Dear Broadview Families,

Happy New Year! Our students recently completed I-ready Diagnostic#2 in reading and math. The diagnostic results will be utilized as an interim assessment to pinpoint our students' academic strengths and weaknesses. The results are used to provide additional academic support as needed. During the 2nd and 3rd week of January, students in grades 3-5 will be taking the Broward Standards Assessment (BSA). This computer-based assessment will mimic the upcoming Florida Standards Assessment (FSA) to see how well students are mastering the state's academic standards for their grade level. Our staff will use the data from these two important assessments to remediate students based on their academic deficiencies. We will also use the results to invite *selected* students to Saturday school, which will begin shortly.

It is very important that students are reading when not in school. Parents play a very important part of this effort. Research supports the premise that students that are reading (or being read to) at home are more successful in school. Also, please continue to use I-ready at home. It is recommended that students complete a reading and math lesson every night. In the area of math, it is recommended that students are learning their times tables using I-ready Learning Games, multiplication flashcards (\$1 at Dollar Tree), and online flashcards (Xtramath.com). This will increase their math fluency, thus making them more successful on solving challenging math word problems and real-world application problems.

Tardiness continue to be a huge issue for our students. Late or absent students are missing critical morning/class work and interrupts classroom flow. Please try to get students to school on time. School is a child's first job and can develop a habit of timeliness that lasts a lifetime.

PRE-SCHOOL CORNER

Ms. Hayward and Ms. Lewis' classes are working on the Home and Family Unit for the month of January. The Home and Family Unit provides the preschool child with a means to develop an awareness of his/her physical and social environment. Students will categorize household items and identify common household items and their function. Students will be working on a different letter each



week according to the letter people curriculum. Our students will also be continuing with concepts of print, making and recognizing patterns identifying letters, letter sounds, and sounding out consonant-vowel-consonant words.

Head Start classes will start an investigation unit featuring Pets. Whether your child has a pet of their own, or just one that they fantasize about, they're sure to love studying about them! In addition to various developmental objectives in language, literacy, and math, this unit promotes preschool science knowledge in the category of Life Science (life cycles, attributes of living things, needs of living things, etc.) Ms. Thomas' and Ms. Burciaga's Pre-K specialized classes will be focusing on the letters and sounds O, C, E, and Y. The instructional Unit will cover Health and Nutrition. We will be learning about why is important to stay healthy, what foods are good for us, why should we exercise, and why should we stay clean. Dear Parents.

Welcome back to school, we hope you had a restful and enjoyable break. At this point in the school year, your child should have mastered the following the skills:



- Capital and lowercase letter recognition (all 52 letters)
- Letter sound recognition (all 26 letters)
- Number Recognition (0-20)
- Number Word Recognition (0-10)
- Identifying beginning and ending sounds in words
- Handwriting (neatly on the line)

If they are having trouble with these skills, please contact your child's teacher immediately:

Skills we are currently working on:

- Identifying, counting, comparing and writing numbers 0-20
- Subtraction and Number 10-20
- Positional Words
- Sight word recognition
- Identifying middle sounds in words
- Blending C-V-C Words (3 letter words i.e. pig, cat, dog)
- Reading Comprehension (independent reading and listening comprehension)



HAVE A SUPER NEW YEAR!

Reading/ Language Arts:

This month your child will be given a Benchmark Assessment test (BAS) test. This test requires your child to read a book independently then be able to answer questions about the story. For your child to move to the next reading level, he/she needs to show satisfactory reading comprehension of the book. The end of the year goal is for your child to be at a BAS level D. Keep working on those reading skills!

Math:

In Math we will be learning how to subtract, and count objects 10-19 on a ten frame. We will also be reviewing addition facts, so your child is fluent with adding numbers with sums equal to 5 without the use of objects (i.e. cubes, drawing circles, or counting on fingers).

We will be having an in-house visit from Wild Animal World. Check for permission forms. As always, do not hesitate to contact your child's teacher with questions or concerns.

New Year, New Learning!!


By the end of the year, you can expect your first-grade child to:

- Work independently at her desk
- Listen to longer sets of directions
- Read directions off the board, although some children may still have difficulty with this
- Complete homework and bring it back the next day
- Sit in a chair for a longer period
- Be able to see things from another person's point of view so you can reason with your child and teach her empathy
- Relate to and repeat experiences in greater detail and in a logical way after listening
- Problem-solve disagreements
- Crave affection from parents and teachers
- Have some minor difficulties with friendships and working out problems with peers
- Distinguish left from right
- · Be able to plan ahead
- Write and spell untaught words phonetically
- Read and write high-frequency words such as where and every
- Write complete sentences with correct capitalization and punctuation
- Understand and use correctly conjunctions and prepositions, such as but and beyond
- Read aloud first-grade books with accuracy and understanding
- Tell time to the hour and half-hour using analog and digital clocks
- Quickly answer addition problems with sums up to 20
- Quickly answer subtraction problems with numbers 0 to 20
- Complete two-digit addition and subtraction problems without regrouping

Science



- Compare and describe changing patterns in nature that repeat themselves, such as weather conditions including temperature and precipitation, day to day and season to season.
- Investigate by observing and measuring that the Sun's energy directly and indirectly warms the water, land and air.
- Investigate, observe and describe how water left in an open container disappears, (evaporates), but water is a closed container does not disappear (evaporate).
- Investigate that air is all around us and that moving air is wind.
- State the importance of preparing for severe weather, lightning, and other weather-related events.




