. Undocumented students, including DACA students, are not eligible for federal student aid. However, you may be eligible for state or college financial aid, in addition to private scholarships.

**2. As an undocumented student or DACA student, am I eligible for in-state tuition?**

It depends. In some states, undocumented students, or specifically DACA students, are eligible to receive in-state tuition. Please check with your high school or your college or career school's financial aid office.

This page contains information about financial aid and scholarships for undocumented students and illegal aliens. (The terms "undocumented student", "illegal alien", and "illegal immigrant" are used interchangeably and intentionally in this page to enable this page to be found by students who are trying to find information about scholarships for undocumented students.) This page provides a neutral, objective and comprehensive summary of this topic.

Financial aid is generally not available for undocumented students and illegal aliens. The majority of all student aid, including Federal student aid, requires the recipient to be a US citizen or permanent resident (green card holder) or an eligible non-citizen. There are, however, a few states that allow undocumented students to qualify for in-state tuition rates. There are also several private scholarships available to undocumented students.

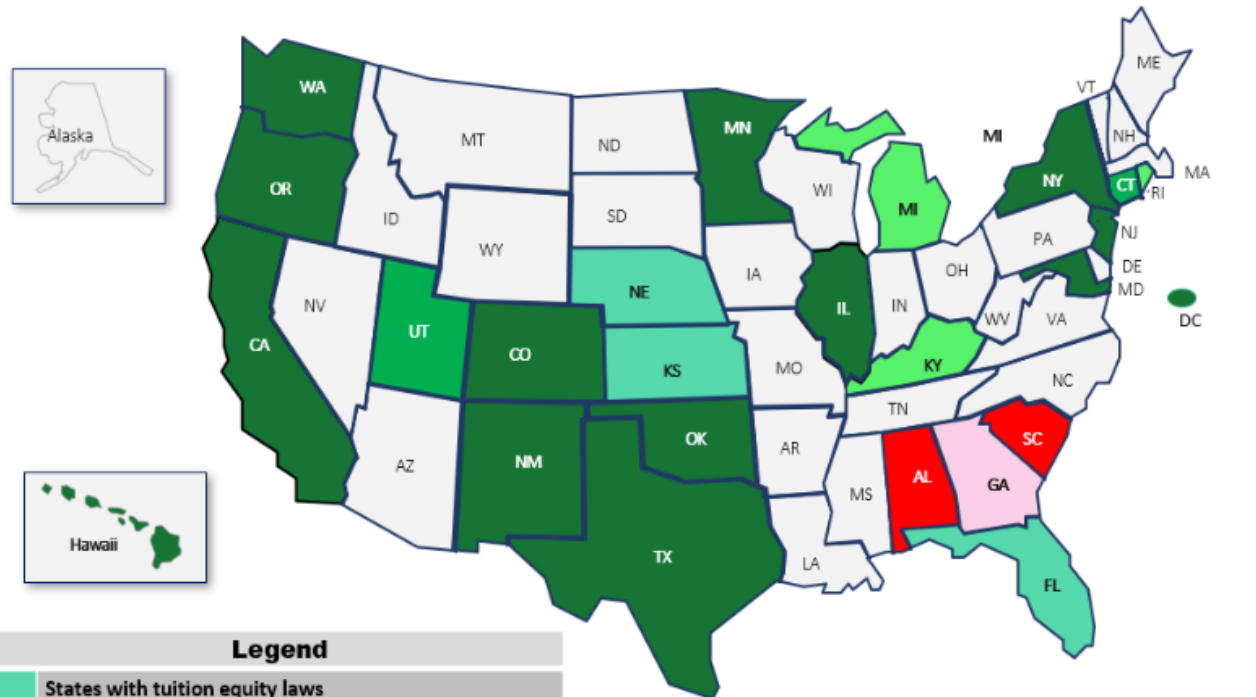



Undocumented immigrants are ineligible for federal funds, but you can still get aid from your university. Some states allow [undocumented immigrants](#) to obtain in-state tuition, and undocumented students are eligible for some private scholarships as well. Some schools even offer aid specifically for undocumented immigrants. Berkeley offers \$1 million in a scholarship fund earmarked for undocumented immigrants.

Texas, California, New York, Illinois, Utah, Nebraska, Washington, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Wisconsin, Kansas and Maryland (only for community colleges) have state laws allowing undocumented immigrants who have attended 3+ years of high school in the state to qualify for in-state tuition. Many more states are considering legislation on the issue, so ask your university if you are eligible for in-state tuition.



