Holiday greetings! As the year draws to a close, we would like to **THANK** all of you that volunteered your time with us. The most important **Gift is the Gift of Time**. We thank you for time well spent.

Our curriculum team has been working with our teachers and students ensuring that all our students are receiving an equitable education. Students that require additional academic assistance via small group remediation are receiving those services in reading and math. We are in the process of administering our midpoint academic diagnostics for all our students in grade K-5 utilizing I-Ready. The results of the diagnostics will be used to improve the delivery of academic services that we are currently delivering to our students. The diagnostics be will be administered during the week of December 9th. Additionally, our students in grades 3-5 will be taking the Broward Standards Assessment (BSA) that will mimic the Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) in January. Again, the results will assist us in pinpointing those students that require intensive remediation before the administration of the actual state test. The remediation will include attendance in extended learning opportunities such as Saturday Crunch Time Camp, etc.

Your local library is a great source for books and other activities that can be accessed online and in person. 


SUPPORTING THE SCHOLASTIC BOOK FAIR IS A SUPER POWER



PRE-SCHOOL CORNER

Ms. Hayward's and Ms. Lewis' intensive Pre-K classes will be working on the Toy Unit for the month of December. Students will explore toys, cause and reaction, and learn to play functionally with toys. This unit also includes students learning about toy & presents for different holidays (Christmas, Hanukah, and Kwanzaa). They will be exposed to a variety of toys and



games learning to identify and categorize toys. Students will participate in whole group activities that address initiating play, problem solving with peers, sharing, and taking turns.

Practice makes perfect! We are asking that parents continue to help their child to practice writing letters, counting, using books properly, and practice safety precautions when using scissors to cut.

Pre-K specialized classes will be focusing on the Festival of Lights. We will be learning about how different cultures celebrate the holidays. We will be singing songs, engaging in fun activities, and learning interesting facts about each holiday. We will also be reviewing math skills and the last 10 letters learned from prior thematic units.

Head Start classes will continue working on the Clothes Unit. Children show interest in clothes at a very young age. During preschool, students develop distinct preferences for colors, fabrics, and styles. As they learn about clothes, they will use thinking skills to investigate, ask questions, solve problems, make predictions, and test their ideas. You can help your child at home by talking about clothes, examining fabric together, and looking at labels to find out where clothes are made.

Reading/ Language Arts:

Can you believe first semester is over??? We need to make sure that your child is on track and READY for first grade. A top priority is attending school every day and being on time. Please continue to

support your child at home, making sure he/she completes homework and reads a book every night with the support of an adult.



Math:

we will be learning how to subtract, and count objects 10-19 on a ten frame. We will also be reviewing addition facts. Practice with your child to help them fluently adding numbers with sums equal to 5 with & without the use of objects (i.e. cubes, drawing circles, or counting on fingers).

In social studies, your child will be learning about the State of Florida landmarks and holidays people celebrate around the world.

Parents, please check weather each day and help your child dress accordingly. Long navy or khaki pants and a jacket on cold days. <u>Uniforms are required every day.</u>

Other ways to help at home:

December promises to be a short and busy month. Be sure to support your child learning during winter break by:

- Identifying, counting, comparing and writing numbers 0-10
- Learning Shapes
- Recognizing and writing uppercase and lowercase letters
- Identifying beginning, middle and ending sounds in words
- High frequency (sight words)
- Read every night and retell the story (beginning, middle, end of story, characters and setting)

Reading

- Determine the meaning of words and phrases in a text

Math

- Use addition and subtraction within 100 to solve one-two-step word problems involving situations of adding to, taking from, putting together, taking apart, and comparing, with unknowns in all positions, e.g., by using drawings and equations with a symbol for the unknown number to represent the problem.
- Fluently add and subtract within 20 using mental strategies. By the end of Grade 2, know from memory all sums of two one-digit numbers.
- Use addition to find the total number of objects arranged in rectangular arrays with up to 5 rows and up to 5 columns; write an equation to express the total as a sum of equal addends.
- Add up to four two-digit numbers using strategies based on place value and properties of operations.
- Explain why addition and subtraction strategies work, using place value and the properties of operations.



Science

- Compare and describe changing patterns in nature that repeat themselves, such as weather conditions including temperature and precipitation, day to day and season to season.
 - Investigate by observing and measuring that the Sun's energy directly and indirectly warms the water, land and air.
 - Investigate, observe and describe how water left in an open container disappears, (evaporates), but water is a closed container does not disappear (evaporate).
- Investigate that air is all around us and that moving air is wind.
- State the importance of preparing for severe weather, lightning, and other weather-related events.

THIRD GRADE FLIPS FOR SUCCESS

Reading

We are officially in "crunch time" as the end of the year approaches. The students will take the BSA (Broward Standards Assessment) in the

January after winter break. We will use the data to determine areas of strengths and weaknesses for our students. Teachers will form skill groups to target




areas of weakness to ensure that your child is prepared for the Florida Standards
Assessments (FSA) in April. In January, students will be learning about literal and non-literal language in addition to comparing and contrasting two or more literature stories.