Reading

We are officially in "crunch time" as the end of the year approaches. The students will take the BSA (Broward Standards Assessment) in the January after winter break. We will use the data to determine areas of strengths and weaknesses for our students. Teachers will form skill groups to target areas of

weakness to ensure that your child is prepared for the Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) in April. In January, students will be learning about literal and non-literal language in addition to comparing and contrasting two or more literature stories.






multistep story problems using addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. When our division unit is over, we will begin our fraction unit. The students need to be able to identify fractions, recognize that a fraction is an equal part of a whole, represent a fraction on a number line, and explain equivalent fractions. We will continue doing timed multiplication tests in January. Most of the students are doing a great job practicing and learning their multiplication facts. All students must do 50 minutes of I-Ready and pass two or more lessons on a weekly basis.

Wow, 2019 sure flew by! The fourth-grade teachers are excited to welcome back fourth graders and wish you all a Happy and Prosperous 2020.

Throughout the month of January students will be focusing on the following skills:

Integrated Literacy: Fourth Graders will move into the third quarter using the knowledge they have already learned. Fourth graders will be focusing on describing the overall text structure of events, ideas, concepts or information in a non-fiction text or part of a non-fiction text. They will learn the following:

- Identify and describe the features of cause-effect text structure
- Identify and describe the features of compare & contrast text structure
- Identify and describe the features of a chronological text structure,
- Identify and describe the features of problem and solution text structure

They will also learn how to compare and contrast firsthand and secondhand accounts of the same event. In Science, students will compare and contrast the major stages in the life cycles of Florida plants and animals, such as those that undergo incomplete and complete metamorphosis, and flowering and porflower.

undergo incomplete and complete metamorphosis, and flowering and nonflowering seed-bearing plants.

Writing: Fourth Graders will continue writing 4-paragraph essays, that includes an introduction, two-body paragraphs, and a conclusion. The focus will be on writing informative essays using textual evidence to support the main ideas.



Math: In Math, students will apply knowledge of previous taught standards which focused on fraction equivalence and comparison to add and subtract fractions with like denominators. Furthermore, students will learn to multiply fractions by whole numbers.



Update: The second payment window for the end of year fieldtrip is now open and ends on February 14th, 2020. Students who have paid the first deposit, 2nd payment due is \$70.00. Parents: As a reminder, please have your child access I-Ready for Reading and Math for at least 20 minutes each night to practice skills. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact your child's teacher.



FIFTH GRADE FOCUS

New Year, New Learning! This month all fifth-grade classes will be focusing on the following standards:

RL 2.4- Determining the meaning of words and phrases as

they are used in a text, including figurative language such as metaphors and similes

RL 2.5- Explaining how a series of chapters, scenes, or stanzas fits together to provide the overall structure of a story, drama, or poem.

RL 2.6- Describing how a narrator's or speaker's point of view influences how events are described.

Please make sure that your child is completing their weekly homework packet that is given out on Mondays and due on Fridays and twenty minutes of nightly reading or I-Ready reading to help increase reading comprehension and improve vocabulary skills. Students will take reading assessments for Standard Mastery on January 27, 2020 and re-assessments will be given on January 30, 2020 for students who score below 60%.


We are still focused on Opinion Writing and diligently working to improve student's writing skills. The reading homework that goes home every week has an essay portion and it is important that students are practicing their writing skills to prepare for the end of year FSA writing test.

In Math, we will be learning multiplication/division of fractions during the first part of the month. Then we will be learning to converting units of measurements. Please make sure that your child is completing math practice homework nightly and twenty minutes of I-Ready Math.

In Science, we are currently learning about weathering and erosion. Then we will be learning about the Water Cycle and factors influencing the Weather.

Happy New Year! Now that winter break is officially over, and we are back to the bus stop and car loop, here are a few suggestions on how to help close the two-week instructional gap. To prepare for a smooth re-entry and a successful semester, don't let school skills like reading and writing slide completely. Try these family-friendly activities to keep skills sharp:





Read for pleasure

Whether your child is in the mood for holiday stories, winter break provides the perfect opportunity to stash schoolbooks and read for fun. Encourage relatives to give books as holiday gifts or gather somewhere comfortable to take turns reading books.

Make the most of car rides

Turn the drive to or from a holiday get-together into an opportunity to practice reading strategies and letters and sounds. Don't forget to allow your child to summarize what they've read to you. Ask questions.

By generating questions, students become aware of whether they can answer the questions and if they understand what they are reading. Students learn to ask themselves questions that require them to combine information from different segments of text. For example, students can be taught to ask main idea questions that relate to important information in a text.

