As many of you are already aware our school has been assigned a School Campus Monitor (Guardian) to monitor our perimeter cameras and access points. We will continue to conduct monthly evacuation and lockdown drills as a component of our safety plan, in case of emergencies. Our children are also working on becoming more independent with skills such as dressing, feeding, & age-appropriate chores. How can we work together at school?* These questions are helping the children adjust to the routines and expectations at school, as well as to guide their social development.

We are very excited to be working with you and your child this year!

Ms. Hayward and Ms. Corley's ESE Intensive classes are working on the Clothing/Halloween Unit for the month of October. Now that students have learned about body parts and movement of body parts, they will dress the part for dramatic play! We are also working on the letter people curriculum.

Kindergarten is off to a great start! Here's what we have been learning:

Reading: Phonics: Letter recognition and beginning sounds **Phonemic Awareness:** rhyming words and syllables Vocabulary words, sight words and listening to stories. Students are learning to ask and answer questions about the stories been read to them.

At home you can help your child learn their letters and sounds using alphabet flash cards, magazine, books or any print you can find around the house. Students can point to objects at the supermarket or around the house, and ask your child what letter the object begins with. Play rhyming games with your child while driving or walking to school. Use flash cards to practice sight words.

Math: Number recognition 0 to 20, counting with one to one correspondence and writing numbers correctly on the line. Recognizing more (greater), less (fewer) and same. Ways to help at home: Allow your child to practice writing the numbers with pencil, crayons, markers and even shaving cream to make it more exciting.

Science: Weather and Seasons Tips for success:

1. Ensure that your child arrives to school by 7:55am, 7:15 if they are having breakfast in the cafeteria.

2. Make sure your child completes homework on a daily basis as it reinforces what is being taught in class.

3. Read to your child every night for 15 minutes. Ask questions about the book, such as what happened in the beginning, middle and end of story? Who were the characters? What was the setting? How are you the same or different as the character of the story? Why do you think the author wrote this book?

It's Fantastic in First Grade!

We are excited to have so many first graders who are enthusiastic about reading! Keep your child interested in reading by providing a variety of books at home to choose from. Your local library is a great resource for books. Make sure your child is reading to you for at least 15 minutes each day.

We're memorizing our math facts! Students must be able to add and subtract basic math facts quickly and accurately. These are tested weekly so please practice at home. Throughout the month of October, we will be memorizing the +1, +2, and +3 math facts. Make math fun! Practice these addition facts in the car. Challenge your child to answer faster each time.

We have our sight on the standards, in class and in our homework assignments! Please remember that the homework is for the students to practice their reading, writing, and math skills. If the work is challenging for your child, walk them through how to do it, but please do not do it for them. It's important that our students start thinking through their work on their own.

What should your first grader be able to do? Take a look at the list below:

- Say all the letter names and sounds quickly and accurately.
- Read sight words on a pre-primer and primer list.
- Count to 50 without stopping.
- Write his/her first and last name properly.
- Know his/her birthday.
- Tie his/her own shoes.
- Pack his/her own backpack for school.

If your child cannot do any of these, please work on them at home daily. YOU are your child's GREATEST teacher!!!

This month we focus on Responsibility as the Character Trait, which means to meet obligations by being reliable, accountable, and dependable to self and others.

Here are some fun activities to do as a family that focus on Responsibility:

- Have your child share with you about times they are responsible. Be sure to emphasize that being responsible requires knowing what is expected and not making excuses
- 2. Share with your child about something you did that required responsibility
- 3. Volunteer as a family to do a community service project together. Remember that the best teaching tool is to always model the behavior you want your child to learn

Not only are these ways to practice the Character Trait of the month, but they're a great way to build togetherness. By talking about responsibilities with your child, it will encourage them to show responsibility on a daily basis. Another focus for the month of October is Classroom Guidance lessons. Second Grade Splash

In Reading

- Ask and answer such questions as who, what, where, why, and how to demonstrate understanding of key details in a text.
- Recount stories, including fables and folktales from diverse cultures, and determine their central message, lesson, or moral.
- Describe how characters in a story respond to major events and challenges.

In Language Arts

- Writing sentences with subjects the naming part of the sentence (the who) and predicates the action part of the sentence (the doing or did)
- Reviewing Nouns common, proper, plural
- Identifying Verbs linking, action, irregular
- Writing Narrative text

In Math

- Use addition and subtraction within 100 to solve one-two-step word problems involving situations of adding to, taking from, putting together, taking apart, and comparing, with unknowns in all positions, e.g., by using drawings and equations with a symbol for the unknown number to represent the problem.
- Fluently add and subtract within 20 using mental strategies. By the end of Grade 2, know from memory all sums of two one-digit numbers.
- Use addition to find the total number of objects arranged in rectangular arrays with up to 5 rows and up to 5 columns; write an equation to express the total as a sum of equal addends.



In Science

- Recognizing and explaining that living things are found all over Earth, but each is only able to live in habitats that meet its basic needs.
- Compare changing patterns that repeat themselves such as weather conditions including temperature and precipitation, day to day, season to season.
- Investigate by observing and measuring, that the Sun's energy directly and indirectly warms the water, land, and air.
- Investigate, observe and describe how water left in an open container disappears (evaporates), but water in a closed container does not disappear (evaporate).
- Investigate that air is all around us and that moving air is wind.
- State the importance of preparing for severe weather, lightning, and other weather related events.

In Social Studies

• Geography – Using different maps and globes to locate hometowns, Florida, North Americana and the countries within North America.