Math

We will be finishing our division unit this month. Students need to be able to model division equations and solve them. They also need to be able to solve multistep story problems using addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. When our division unit is over, we will begin our fraction unit. The students need to be able to identify fractions, recognize that a fraction is an equal part of a whole, represent a fraction on a number line, and explain equivalent fractions. We will continue doing timed multiplication tests in January. Most of the students are doing a great job practicing and learning their multiplication facts. All students must do 50 minutes of i-Ready and pass two or more lessons on a weekly basis.

For the month of December our students will be focusing on the following academic skills:

Integrated Literacy:

Fourth graders will be focusing on comparing different points of view from which stories are narrated, including the difference between first- and third person narrations. In addition, students will be able to explain major differences between poems and dramas, as well as, refer to structural elements of a poem and drama. In science, students will be able to describe the changes in the observable shape of the moon over the course of about a month.

Writing:

Our wonderful writers will begin writing 4-paragraph essays, that includes an introduction, two-body paragraphs, and a conclusion. The focus will be on writing informative essays using textual evidence to support the main ideas.

Math:



In Math, the focus will be on fraction equivalence and comparison, as well as, adding and subtraction fractions. Students will learn what a fraction consists of and be able to explain the difference between a denominator, numerator, and equivalent fractions. Furthermore, fourth graders will be exposed to Math on the Spot Videos and will create animated math models.

PARENTS: As a reminder, please have your child access I-Ready Reading and Math to practice skills for at least 20 minutes each night. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact your child's teacher.





FIFTH GRADE FOCUS

ELA

Students are going to analyze multiple accounts of the same event or topic, noting important similarities and differences in the point of view they represent. Our next Standards Mastery Assessment will be on December 13.





Writing

5th graders just finished Informative Writing. We are now moving on to Opinion Writing.

Science

Students are going to investigate and describe some basic forms of energy including light, heat, sound, electrical, chemical and mechanical energy. They are going to learn the difference between insulators and conductors, and how electricity moves in a closed circuit.

Math

5th graders are working adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing decimals.

For this unit, it is imperative that all students master the multiplication facts. There are many free apps that students can download to their computers, tablets, or phones to give them

MUCH NEEDED PRACTICE. Many of our students know their facts, but they need to improve their speed. If they have the app on their phones, have them practice while waiting in line at the stores, or while you are driving. Accuracy and speed are the key.

We are halfway through the school year and Florida Standards Assessment will be here before we know it. During the holiday break, encourage students to get on the computer and practice 20 minutes of I-Ready Reading & Math daily. Have them practice in the morning, when their minds are fresh and clear. They will have the rest of the day to play and enjoy themselves.

READING CORNER

Winter break means a well-deserved reprieve from homework and daily obligations. However, before you know it, the holidays will be over, and it will be back to the bus stop and car loop. To prepare for a smooth re-entry and a successful semester, don't let school skills like reading and writing slide completely during winter break. Try these family-friendly activities to keep skills sharp:



Read for pleasure.

Whether your child is in the mood for holiday stories, winter break provides the perfect opportunity to stash schoolbooks and read for fun. Encourage relatives to give books as holiday gifts or gather somewhere comfortable to take turns reading books.



Make the most of car rides.

Turn the drive to or from a holiday get-together into an opportunity to practice reading strategies and letters and sounds. Don't forget to allow your child to summarize what they've read to you. Ask questions.

By generating questions, students become aware of whether they can answer the questions and if they understand what they are reading. Students learn to ask themselves questions that require them to combine information from different segments of text. For example, students can be taught to ask main idea questions that relate to important information in a text.

Have a family game night.

Chances are many of your family's favorite board and card games reinforce skills such as reading, and writing. Gather the group to play games you usually don't have time for on school nights.

I-Ready

You and your students have a well-deserved break approaching. It's important to rest and reconnect, but there may be time for students to keep the learning going. *I-Ready* can help! Students can continue to work on their lessons, practice fluency with Learning Games, and engage their families in their progress.

Strategies to Help Children Achieve Success at Home


- 1- <u>Watching Television</u>- Explain in one or two sentences what the show was about. What was the lesson learned in the show? Who were the main characters and how did they change from the beginning of the show to the end?
- 2- <u>Making Connections</u>- Connect something that you've read, a song you like, or even a family story told that connects to something that has happened in your own life.
- 3- <u>Playing Video Games-</u> Explain what you did to pass the stage. You can also explain some of the tricks they take to beat the stage faster or some of the problems they are having in winning a stage of the game.
- 4- Listening to Music- Explain what the lyrics of a song mean and how they represent the life of the singer.
- 5- Asking Ouestions- When reading something you enjoy, write down 1-2 questions from the reading that you would like to know more about.
- 6- <u>Point of View</u>- If you and a parent/friend disagree on a topic, ask them to explain their point of view and support with reasons why they are correct. Summarize and recap their point of view, then explain your point of view. Now evaluate who is right and who is wrong? Or explain why both of you are right.
- 7- Making Predictions- Predict what may or may not happen at the end of a TV show. This also works when telling a story about your friend. Ask yourself what might happen to your friend if the story is a pattern of behavior for your friend. Always remember to give detailed examples to support your point of view.
- 8- **Be a Problem Solver-** When a problem arises in your household, whether it be sibling rivalry, or your weekly routines, think of solutions to the problems and discuss possible solutions. Take responsibility for fixing your own problems.
- 9- <u>Nutrition-</u> Encourage yourself to eat 5 small meals a day to keep your brain going and to drink water as it does replenish the body. You need to sleep, eat well, and have daily activity to be successful in school.
- 10- <u>Goal Setting-</u> Set short term and long-term goals for yourself and discover new ways to achieve these goals.



