Speech Events

- Original Oratory (OO): A self-written moral problem/solution speech limited to 10 minutes in delivery; memorized. May quote up to 150 words (procrastination, stereotypes, etc.)
- Oral Interpretation (OI) also known as Prose/Poetry: A program cut together (printed, published, and publically accessible) one section prose and the other section poetry (7-10 minutes per section). The program is centered on a theme.
- Humorous Interpretation (HI): Using a script or any printed, published and publically accessible material the student must interpret the piece in a humorous way that isn't implied in the original script. 7-10 minutes long, memorized. No props may be used!
- Dramatic Interpretation (DI): (See above)
 Interpreted in an emotional or dramatic way.
 7-10 minutes long, memorized. No props may be used!
- Duo Interpretation: (See DI/HI) must be done with a partner. No props or contact!
- Extemporaneous Speaking (MX): 30
 minutes to prep a new topic given each
 round; either domestic (USX) or international
 (IX) then speak for up to 7 minutes.
 Research required.
- Informative Speaking (INFO): 10 minute memorized presentation written and performed by the student. Delivery must be articulate, engaging, and smooth in a vocal and physical level. The purpose of the event is to educate the audience on a topic of

No Matter What Event...

> You MUST maintain a 3.0 GPA or higher to stay in this class.

> You MUST compete in tournaments!

- Must participate in minimum of 2 competitions per quarter.

Debate Events

- Public Forum (PF): 2 on 2 partner debate. Monthly current event topics.
 Teams prepare research and arguments (prewritten and in rounds) for pro and con. Time requirements of 2 and 4min.
- Lincoln Douglas (LD): 1 on 1 moral and ethical debate. Monthly current event topics. Prepare research and arguments (prewritten and in rounds) for pro and con. Specific time rules.
- Congressional Debate (CD): A mock legislative assembly. 3 minute arguments on multiple current federal legislation. 1 minute questioning.

Other Debate and Speech Events

- Declamation (DEC): 9th/10th grade students recite a pre-cut speech (printed, published, and publically accessible) from memory in an engaging manner. Speeches are up to 7-10 min. and may be shortened due to time constraints.
- Impromptu (IMP): A practice starter event. 7 minutes to write and deliver.
- Big Questions Debate (BQ): A 1 on 1 debate 3-5min. arguments with complex worldview questions.