What we are learning:

Parents,

Reading aloud to your child can be one of your best parenting experiences! I hope that you and your child create many loving memories as you explore children's books together.

Here are a few tips to keep in mind:

- Don't wait until you think your child is "old enough" to be read to. You both can enjoy this experience sooner than you think!
- Make reading aloud a daily habit! It's a wonderful routine to help your child prepare for bedtime. Like all habits, this one may take a while to get established, but hang in there until it's a daily routine.
- Try to select an enjoyable core of books your child can choose from. Do they have bright, colorful pictures? Does the language flow in an enjoyable way as you read it, or does it sound unnatural and halting? Are the stories about topics your child might be interested in?
- Remember to keep it fun! Try to allow your child to select books to read. Your child will gain a lot from repeated readings – both emotionally and in preparation for his or her own reading development.

Remember, literacy begins at home! Literacy is something that is learned through reading, writing, listening, and speaking, and is enhanced by the constant practice of these abilities. I believe that all students can learn, and it is with the continuous effort, assistance, guidance, and encouragement from school and our community that will help each child reach their full potential. With help from everyone, your child will grow to be a lifelong learner.





Fourth Grade Focus

Integrated Literacy:

Fourth graders are becoming voracious readers as they review concepts such as finding the topic, main idea, and supporting details of a passage. Students have been learning to determine cause and effect relationships across historical, technical, and scientific text. Students will begin to learn that story structure is important to the audience and author along with determining the theme within a text. They will be able to analyze characters and their changes throughout the story by explaining how the character's thoughts, feelings, and actions contribute to the plot. Through science content, students will learn about the states of matter, how to measure and compare objects and materials based on their physical properties including, mass, shape, volume, color, hardness. In writing, student's instruction will continue to focus on writing 5-paragraphs informational essays using textual evidence to support their main ideas.





Math:

The students will be reviewing strategies on how to multiply a whole number up to four digits by a one-digit number, and multiply two two-digit numbers. This includes students illustrating and explaining their calculation by using equations, rectangular arrays, and/or area models. Students will begin working on investigating factors, multiples of whole numbers between 1 and 100, and how they are related. They will be using strategies such as, making a list and using models to demonstrate their knowledge. In addition, students will also learn about prime and composite numbers, as well as number patterns.



As your math coach, I want all students to become outstanding math students. Here are some tips to becoming a better math student.


- 1. Listen carefully when the teacher is explaining.
- 2. Follow the same steps as the teacher.
- 3. Read all directions and problems carefully. Re-read if necessary.
- 4. Write neat and show all work.
- 5. Ask question if you don't understand.
- 6. Master basic addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts. Write or buy flash cards for mastery.
- 7. Do your homework every night!!! No excuses!!
- 8. NEVER GIVE UP! KEEP TRYING and TRYING!!

Fifth Grade Focus

Reading/Writing- As a result of finding each students BAS level, we have started individualized instruction based off of your child's reading level. Each student has an assigned novel that he or she should be reading nightly in addition to completing homework. Students with access to computers and internet at home should be spending time nightly on I ready. A writing baseline test was given to assess each students starting point in the writing process. Please be aware and on the lookout for SWAG folders with your child's test scores. Pleas review your child's reading and writing homework as well.



Math/Science- Our 5th grade students have been working hard at transitioning into the 5th grade curriculum. In math, we have taken two Standards Mastery Assessments. The first was on place value and powers of ten, and the second was on reading, writing and comparing decimals, as well as rounding decimals. Please look for the scores in your child's yellow SWAG folder and sign in the parent initials box. In science, we have been studying physical science. We started with properties of matter, transitioned into mixtures and solutions, and ended with physical and chemical changes. It is imperative to your child's success that they are completing their science homework nightly and reviewing their notes in their notes in their notes.

Each night in Science and Math your student will have homework. Please ask to see it and review it with him or her.

Exceptional Student Education Updates

A Look at Language Impairments

A Language Impairment is a disability that interfere with communication, adversely affect performance and/or functioning in the student's typical learning environment. A language impairment is not primary the results of factors related to chronological age, gender, culture, ethnicity or limited English proficiency.

How Does this Affect the Student in School

- Communicating effectively with peers and teachers
- Participate in classroom
- Difficulty with listening comprehension and/or oral expression
- Challenges in reading, writing or spelling

How Can I Help my Child with a Language Impairment?

- Focus on interactive communication
- Reinforce communication attempts when the student is non-verbal or emerging verbal
- Paraphrase and repeat
- Work at the child's pace
- Present only one concept at a time

A Letter from the Superintendent

Dear Parents, Guardians and Students,

The safety and security of our students, staff and schools remain the highest priorities for Broward County Public Schools (BCPS). We encourage everyone to 'say something if you see something' because the safety of our schools is the collective responsibility of the entire community. We want to make you aware of a couple of resources that have been developed to improve public safety by allowing individuals to report potential threats and suspicious activity. These free mobile phone apps are both available for download on Apple's App Store and Google's Play Store.

The first resource is the SaferWatch app. This app, supported by the Broward Sheriff's Office, allows individuals in Broward County the ability to communicate with law enforcement seamlessly and report potential threats and suspicious activity. Visit https://www.saferwatchapp.com/broward/ for more information about the SaferWatch app.

The second resource for reporting safety and security concerns is the FortifyFL app. FortifyFL allows individuals to instantly report suspicious activity to appropriate law enforcement agencies and school officials. For more information about the Fortify FL app, visit https://www.getfortifyfl.com/