A few tips to remember as you are working to improve your math skills:

- 1. Always use paper and pencil when solving math problems. No EXCEPTIONS!!
- 2. Double-check Your Answers-math is easy to check. Addition check with subtraction. Subtraction check with addition. Multiplication check with division. Division check with multiplication.
- 3. 3rd-5th Take Practice Tests @ fsaassessments.org-One of the best strategies for preparing for the FSA is taking practice tests to familiarize yourself with the structure and content of the test itself. The FSA website provides multiple practice tests and guides you can use to start growing more confident with the layout and general content of the test. Make sure to time yourself and do different problems and prompts to grow your knowledge base.
- 4. Homework Matters-Make sure you are completing your homework every night. The more you practice the more you learn. Make time to practice basic multiplication/division skills 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders. K-2 work on your addition/subtraction skills.
- 5. Believe in yourself!!!! You can do it!!!

Winter break is a well-deserved break for students, teachers and parents. Students look forward to the time off from class, homework, and tests. But within a couple of weeks after their return, all students will be partaking in school wide testing, and by February, it will be district wide. How can you help your child keep their academic skills sharp during the break?

Try these activities with your child:

 Read daily – not just academic books but read for fun. Read a silly holiday story, use character voices

- If you celebrate a gift giving holiday, have your child keep track of who they received gifts by writing a list and then thank you cards later
- Do family game time. Play games where you must count, roll dice, read cards, and/or draw out phrases.
- Have your child get on the computer for at least 15 minutes a day. Your child can practice their grade appropriate skills on I-Ready.com
- Cook with your child. Have them read the recipe, let your older child lead with the cooking while you supervise. Help them with the measurements and the math that is involved (fractions, adding, multiplying, so much math!). Get into the holiday season with some fun holiday recipes.
- Take your child to the library. Not only will they have

 - Keep your child active. Walk the dog, take a run, ride bikes around the block, or even walk around the mall.

 - While driving, engage with your child and come up with a fun, creative story! Prompt them with starting off the story and let them finish it.







What Is i-Ready?

i-Ready is an online program for reading and/or mathematics that will help your child's teacher(s) determine your child's needs, personalize their learning, and monitor progress throughout the school year. *i-Ready* allows your teacher(s) to meet your child exactly where they are and provides data to increase your child's learning gains. *i-Ready* consists of two parts: Diagnostic and Instruction.

The *i-Ready Diagnostic* is an adaptive assessment that adjusts its questions to suit your child's needs. Each item a student sees is individualized based on their answer to the previous question. For example, a series of correct answers will result in slightly harder questions, while a series of incorrect answers will yield slightly easier questions.

i-Ready Instruction provides students with lessons based on their individual skill level and needs, so your child can learn at a pace that is just right for them. These lessons are fun and interactive to keep your child engaged as they learn.

How to Start





- Download the free "i-Ready for Students" app from the App Store. iPads must be compatible with iOS 11 or above, such as the iPad Air, iPad Air 2, iPad Pro, or any other device that meets these requirements: i-Ready. com/SystemCheck.
 - If your child's district/school uses Clever®, download the Clever app from the App Store. Your child should open the Clever app, log in using their district/school portal credentials, and click on the i-Ready icon.
 - If your child's district/school does not use a portal, they should open the "i-Ready for Students" app and log in to i-Ready using the credentials provided by their teacher.
- B From a computer:
- If your child's district/school uses a portal, your child should log in using their district/school portal credentials and then click on the i-Ready icon.

- 3 Start the lesson: Click the green Next Lesson button under My Path or the blue Lesson button under Teacher Assigned (there may not be any blue buttons at this time.) If your child only has a green "Math Diagnostic" or "Reading Diagnostic" button, the Diagnostic assessment is assigned. Your child should not work on their assessment at home.
- Family Center: Click on the top right to visit the i-Ready Family Center for additional information and answers to FAQs.

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Tips to Support My Child's Learning

- Speak with your child about how using *i-Ready* will help them prepare for class work. Also explain that *i-Ready* will show teachers where your child is doing well and which topics need some more review.
- Encourage your child to take each lesson and quiz question seriously. Emphasize "thinking before clicking," because just clicking through will not give teachers an accurate report of what your child knows.
- · Encourage your child to use the tools that appear at the bottom of the screen in some lessons.

- Learning Games: If your child's school has access to Learning Games, which provide mathematics fluency and skills practice, they can click the Learning Games icon on the bottom right. Your child should play games for roughly 20 minutes per week. Ask your child, "What game are you playing?", "Why?", "What are you learning about?", or "How does this game relate to your learning goals?"


