## IT'S FANTASTIC IN FIRST GRADE

Welcome to First Grade! We are looking forward to getting to know you and your child throughout the year. But for now, here is a look at what's happening during your child's school day:

In reading, we are learning about strategies that good readers use when coming to a word that is unfamiliar. These strategies included:



- Get your mouth ready for the first sound (onset)
- Look for picture clues
- Blend the sounds together

Please be sure to practice these strategies with your child as you read with him/her daily.

In our journals, we are learning to put ideas into sentences that others can read. We are also working on using capital letters, spaces, and punctuation correctly.

In math, we are learning about shapes, which includes:

- Knowing how many sides and vertices each shape has
- Combining shapes to make a new shape

Every child needs a superhero, and that superhero is... YOU! You are your child's greatest teacher. Here are some ways you can help your child:

- <u>Check the homework folder each night</u>. Please make sure all papers that need a parent signature are returned first day packets have already gone home, and those signed papers need to be returned! Also, please make sure your child's homework (spelling and math) is done daily.
- Make sure your child gets a good night sleep and eats a nutritious breakfast.
- Make sure your child arrives to school on time! We start our day at 8:00am learning grammar and vocabulary, being punctual is very important!
- Make sure your child reads for 10 15 minutes at home every day.
- Continue to help your child become independent with tying shoes and writing his/her first and last name.
- Encourage your child to do his or her best and give praise for all accomplishments and effort.

We need headphones/earbuds! We incorporate technology into our learning, headphones or earbuds are a must. If your child has not brought some, please do so ASAP! Looking forward to a FANTASTIC year!!



## LEARNING IS MY SUPERPOWER!

## SECOND GRADE SPLASH

Welcome 2nd Graders, it is going to be an awesome year of learning. The beginning of the school year, 2<sup>nd</sup> graders will be learning the following standards, skills, and strategies.

## In Reading we will be working on:

- Ask and answer who, what, where, why, and how questions to demonstrate understanding of key details in a text.
- Identify the main topic of a multi-paragraph text as well as the focus of specific paragraphs within the text.
- Describe the connection between a series of historical events, scientific ideas or concepts, or steps in technical procedures in a text.
- Determine the meaning of words or phrases in a text relevant to grade 2 topic or subject area.

## In Language Arts we will be working on:

- Writing sentences with subjects the naming part of the sentence (the who) and predicates – the action part of the sentence (the doing or did)
- Identifying nouns person, place, thing or idea Singular, Plural, Common, & Proper
- Pronouns & Reflective Pronouns
- Writing Narrative text

## In Math we will be working on:

• Number Concepts (odd/even, place value, counting and skip counting)



- Numbers to 1,000 (writing numbers to 1,000, place value, base ten numerals, mentally adding or subtracting 10 or 100)
- Fluently add and subtract within 20 using mental strategies. By the end of Grade 2, know from memory all sums of two one-digit numbers.
- Use addition and subtraction within 100 to solve one-two-step word problems involving situations of adding to, taking from, putting together, taking apart, and comparing, with unknowns in all positions, e.g., by using drawings and equations with a symbol for the unknown number to represent the problem.
- Use addition to find the total number of objects arranged in rectangular arrays with up to 5 rows and up to 5 columns; write an equation to express the total as a sum of equal addends

## In Science we will be working on:

- Discovering the Nature of Science
- Learning about the different kinds of Scientists and the Scientific Method

## Social Studies we will be working on:

 Geography – Using different maps and globes to locate hometowns, Florida, North America and the countries within North America.


## **Parent/Teacher Communication**

## 4TH GRADE CONTINUES IN THE "WRITE" DIRECTION



Fourth grade teachers would like to welcome all our students to an exciting and productive school year full of academic fun and learning. Fourth grade is a significant year for all students. This year your child will acquire skills which compel them to be autonomous thinkers. Some of these skills include summarizing, drawing inferences, generalizing, making connections, and drawing conclusions to describe characters, setting, and events. Teachers are assessing students to gather baseline data that

determined student's instructional level. Below is the academic focus for the month of September.

