- 7 Yesterday, Tommy came splashing through our pool like a horse and dropped his glasses. Serves him right! He gave us quite a scare.



- Now the summer is turning to fall, and the nights are growing colder and colder. Soon the pool will freeze solid, so Mrs. Green puts us into small bowls. We watch as she empties the pool. "Look what I've found," she calls to Mr. Green and points to the assortment of items. She looks very pleased.
