What Are Advanced Placement Courses?



The Basics

- AP[®] courses are college-level courses offered in high school.
- Courses reflect what's taught in introductory college courses.
- Students take AP Exams at the end of the course, measuring their mastery of college-level work.
- Students can typically earn college credit and/or placement into honors or advanced courses when they score a 3 or higher on an AP Exam.



Pre-AP® Classes at CCHS



- Pre AP courses are designed to:
 - provide students with content, skills and practices to be successful in AP courses
 - develop critical thinking skills
 - cultivates skills essential to success in AP courses, college courses and beyond.
- Pre AP does not:
 - Provide college credit
 - Require a College Board final exam



Advanced Placement ® - AP

The Basics

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- Students take AP Exams at the end of the course, measuring their mastery of college-level work.
- Students can typically earn college credit and/or placement into honors or advanced courses when they score a 3 or higher on an AP Exam.
- Provide students with content, critical thinking skills and practices to be successful in AP courses, college courses and beyond.
- Taking AP courses demonstrates that students have sought the most challenging curriculum available to them.

AP Exams



Standardized exams that measure how well students have mastered the content and skills of a specific AP course



Administered at the end of the school year in May.



Most Exams are 2 to 3 hours long.



The first part of the exam usually consists of multiple-choice questions. The second part of the exam usually consists of free-response questions.



A score of 3 or higher typically earns a student college credit.

Created and scored by teams of AP teachers and college professors




Failure to take the AP exam will result in a \$40 exam cancellation fee and the removal of quality points toward the students GPA.





AP Exam Grades












What Is AP Capstone?

AP Capstone[™] is a diploma program from College Board based on two yearlong AP courses: AP Seminar and AP Research.





New Findings on the AP Experience


Regardless of the score, completing an AP Exam has benefits.



NOTES: Probability of enrollment immediately after high school graduation is calculated for 1,560,229 students who graduated high school in 2017. Probabilities are calculated separately for the average student in each AP score sample conditional on gender, ethnicity, first-generation status, SAT score, and HSGPA.

AP students, including those with average scores of 1 or 2, are more likely to enroll in a four-year college compared to academically similar students who did not take AP in high school.

PERCENTAGE EARNING A HIGHER SCORE ON A SUBSEQUENT AP EXAM




Many students who first earn an AP Exam score of 1 or 2 will then earn a higher score on the subsequent AP Exams they take.




Credit vs. Placement

- Credit
 - Many colleges offer credit for AP scores.
 - Example—a student earns a 4 on their AP Biology Exam, and the college grants 8 credits for that score. That means the student has earned 8 credits before taking their first class there.
- Placement
 - Many colleges recognize that AP scores demonstrate knowledge of material in certain courses and let students skip those courses.
 - These could be introductory courses required in your major, or core courses the college requires all its students to take.
- In some cases, students can get both credit and placement for a qualifying AP score.


Topic Questions

- Topic questions provide students with practice applying the content and skills for each topic within a unit.
- Topic questions give teachers and students just-in-time feedback and insights into student misunderstandings.
- Students can complete these quick checks for understanding from their cell phone, a tablet, or computer.
- Responses give students and their teachers insights into how they're progressing in the course.



Personal Progress Checks

- Real-time feedback on the topics and skills in each unit as the teacher unlocks progress checks
- Formative assessments of college-level knowledge and skills designed to:
 - gauge student progress over time
 - highlight areas of strength
 - identify areas students need to work on or get support for
- Personal Progress Checks are assigned at the end of each unit, after students have learned the unit's topics and skills

The Reality of AP

Myths and Facts About AP

Myth #1 – AP courses are for students who always get good grades.

Reality – You don't need to be top of your class to be an AP student, but you'll want to be prepared for the AP course you choose. AP courses ask that you come willing to do your best work.

Myth #4 – Taking AP courses could hurt my GPA.

Reality – Weighted GPA – 6 Points. Taking AP courses shows colleges that you're willing to challenge yourself academically. Myth #2 – AP courses are too hard and stressful.

Reality – AP classes can be challenging, but that doesn't mean you're not up to the task. If you're willing to work hard and if you're prepared academically, you should be able to succeed in an AP course.

Myth #5 – I'm not sure AP is for me. How do I know if I'm ready?

Reality – If you think you're ready to take an AP course, then you're ready to advocate for yourself talk to a teacher or counselor. Myth #3 – I don't think I'll score high enough on the AP Exam to get college credit.

Reality – Many colleges grant credit, placement, or both based on a 3 or higher on an AP Exam.

Myth #6 – The final step in your AP journey is taking the AP Exam.

Reality – Every year that you take AP Exams, you can send one score report for free to the college, university, or scholarship organization of your choice. Be sure to take this important last step.

Why Pursue the AICE Cambridge Diploma?

- Scholars who successfully earn their AICE Diploma and log 100 community service hours will be awarded the Florida Academic Scholarship without a minimum GPA or SAT/ACT scores.
- Florida schools recognize the AICE Diploma and award credit for AICE courses. Many out of state schools award credit for A-Level coursework, and the Common App now includes AICE.
- AICE courses earn two quality points:
 - A=6 points B=5 points C=4 points

AICE Cambridge Diploma Timeline FAQ

How long do I have to complete my diploma coursework?

Scholars have 25 months from their first AICE EXAM to complete the 7 courses for their AICE Diploma.

What happens if I don't finish within in 25 months?

Scholars can retake prior exams to "re-age" the 25 -month window. This does NOT restart the whole process; it just changes the 7 courses in 25 months window.

Can I begin my AICE Diploma in any school year?

Most scholars elect to begin the diploma process in their 9th grade year; however, it is possible to begin in 10th grade, and we have also had successful students who began their AICE Diploma journey in their 11th grade year.





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RIGOR

Academic rigor is the most important piece on a high school transcript





College Admissions Readers are Looking For:

1. Strong <u>course rigor</u> across the board (AICE, AP, IB, and then DE as enhancement)

2. Strong <u>performance</u> (A, B) in those rigorous courses, and

3. Strong <u>ACT/SAT</u> test scores

Once a candidate has ticked those boxes, then they are typically looking at the other holistic qualities that comprise the student profile (extra-curricular, volunteering, etc.)

Can I take Advanced Placement, AICE Cambridge, and Dual Enrollment classes and/or participate in other programs and extracurricular activities?