# Know Your Rights

Below is information available from [www.aclu.org](http://www.aclu.org) providing some basic ‘Know Your Rights’ information for all immigrants:

- ▶ You have the right to remain silent and you can refuse to speak to an immigration officer
- ▶ You should carry a “know your rights” type of card available at [www.ilrc.org](http://www.ilrc.org) and at [www.aclu.org](http://www.aclu.org) and show that to immigration
- ▶ You should not open the door for unknown parties or law enforcement or Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)
  - ▶ Most federal agents do not carry a warrant
  - ▶ If you are unclear as to who is at the door, ask for warrant and if they don’t have warrant, you do not have to let them in
  - ▶ Do not be duped into opening the door simply because the agent is looking for someone who does not reside at the address or if the agent asks you to come outside

# Know Your Rights

- ▶ You have a right to lawyer and you should ask to only speak to your lawyer
- ▶ You should not sign anything given to you by an immigration officer, without speaking to an attorney
- ▶ You should always carry any valid immigration documentation for US, if you have lawful status such as a student visa, or a green card
- ▶ You should not carry foreign documentation unless that is your only form of identification:
  - ▶ If individual's only form of ID is foreign documentation, individual needs to speak to attorney to weigh pros/cons of carrying sole form of ID vs. not carrying anything and this is case specific
- ▶ As an immigrant, you should:
  - ▶ Create a safety plan and keep immigration documents together. [www.ilrc.org](http://www.ilrc.org) has a good example of a form available in both English and Spanish that can be used for this purpose.
  - ▶ Report and document raids and arrests



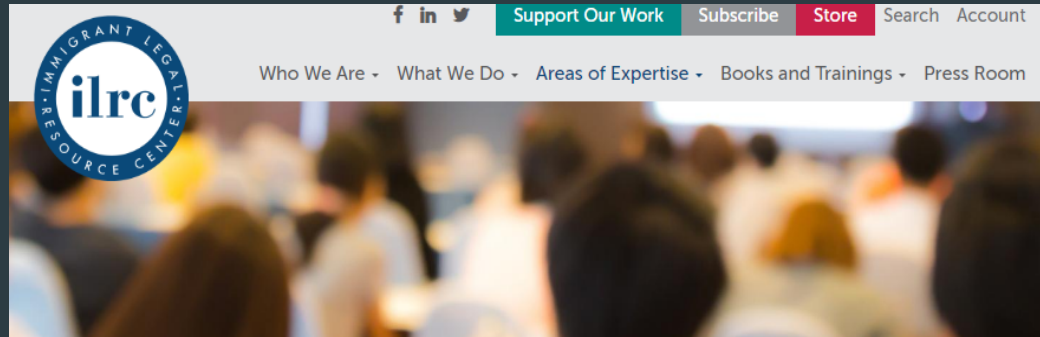

### DACA

Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) is an immigration option for undocumented immigrants who came to the United States before the age of 16. Although DACA does not provide a pathway to lawful permanent residence, it does provide temporary protection from deportation, work authorization, and the ability to apply for a social security number.

As a supporter of immigrant youth, the Immigrant Legal Resource Center (ILRC) has long advocated for policies to benefit the undocumented community. Through this work, the ILRC developed the only comprehensive manual on the topic, *DACA: The Essential Legal Guide*. We conduct trainings and provide technical support to immigration practitioners assisting individuals in the application process, and advocate at the federal level for a broadly inclusive DACA program.

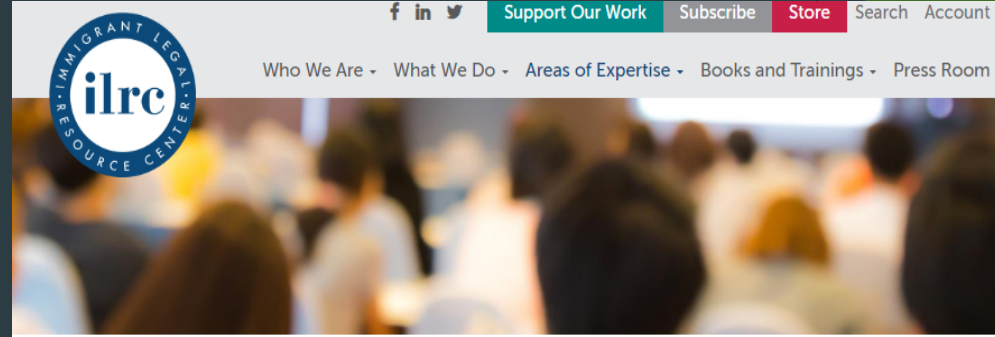

### Public Charge Exemptions and Considerations

Public Charge, Family-Based, Immigrant Youth, DACA, U Visa/T Visa/VAWA

It is important to remember that immigration law and regulations exempt some categories of immigrants from public charge inadmissibility and provide many types of immigration status that are not subject to the public charge ground of inadmissibility. This advisory provides an overview of the exemptions to public charge inadmissibility and the forms of relief a client may seek without being subject to a public charge test. It also discusses public charge issues to keep in mind when advising immigrants who may be considering adjustment of status or consular processing through a family or employer petition after having a status that is not subject to public charge inadmissibility. Understanding these considerations will help advocates best counsel their clients and prepare applications in the current climate of uncertainty surrounding public charge policy.
