



















# Cambridge Requirements





\*\*\*English General Paper and Thinking Skills (max of 2 credits).

You must have 7 tests in your buckets with at least 1 from each category & mandatory GPA!

# Grade Point Average=GPA

### Unweighted-"State" GPA

- A. 2.0 minimum is required for high school diploma
- B. **ALL** high school courses count
- C. NO "weight" for Honors, AICE/AP, just A,B,C,D,F Highest unweighted GPA of all A's will be a 4.0
- D. 9<sup>th</sup> grade year can make or break you!

## Weighted- "District" GPA

- A. Used for class ranking
- B. "Weight" is given for Honors or AICE/AP/DUAL if a "C" or higher is earned


#### Core- "Academic" GPA

- A. College's review this for admissions
- B. It is a "weighted" GPA counting all Academic courses
- C. All courses in English, Math, Science, Social Studies and Foreign Language are classified as Academic

# The Big 4-For College and Scholarships

- Credits: The RIGHT 24
  - As much rigor as possible
  - Honors
  - Advanced Placement
  - AICE
  - Dual Enrollment
  - Must pass two credits of the same World Language.
- Grades
  - Weighted GPA has to be high!
  - A "B" average at the very least!
  - GPA is what can make you competitive!
- Test Scores
  - High SAT/ACT Scores
  - Passing EOC Scores/F.A.S.T Scores
- Service Learning
  - More than the minimum!
  - Innovative projects that make an impact!

Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV)

The Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV) award may be funded if a student is enrolled in a career education or certificate program. Florida high school students who wish to qualify for the GSV award must meet the following initial eligibility requirements:

- Achieve the required weighted minimum 3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses;
- Take at least 3 full credits in a single Career and Technical Education program;
- · Achieve the required minimum 3.5 unweighted GPA in the career education courses;
- Achieve the required minimum score on the ACT®, SAT® or Florida Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (P.E.R.T.) exams (see table below); and
- · Complete 30 volunteer service OR 100 paid work hours.

#### College Entrance Exams

Exam types cannot be combined; a student must qualify based on each sub-test score for a single exam type. Sub-test scores from different test dates may be used to meet the test requirement. The ACT\*/SAT\*/PERT exams may be taken an unlimited number of times through June 30 of the high school graduation year (or through January 31 for mid-year graduates).

Students should request that test scores be sent to one of Florida's 12 state universities when they register for the ACT\*/SAT\* so that test scores will be sent to the FDOE repository. PERT scores are reported on student official high school transcript.

#### itial Eligibility Requirements: (As determined by the Department of Education)

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation,
- 2. Earn a minimum of 5 postsecondary credit hours through CAPE industry certifications that articulate for college credit, and
- 3. Complete at least 30 service hours.

# Dual Enrollment/Early Admission's Eligibility Requirements

#### **Initial Eligibility**

- Minimum unweighted HS GPA of 3.0
- College level test scores in English, Reading and Math
  - Achieved through the ACT, SAT or ACCUPLACER
- Permission from parent, school counselor and principal

#### **Continued Eligibility (DE)**

- Earn a grade of "C" or higher in each course
- Maintain unweighted HS GPA of 3.0
- Complete DE Recommendation Form each term, online

#### **Early Admissions**

- -Senior Option
- -12 credits each term, maintain Broward College GPA of a 2.0 and an Everglades GPA of an unweighted 3.0.










- A RIGOROUS international diploma program.
- The Honors Academic Academy Program begins in 9<sup>th</sup> grade with PRE-Cambridge coursework; this track is for strong academic students who feel they need the additional preparation prior to beginning advanced academic course work.
  - -Students will start AICE Courses in 10th grade and finish by 12th grade.
- The **Advanced Academic Academy Program** is for level 4 or 5 students (FAST Reading) and who have successfully completed Algebra 1 in Middle school.
  - -Students will start AICE Courses in 9<sup>th</sup> grade and complete their Cambridge Diploma by 11th grade.
- Students have 24 months to pass exams leading to the AICE (or Cambridge)
   Diploma.
- If you are in Cambridge now and want to be in the Advanced Academic Academy Program, you must apply online.
- The AICE diploma plus community service guarantees students the top dollar award of Florida Bright Futures Scholarship!

# Exercise Science Program


- Exercise Science is a program for students with a 3 or higher on the FAST Reading and EOC Math, who are interested in not only medicine, but the science of exercise as well. Students in the program will learn the muscles and bones in the body and how they work together to allow us to move. In addition to having service hour opportunities at sporting events, students will learn emergency first aid procedures as they continue through out the program; you must apply for this Program.
- Students will qualify for industry certification in EKG Technician and Personal Training.
  - These students will take a challenging course of study including a double dose of Science of Anatomy and Physiology and Biology.



## Project **RED**

- Rigorous Engineering Development program.
- Designed for highly academic students with an interest in pursuing a career in engineering.
- Will work with specialized equipment such as 3D printers, dye-sublimation printers, CNC Mills, and robotics
- Students may APPLY for this program online.
   Students must have passed Algebra I by end of 8<sup>th</sup> grade.
- Students will qualify for Industry Certification in:
  - Autocad
  - MasterCam
  - Solidworks








# Cybersecurity and Computer Education

Cybersecurity (IT Fundamentals)-teach students the tools and systems used to monitor, mitigate, and prevent online threats. Cybersecurity professional use innovative technology to combat hackers, cyberterrorists, network outages, and other technical problems that compromise network security. Must apply for this program.



puter Coding- an introductory level course for students brand new to programming and computer science. In this course, you will learn problemsolving strategies, software design, and the foundations of computer science. You'll do so using two key tools: the Project STEM programming environment and EarSketch, a software package that turns your code into music.

