You may use an open cardboard box, a Science Fair board, or a piece of plywood where you are going to place the 3-D representation that you have created. **The project will count as extra credit for both Social Studies and Spanish Class.** Your teacher and your parents will help with ideas, but the project should be your own. ### **SPANISH FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS**

- a. Only one student may work on a project.
- b. Project must be constructed **during the current school year.**
- c. Project sizes are limited to a **maximum** of 18" deep, 24" wide and 24" high (can be smaller). If using science boards the max. is 36" wide and 24" high **(48" standard science board cut in half horizontally to obtain the 24" height)**
- d. Projects are to be 3D and mostly handmade.
- e. Liquids, loose sand or dirt, food or electrical equipment may not be used.
- f. All projects must be accompanied by:
  - i. A title
  - ii. A report explaining the project including: what it is, what Spanish country it is from, why it is important. Include materials used and steps taken in the making of the project. Add bibliography with at least two sources. Minimum of one-page report.
  - iii. Name, grade, and classroom teacher's name needs to be written on a 3 X 5 card placed on the back of the project. **NO STUDENT NAME ON THE FRONT OF THE PROJECT.**
- g. The project must be sturdy enough to be self- supporting, (ex. cardboard box, display board, etc.) **and the student needs to be able to carry it by themselves.**
- h. All projects will be judged on a numerical system and awards will be earned accordingly.
- i. The decision of the judges is final.

## RESPONSIBILITIES OF STUDENTS

1. Develop, research, and construct project according to regulations and sizes.
2. Adhere to time schedule imposed by teacher.
3. Include name, grade level, and classroom teacher's name on a 3 X 5 card attached to the back of the project **and any component of the project.**

## MATERIALS YOU MAY USE TO MAKE YOUR CRAFT PROJECT:

String, yarn, fabric, paper maché, paint, clay, plasticine, paper rolls, tissue paper of any color, construction paper, cotton, artificial grass, cotton balls, aluminum foil, paper plates, etc. If you have any questions about materials to use you can ask Señora Aguirre. **YOU MAY NOT USE FOOD, PLASTIC DOLLS OR LEGO PARTS.**

## JUDGING AND AWARDS

A.	Each entry will be judged on the following criteria:	POINTS
	1. Creativity: originality and uniqueness of project	0-20
	2. Craftsmanship: quality of handiwork (student work)	0-20
	3. Organization and clarity: clear and precise organization of total project. Will the judges understand how your project relates to the Spanish language or culture?	0-30
	4. Research: a summary report with bibliography, materials and procedures (see above for specific items to include)	0-20
	5. Followed rules and regulations	0-10
