Scene 1: The home of RIP VAN WINKLE

- **NARRATOR:** Long ago, there lived a man named Rip Van Winkle. Rip spent his days telling stories and jokes. He loved to fish and sleep. But he didn't like to work. Everyone in the village loved Rip, except ...
- 2 **MRS. VAN WINKLE:** (*yelling*) Rip, Rip, Rip Van Winkle, wake up! You have lots of work to do today.
- 3 **RIP VAN WINKLE:** (*sleepily*) Good wife, let me sleep a little bit longer. It's so warm and cozy here.
- 4 **MRS. VAN WINKLE:** Rip Van Winkle, you are as sluggish as an old dog on a hot day. Get up and get to work!

Scene 2: The forest near the village

- 5 **NARRATOR:** Finally, to get away from his wife's yelling, Rip got up and went out. Instead of working, he went for a stroll in the forest. As he was walking, he heard a strange voice.
- 6 **LITTLE MAN:** (calling from offstage) Rip, Rip, Rip Van Winkle.
- 7 **RIP VAN WINKLE:** Oh no, has my wife followed me even here? (*A LITTLE MAN enters carrying a very large barrel. The man is dressed oddly in all green and has a peculiar look on his face.*)
- 8 **LITTLE MAN:** Would you help me carry this heavy barrel up the mountain?
- 9 **NARRATOR:** Carry a barrel up a mountain? That was more work than Rip Van Winkle had done in his entire life!
- *RIP VAN WINKLE: (thinking)* Well, that barrel probably weighs about six tons. But I could help this funny little man and then take a nice nap at the top of the mountain. My wife will never find me there. *(turning to the LITTLE MAN)* Sure, my friend, I'm happy to help you.



- **NARRATOR:** Rip and the little man climbed and climbed and finally reached the top of the mountain. The man opened the barrel and poured out two full cups. Rip was thirsty so he drank quickly. Then he fell asleep. When Rip woke up, he had quite a surprise.
- **RIP VAN WINKLE:** Have I slept all day and all night? I'll surely be in hot water now! My wife won't be pleased. *(touches his chin)* What's this? How did I grow such a long beard in one night? And it's white!
- **NARRATOR:** Rip began his long hike back down the mountain. At last, he saw his village.
- **RIP VAN WINKLE:** There's the church, but what are those other buildings? Surely people did not build new homes overnight.
- **NARRATOR:** As Rip entered the village, he was shocked that he didn't see anyone he knew. The people in the village just stared at him.
- **RIP VAN WINKLE:** Does anyone here know Mrs. Van Winkle?
- **VILLAGE PERSON 1:** Poor Mrs. Van Winkle has been dead for more than ten years.
- *RIP VAN WINKLE: (surprised)* Does anyone remember her husband, Rip?
- *VILLAGE PERSON 2:* I remember Rip and his crazy stories. He went off one day twenty years ago and never came back.
- **RIP VAN WINKLE:** I am Rip Van Winkle! I have an amazing story to tell you!

- 9 "Do you know where Mrs. Van Winkle lives?"

- 10 "Oh, she died chasing a chicken ten years ago," the old woman told me.