Family game night

Chances are many of your family's favorite board and card games reinforce skills such as reading and writing. Gather the group to play games you usually don't have time for on school nights.







- Bring at least two pens/pencils with good erasers.
- Keep a positive attitude throughout the whole test and try to stay relaxed; If you start to feel nervous take a few deep breaths to relax.
- Keep your eyes on your own paper.
- Do the easiest problems first; Don't stay on a problem that you are stuck on, especially when time is a factor.
- Pace yourself and don't rush;
- Be sure to read the entire passage and pay attention to the details.
- Always read the whole question carefully.
- If you don't know an answer, skip it and come back to it later.
- Don't worry if others finish before you; Focus on the test in front of you.
- If you have time left when you are finished, look over your test; Make sure that you have answered all the question and only change an answer if you misread or misinterpreted the question because the first answer that you put is usually the correct one.

What Is i-Ready?

i-Ready is an online program for reading and/or mathematics that will help your child's teacher(s) determine your child's needs, personalize their learning, and monitor progress throughout the school year. *i-Ready* allows your teacher(s) to meet your child exactly where they are and provides data to increase your child's learning gains. *i-Ready* consists of two parts: Diagnostic and Instruction.

The *i-Ready Diagnostic* is an adaptive assessment that adjusts its questions to suit your child's needs. Each item a student sees is individualized based on their answer to the previous question. For example, a series of correct answers will result in slightly harder questions, while a series of incorrect answers will yield slightly easier questions.

i-Ready Instruction provides students with lessons based on their individual skill level and needs, so your child can learn at a pace that is just right for them. These lessons are fun and interactive to keep your child engaged as they learn.

How to Start





- Download the free "i-Ready for Students" app from the App Store. iPads must be compatible with iOS 11 or above, such as the iPad Air, iPad Air 2, iPad Pro, or any other device that meets these requirements: i-Ready. com/SystemCheck.
 - If your child's district/school uses Clever®, download the Clever app from the App Store. Your child should open the Clever app, log in using their district/school portal credentials, and click on the i-Ready icon.
 - If your child's district/school does not use a portal, they should open the "i-Ready for Students" app and log in to i-Ready using the credentials provided by their teacher.
- B From a computer:
- If your child's district/school uses a portal, your child should log in using their district/school portal credentials and then click on the i-Ready icon.
- If your child's district/school does NOT use a portal, your child should visit i-Ready.com and log in to i-Ready directly on a computer using the credentials provided by their teacher.

For student security purposes, usernames and passwords are managed by your child's school/district. Please contact your child's teacher/school if your child cannot log in successfully.

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- 3 Start the lesson: Click the green Next Lesson button under My Path or the blue Lesson button under Teacher Assigned (there may not be any blue buttons at this time.) If your child only has a green "Math Diagnostic" or "Reading Diagnostic" button, the Diagnostic assessment is assigned. Your child should not work on their assessment at home.
- Family Center: Click on the top right to visit the i-Ready Family Center for additional information and answers to FAQs.

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Tips to Support My Child's Learning

- Speak with your child about how using *i-Ready* will help them prepare for class work. Also explain that *i-Ready* will show teachers where your child is doing well and which topics need some more review.
- Encourage your child to take each lesson and quiz question seriously. Emphasize "thinking before clicking," because just clicking through will not give teachers an accurate report of what your child knows.
- · Encourage your child to use the tools that appear at the bottom of the screen in some lessons.

- Track and celebrate your child's progress. (Your child should aim for 45 minutes of *i-Ready Instruction* per subject per week and maintain a range of 30–49 minutes of Online Instruction while passing at least 70 percent of lessons. Your child's school may have varying guidance.)
- Contact your child's teacher about how often your child should practice at home, or with any other
 questions about i-Ready.

Discussing i-Ready Data with Your Child

- 1 My Progress: Ask your child to click on My Progress at the bottom of the home page.
 - Consider asking general questions such as, "How is i-Ready going?", "What are you learning about?", or "What are you working on?"
- Lesson Stats: This section shows your child stats about their online lessons.
 - Time-on-Task: Look at the number of minutes your child has spent this week on Online Instruction.
 Consider asking, "Have you met your goal?"
 - Lessons Passed: Look at the total number of lessons your child has passed this school year.
 Consider asking, "What is your goal?" or "What are you proud of?"



- **3 Lesson Streak:** See how many lessons your child has passed in a row. Congratulate them and ask about what they are learning.
- Completed Work: Ask your child to click on Completed Work.
 - You will see lesson names and quiz scores. Consider asking, "What did you learn in ____ lesson?", "What did you enjoy?", "What did you find challenging?", or "How do these lessons relate to your learning goals?"
 - You might also see your child's last Diagnostic score. Consider asking, "What were your strengths?", "What are your areas for growth?", or "What are your goals?"
- Learning Games: If your child's school has access to Learning Games, which provide mathematics fluency and skills practice, they can click the Learning Games icon on the bottom right. Your child should play games for roughly 20 minutes per week. Ask your child, "What game are you playing?", "Why?", "What are you learning about?", or "How does this game relate to your learning goals?"