## Integrated Literacy:

In literacy, students will determine the main idea of a text, explain how details support the main idea by giving a summary. In addition, students will begin writing to inform, using textual evidence to support the main ideas. Furthermore, students will refer to details in a text when drawing inferences from the text. As part of our integrated literacy curriculum students will learn about the Scientific Process, Early Exploration, and Natural Resources of Florida through literacy.

#### Math:

In math, students will be learning place value through the hundred thousand, estimating/rounding numbers, understanding the value of a digit, and algorithms for adding and subtracting multi-digit whole numbers. Additionally, students will learn strategies to solve comparison word problems using addition and subtraction.

The fourth-grade teachers are looking forward to working with your students as we delve into this month's focus. Parents, you are partners in the education of your child! If you have any questions or concern, please contact your child's teacher.

## FIFTH GRADE FOCUS



#### **In English Language Arts:**

For the month of September, students are learning Standards RI 1.1 Inferencing, RI 1.2 Main Idea, and RI 1.3 Explaining the relationships or interactions between two or more individuals, events, ideas, or concepts in a historical, scientific, or technical text based on specific information in the text.

#### In Math:

During the month of September 5th graders are learning Base Ten and Number Sense. They will recognize that a digit in one place, represents 10 times as much as it represents in the place to its right. They will be able to recognize patterns in the numbers of zeros, when multiplying by powers of ten. They will also be able to read, write, and compare decimals to thousands.

## In Science:

Students are going to study the basic properties of matter. They will compare solids, liquids and gases. They will learn about physical and chemical changes, and how temperature affects these changes.

# LITERACY COACH CORNER

Welcome Broadview Elementary Family to the 2019-20 school year! I am honored and excited to be the Literacy Coach at Broadview Elementary School, yet another phenomenal year. My priority is to help all students reach their highest potential in Reading and Writing. To ensure every child rises to his or her full potential, we must have a solid partnership between the home and school. Should you have a Reading and/or Writing concern, please do not hesitate to reach out to me at 754-322-5529.

All parents want their child(ren) to succeed in school. My Literacy Coach Corner is a guide designed to give parents ideas and tips that will improve their child(ren)'s potential for success in school. Solid research shows that children from homes where parents are engaged with their children and their children's schools:

- o Earn better grades
- o Get better test scores
- Enjoy school more

Let's begin with the State Standards. The State Standards are national standards that say what K-12 students are expected to learn in English Language Arts. For older students, the standards expand to include literacy in history/social studies, science and technical subjects. Despite the complexities of the standards, there are several basic ways parents can support their child's learning. The recommendations below line up with the four broad areas of the Florida State Standards:

- 1. Key Ideas and Details
- 2. Craft and Structure
- 3. Integration of Knowledge and Ideas
- 4. Range and Level of complexity.



#### **Key Ideas and Details**

<u>What it means:</u> Your child will be encouraged to carefully read many books and texts. With these texts, your child will be working to understand what is happening, summarize key events or points and recall details important to the story or topic.

<u>How parents can help:</u> After you share a story, talk about important story elements such as beginning, middle and end. Encourage your child to retell or summarize the reading. After reading nonfiction, ask questions about the information, "Is the spider and insect? How is a spider different than an insect?"

## **Craft and Structure**

<u>What it means:</u> The standards within this area (or "strand") focus on specifics within a book, for example an author's specific word choices or phrases. A second emphasis relates to understanding the underlying structure of common types of texts, including storybooks, poems and more.

<u>How parents can help:</u> During and after reading, call attention to interesting words and phrases. This may include repeated phrases, metaphors or idioms ("sick as a dog," "a dime a dozen.") Talk about any new vocabulary and other ways the author used language or words to make the text interesting, informative, funny or sad.

## **Integration of Knowledge and Ideas**

<u>What it means:</u> Within this strand, students will be working to compare details from stories, describe key ideas using details I informational text, and tell how two texts on the same topic differ.

