

Benefits of the AP Program

AP provides students the opportunity to take university- level classes while still in high school.

AP courses develop college level academic skills by digging deeper into subjects, requiring students to hone their time management and study skills while tapping into their creativity and problem-solving skills.

College credit is awarded if the student passes the AP exam with a 3 or higher.

AP credits are accepted internationally. Always check with potential colleges prior to taking classes.

AP courses stand out in the college admission process because they demonstrate academic rigor.

AP Scholar Granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams.

AP Seminar and Research Certificate is granted to students who earn scores of 3 or higher in both AP Seminar and AP Research.

AP Capstone Diploma is awarded to student who earn scores of 3 or higher in AP Seminar and AP research and four additional AP exams of their choosing.

AP Offers additional quality points in the weighted GPA

Passing score on AP US History or AP Government exam may be used to meet the new Civics graduation requirement.

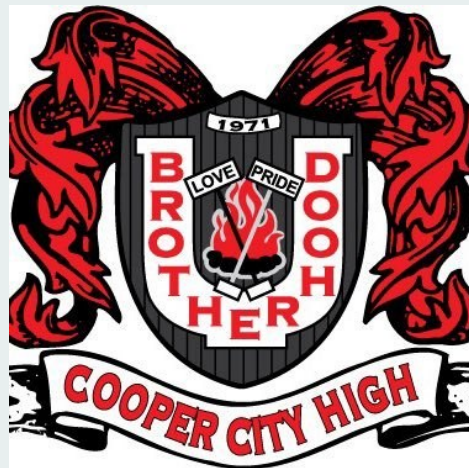

Learn how to understand and evaluate works of fiction, poetry, and drama from various periods and cultures. You'll read literary works and write essays to explain and support your analysis of them.

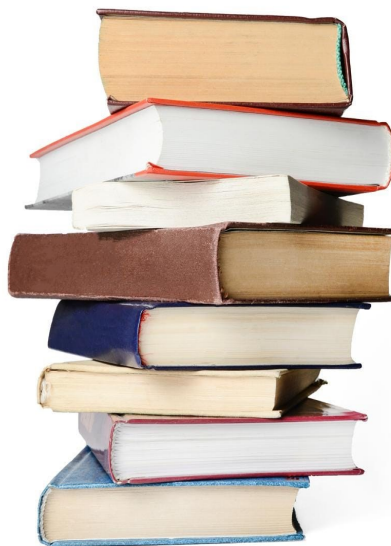
SKILLS YOU'LL LEARN

- Identify the techniques used by an author and their effects
- Develop an interpretation of a text
- Present your interpretation and make an argument for it in writing

AP Literature Course Content

The course content is organized into eight commonly taught units, which have been arranged in the following suggested, logical sequence:

- Unit 1: Short Fiction I
- Unit 2: Poetry I
- Unit 3: Longer Fiction or Drama I
- Unit 4: Short Fiction II
- Unit 5: Poetry II
- Unit 6: Longer Fiction or Drama II
- Unit 7: Short Fiction III
- Unit 8: Poetry III
- Unit 9: Longer Fiction or Drama III

**PREREQUISITES**

Before studying AP Literature and Composition, all students should complete the equivalent of three years of secondary English classes and have a strong foundation in reading comprehension and critical thinking.

It is recommended, by not required, that prospective AP Literature students take AP Language and Composition before enrolling in this course as it will provide a solid background in the close reading, annotation and analysis skills that will be beneficial in taking this course.

Assessment Overview

The AP English Literature and Composition Exam will test your understanding of the literary concepts covered in the course units, as well as your ability to analyze texts and develop written arguments based on your interpretations.

The exam is 3 hours long and includes 55 multiple-choice questions and 3 literary analysis essay prompts.