- -Not only will this course prepare you for continuing your studies in computer science (for example, by taking AP Computer Science A and AP Computer Science Principles), but it will also teach you how to think like a scientist and solve real-world problems, skills that are important to every 21st-century citizen.
- -There are no prerequisites for this course.
- -Computers are simple. They do only what you tell them. This course will help you learn to talk to computers using the Python programming language. During the course, you'll learn more about programming, create programs of your own using Python, and have a lot of fun along the way.



# World Languages

- -Pre-Aice Spanish 1 Honors

# Hospitality and Tourism

- This course will introduce students to the fastpaced, everchanging and exciting world of hospitality and tourism management.
- Each chapter will cover operational and managerial topics and will also expose students to both the fundamental concepts and the more advance skills associated with leadership positions in the industry. The textbook includes real-life examples, scenarios, and case studies to best prepare students for what could be the most important decision in their life, their career.









## Pre Law/Law Enforcement

DEA/Research (9-12)

Students will have an inside look at the FBI and build mutually beneficial relationships along the way. The course improves student understanding of the Bureau by establishing and enhancing the flow of information. Students learn to identify crime problems affecting specific communities not currently being addressed, and then analyze, synthesize and develop proactive initiatives that respond to those problems

Law and Legal Studies (9-12)

Students who are interested in exploring various careers in legal studies, criminal justice, and public service. Our goal is to graduate students who have gained real-world experience and insight into their future careers. Debate is the first-year course.



# Firefighter Academy

- Three-year program-starts in grade 10.
- Students must have a 2.5 to enter the program.
- Joint Venture between EHS and the city of Miramar.
- Courses are taught by fire fighters from the City of Miramar's Fire Department.
- Students can become certified as a Level 1
   Firefighter and as an Emergency Service
   Technician.
- Level three students will perform hands-on training at the Fire Academy.
- There are several volunteer opportunities for cadets at the local fire station.
- During Senior year, cadets can earn industry certification in Level 1 Firefighting.
- Cadets who earn this State of Florida certification can progress to a Level 2 Academy immediately after High School.

# Mass Communication/Debate

#### Journalism-Yearbook, Levels 1-4

-enable students to develop fundamental skills in the production of journalism across print, multimedia, web, and broadcast/radio platforms and to develop knowledge of journalism history, ethics use, and management techniques related to the production of journalistic media

#### Creative Writing, Levels 1-4

-enable students to develop and use writing and language skills for creative expression in a variety of literary forms. Studying and modeling a variety of genres will be emphasized at this level of creative writing.

#### Debate, Levels 1-4

- -Our highly competitive debate team travels county and country-wide to compete in a variety of tournaments.
- -Students can participate in an area that interests them and that will develop their personal talents.
- -Debate classes are Honors level courses and help students develop critical thinking skills, presentation skills and communication skills
- -Debate portfolio making them highly competitive students learn skills for enhancing their college admissions.





# COMPUTER DESIGN & Engineering \*Professional Career Certifications

#### Web Design, Levels 1-4.

Prepares students for a career in digital media including video production, motion graphics, journalism, and web development. Can earn a GSV or GSC for Bright Future's.

#### Communication Technology Honors, Levels 1-4

Inter-disciplinary program bringing together web, information systems, computer science, and design with a focus on digital video, computer graphics, and system applications for preparing students for careers in a variety of production environments. Can earn GSV or GSC.

#### Digital Photo Honors (Creative Photography), Levels 1-4

Students explore the aesthetic foundations of art making using beginning photography techniques.

This course introduces students to the use of the digital camera as a tool to create art. Can earn GSV or GSC.

#### Videography Honors , Levels 1-4

Students will experience both the creative and technical aspects of film making in conjunction with learning about historical and contemporary traditions and conventions. Can earn GSV or GSC.

#### Principles of Engineering Honors, Levels 1-4

Learn hands on transferrable skills that can be applied to the manufacturing, civil, aerospace, electronics, and mechanical sectors. Can earn a GSV or GSC for Bright Future's.



- Students who wish to participate in two academies must complete two separate applications.
- Students may apply to Cambridge plus one more academy.

# CHOOSING CLASSES-9th Grade

- Everyone takes one English.
- Everyone takes one Math.
  - Algebra 1A and Algebra 1B=2 credits; Algebra 1 Honors=1 credit
- Everyone takes one Science.
- Everyone takes one Social Studies
  - Level 1 and 2 will take a reading course/pending past and current English grades
- All students will take 7 courses plus one personalization period.
- Courses beyond English, Math, Social Studies,
   Science and Reading are considered Electives.

# How Do I Complete My Course Selection Form?

- 1. Write your first and last name, and your student ID Number
- 2. Consult with your teacher and have them sign off on your Core Classes. We will be reviewing these and making changes based on your FAST scores and marking period grades. We will look at your LAST marking period grades!
- 3. When selecting electives, you may choose 5 classes ranking them 1-5. You may only use each number once throughout the entire selection.
- 4. Some courses, including electives, may require teacher approval.

Course selection is subject to change based upon course availability and teacher/counselor approval.

- Select your Elective and Career courses.
- Student and parent sign the back
- Choose CAREFULLY...we will not be making changes!
- Apply for Innovative Program
- Fill out registration form and send with two proofs of your address by next week!
- We will meet with you for course selection, if your card is not complete, we will choose your classes. (February 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>).