How parents can help: For younger students, encourage your child to describe how the illustrations within the book support the story. For older students, have fun reading different versions of the same fairy or folk tale. Talk about the similarities and differences between the two books. Then switch to nonfiction and read two books on the same topic. Compare the information in each, again focusing on similarities and differences. "Let's look at each book and think about the words used to describe weather. How are the descriptions alike? How are they different?"

## Range of Reading and Level of Text Complexity

What it means: Teachers will be using a variety of techniques to introduce a range of books and other written material that both support and challenge a child's reading level. This may include nonfiction, info-graphics, poetry and more. This will be done with the goal of making sure students understand what they're reading.

<u>How parents can help:</u> Parents can help promote their child's skill while developing their reading stamina (ability to "stick with it."). This means helping them avoid frustration or anxiety about tackling a harder book. Support your reader by talking through some of the things that make a text complex, including multiple levels of inferred information (implied rather clearly stated) or more sophisticated graphics.

Furthermore, research studies have shown that every parent can help their child do well in school. Your parenting practices and the relationship you build with your child's school will help your child succeed. Following are proven practices that can help you get started:

<u>Family discussion of books, newspapers, magazines, and TV programs:</u> Talk with your child about what he or she is reading.

**Encouragement to try new words:** Make a family game out of looking up new words – who can find the newest words in the newspaper, or who can guess the correct meaning of a new word heard on TV before you look it up in a dictionary...

A quiet place to study and read: Find a spot with good light for a reading/homework and/or studying area.

**<u>Be interested, available, and supportive:</u>** Encourage your child to work independently. If your child asks for help, listen and provide guidance, not answers.

<u>Stay informed:</u> If your child is struggling with homework, approach the teachers positively, as a partner, and find out what you can both do to help your child.

## **Activities with Letter Tiles**

Making Words: have your child make as many different words as he/she can. Each time a word is made, have the child write it on a sheet of paper. Have the child say the word as he/she is making it with letter tiles and when he/she writes the word.

<u>Name Game</u> – Have your child make names of family members and friends with the letter tiles. Have him/her read the names. Then mix up the letters and see what other words can be made from the letters.

Alphabetical Order – have your child put a set of lowercase letters in correct alphabetical order.

<u>Making New Words</u> – build several words and show the child how to change, add, or take away a letter or letters to make a new word. Examples are: *cat, can, man, men, met, tap, claps, flaps, flips, flipped, slipped* (notice one letter changes each time to make the next new word).

<u>Rhyming Pairs</u> – make a word such as *cut*. Say the word and have the child say a rhyming word and make it with the letters below the first word.

<u>Crossword Letters</u> – you make a word, and then the child adds a word that starts from one of the letters. The word can go across or down.

<u>Describing Words</u> – make a describing word (*red*, *thin*, *cold*). Then have the child make a describing word and continue taking turns, making as many describing words as you can. Read the words.

- Can also do this with action words (verbs)

<u>Adding Endings</u> – Make an action word such as *read*, *sew*, *plant*. Invite the child to add as many different endings as possible (*reads*, *reading*, *reader*; *sew sewing*, *sews*; *plant*, *planted*, *planting*, *planted*).

<u>Changing Vowels</u> – make a simple three-letter word. Ask the child to change the vowel to make a new word (for example: *cat, cut, cot; hop, hip; hat, hit, hot, hut*).




## MATH CORNER

Welcome back Broadview Elementary students and parents. I welcome you to the 2019-20 school year, I am excited to serve as your Math Coach again this year. Congratulations to our students who worked hard to increase the science and math profociency on last years Florida Standards Assessment test. We increased our school-wide math proficiency to 60% and science proficiency increased from 31% to 40%. We are going to repeat our SUCCESS!!! It is going to be a SUPERHERO year as we learn more about the amazing world of math...we are going to be SUPER MATHEMATICIANS!



Parents you can support your child's learning at home. The three major areas we will focus on improving as Super Mathematicans will be:

1. **Problem Solving**-Problem solving is a fundamental means of developing mathematical knowledge at any level. Problem solving gives students a context to help them make sense out of the mathematics they are learning. Problems can be used to introduce new concepts and extend previously learned knowledge. Below are the school-wide problem steps we will follow at Broadview. Parents please help your students by having them follow these steps when they are problem solving at home.




## "MATH MAKES YOUR LIFE ADD UP!"

2. <u>Fluency</u>-We define math fluency as the ability to perform mathematical problems accurately and quickly. Mathematical fluency is a required component in state educational standards as well as in Common Core standards. Math fluency has four parts to it: accuracy, automaticity, rate, and flexibility. Students can improve their fluency by making or buying flashcards and practice on free websites like xtramath.com, flashcards.com, and I-Ready Fluency. Fluency should be practice for 10- 15 minutes daily.

3. <u>Concrete Representational Representation Model for Math-</u>Concrete Representational Abstract (CRA) is a three step instructional approach that has been found to be highly effective in teaching math concepts. It is known as the "symbolic" stage and involves using only numbers and symbols to solve a math problem. When your child is working at home give them real items they can touch, feel, and count to understand the math they are learning. Seeing math really help children understand the concepts.



Students in math class, please these super math tips.

- ✓ Pay attention when the teacher is teaching. Follow the teacher's steps!
- ✓ Take good notes in your math journal.
- ✓ Ask questions if you do not understand.
- ✓ Read and re-read the examples in the math lessons, follow the steps in the math book.
- ✓ DO YOUR HOMEWORK!!!
- ✓ Try you very best...NEVER GIVE UP!!!!!

## **Back-To-School: Tips for Parents of Children with Special Needs**

- 1. **Organize all that paperwork**. Setting up a binder or folder to keep your child's IEP's, parent conferences and other documents in sequential order can help you stay organized and in the knowing.
- 2. **Start a Communication Log.** Keeping track of phone calls, emails, notes home, and conferences is important. Create a "communication log" for yourself in a notebook that is easily accessible.
- 3. **Review your child's current IEP.** The IEP is the cornerstone of your child's educational program, so it's important that you have a clear understanding of it.
- 4. **Keep everyone informed.** It's important that you and your teacher communicate often.
- 5. **Establish before and after school routines.** Discuss and plan the changes in you and your child's daily routine that are happening with school in session.
- 6. **Attend school events.** Take advantage of Open House, Parent Nights, Title 1 Meetings, and parent teacher conferences to meet the teachers, other staff, students and families. Creating a positive collaborative environment between the school, its staff and your family will benefit your child.
- 7. **Learn your child's log ins for all their academic computer programs.** Broadview students have access to various sites including (depending on grade level) learning .com, I-Ready, and epic reading, etc.

## "SOCIAL WORK IS THE ART OF LISTENING AND THE SCIENCE OF HOPE"



Our goal this year is to ensure that every student attends school regularly. Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and life.

We realize some absences are unavoidable due to health problems or other circumstances. But we also know that when students miss too much school—regardless of the reason – it can cause them to fall behind academically. Your child is less likely to succeed if he or she is chronically absent—which means missing 18 or more days over the course of an entire school year. Research shows:

- > Children chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade are much less likely to read at grade level by the end of 3rd grade.
- > By 6th grade, chronic absence is a proven early warning sign for students at risk for dropping out of school.
- > By 9th grade good attendance can predict graduation rates even better than 8th grade test scores.


Absences add up quickly. A child is chronically absent if he or she misses just **two** days every month!! Clearly going to school regularly matters! We don't want your child to fall behind in school and get discouraged. Please ensure that your child attends school every day and arrives on time. Here are a few practical tips to help support regular attendance:

- Make sure your children keep a regular bedtime and establish a morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and organize backpack the night before.
- Ensure your children go to school every day, unless they are truly sick.
- Avoid scheduling vacations or doctor's appointments when school is in session.
- Talk to your child's teacher(s), the school counselor, or the school social worker for advice if your children feel anxious about going to school.
- Develop back up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call a family member, neighbor, or another parent to take your child to school.




