SUBJECT: 2021 SINGLE-MEMBER SCHOOL BOARD REDISTRICTING UPDATE

This memorandum provides an update on the process to review single-member school board districts, in response to the 2020 United States decennial census data. On June 23, 2021, a memorandum was provided to apprise the School Board members that, due to the delay in the delivery of redistricting census data, the timeline to adopt new single-member voting districts would be compressed. For that reason, District staff has recommended retaining a consultant to assist in drafting new districts. Other local government entities, including Broward County, Palm Beach County Public Schools, and Miami-Dade County Public Schools have similarly sought to outsource their decennial redistricting processes in order to meet the December 2021 deadline for district adoption prior to 2022 elections.

On August 17, 2021, the Board approved resolution #22-03 in support of Establishing the 2021 Redistricting Guiding Principles for drawing new single-member districts.

Following the Board's recommendation, staff secured consultants from the Florida International University (FIU). The FIU consultants, Dr. Dario Moreno, Associate Professor in the Department of Politics and International Relations, and Dr. Maria Ilcheva, Assistant Director of Planning & Operations, were selected, due to their responsiveness, the comprehensiveness of their proposal, subject matter specialization, relevant experience, proposed interactive approach, their availability to meet with the Board and the public on an ongoing basis, and proposed cost of completing these tasks by December 2021.

The scope of work to be performed by FIU would include: (1) preparing a preliminary geographical map of the Board's seven single-member voting districts based on community survey data collected between 2010-2020, using the latest Census block and Census track data and software to permit the drafting of scientifically reliable and legally defensible redistricting plans and associated maps; (2) preparing an updated geographical map of the Board's voting districts following the release of the official 2020 U.S. Census data; (3) presenting any changes between the preliminary geographical maps and updated geographical map to the Board and general public at public workshops and School Board meetings;

(4) meeting with the Board members individually to present the Census data, demographics, map configuration, and redistricting principles and discuss potential revisions or changes specific to a Board member's district; (5) preparing a final map (or alternative maps) for the public's comment and the Board's discussion, adoption, and ratification at a scheduled School Board meeting; (6) drafting a resolution for the Board's adoption, identifying the metes and bounds of the ratified final map; and (7) working with the Broward County Supervisor of Elections and Broward County Planning and Zoning Department in developing voting precincts based on the ratified final map and adopted resolution.

The Board will have until the end of December 2021 to draft, present, and adopt new singlemember voting districts, which must comport with legal redistricting principles. Moreover, the hiring of outside legal counsel on an hourly basis may be warranted to ensure that these maps comport with current voting laws.

Public input will be solicited through scheduled community meetings (face-to-face/virtual), and an interactive website. The FIU's consultants are available to meet with the Board members individually at any time during the process. Their contact information is below:



I. PROPOSER INFORMATION

The project team is uniquely qualified to provide the proposed services as it brings the expertise of a team of data analysts, redistricting and GIS experts, and communications and outreach professionals. The same team is currently engaged in the drawing the new districts of the Miami-Dade School Board and Broward County's Commission.

The project will be housed at the Jorge Pérez Metropolitan Center, the leading urban "think tank" in South Florida and an applied research unit in the School of International and Public Affairs (SIPA) at Florida International University. The Center is located in Broward County, at the FIU Campus in Miramar: <u>FIU @175, 1930 SW. 145 Avenue, Miramar, FL 33027</u>. Since 1997, the Center has provided policy solutions to public, private and non-profit organizations in South Florida, taking into account the unique needs of individual communities. The Center offers customized services and studies while adhering to recognized methodologies for applied research. Our staff combines skills and experience in various areas of research and practice, from economic and community development, housing and business analysis, to population studies, survey research, and public policy development and feasibility analysis.

The project team has a demonstrated academic expertise in redistricting and years of experience in the process, including extensive experience and knowledge in community-redistricting outreach efforts, redistricting criteria and analysis, and census products including data collection and analysis at the micro-level, block group and comprehensive technical expertise in different mapping software including ArcGIS. The team's technical and practical knowledge in mapping and data analysis will result in a comprehensive, objective, and unique approach to the redistricting process.

Dr. Dario Moreno, principal investigator for this project, has almost thirty years of experience in redistricting process, elections, and public opinion. Dr. Moreno has helped independent commissions and advocacy organizations, mostly in South Florida, to create fair and lasting maps. Dr. Moreno has also provided technical assistance on public opinion research, redistricting, and voter confidence for the State Florida and local governments including the Florida House of Representatives, the Florida Election Department, the Broward Election Department, and the Florida Senate.

Dr. Dario Moreno holds a Ph.D. from the University of Southern California. He conducts research on Miami politics, Florida politics, and Cuban- American politics. He has published over 50 scholarly articles, book chapters and four books. Dr. Moreno is a nationally recognized expert on Florida and Miami Politics and is often quoted in both the national and local media. He has been a Pew Scholar at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, and a Fulbright Scholar in Costa Rica. He teaches a variety of classes in the Department of Politics and International Relations at FIU, including Miami politics, Cuban politics, Florida politics, election and political parties.

Dr. Maria llcheva will serve as Co-Principal Investigator on the Broward County Redistricting Plans. Dr. Ilcheva is the Assistant Director of Planning and Operations of the Jorge M. Pérez Metropolitan Center. She serves as subject matter expert in data analytics and behavioral research. Over the last fifteen years, she has worked on various economic development, social and behavioral projects, which examine quality of life issues through community indicators such as education, transportation, economic opportunity and resilience. Most of the projects she leads include comprehensive data analysis and community engagement. Some of her recent research projects include the 2020 Miami-Dade County Community Needs Assessment, the Economic Impact of the Nonprofit Sector in Miami-Dade County, Make It Miami Manufacturing Report, Small Business, Big Impact, and the Miami-Dade Status of Women reports. Dr. Ilcheva is currently leading two projects on equity in Broward County and Boynton Beach, which include both extensive data analysis and community outreach.

Dr. Ilcheva leads the Census Information Center at the Metropolitan Center, one of 59 such centers established by the U.S. Census Bureau for the dissemination of information and data produced by the Census Bureau to underserved communities.

Dr. Ilcheva is associate research faculty at FIU's Steven J. Green School of International and Public Affairs. She holds a Ph.D. in Politics and International Relations from Florida International University.

II. PROPOSER EXPERIENCE AND QUALIFICATIONS

Dr. Dario Moreno, Redistricting Effort Principal Investigator, is unquestionably one of the State's most experienced and recognized experts in the field of redistricting. Dr. Moreno has participated and contributed to last three State redistricting efforts, 1992, 2002 and 2012 – the 2012 effort being the most relevant as Amendments V and VI to the Florida Constitution V and VI were implemented. These amendments radically changed State Law regarding redistricting. Professor Moreno was a consultant for the State House of Representatives and was key in developing a plan for the House that was not only adopted by the legislative body but was also accepted by the Courts. Additionally, Dr. Moreno has published more than 50 scholarly pieces on Florida and Miami politics with a focus on the diverse racial, ethnic, and socio-economic dynamics of Florida and Miami-Dade County. Dr. Moreno has also developed a thorough understanding of these local and statewide dynamics through his previous work as a consultant, expert witness, and research investigator.

Dr. Moreno's experience related to redistricting includes:

- Consultant and expert witness in the DeGrandy v. Wetherall case that dealt with Congressional and state legislative redistricting; employed by the Republican Party of Florida and Cuban-American Caucus of Florida, 1991-92;
- Expert witness in Suarez vs. Dade School Board and Negron v. City of Miami Beach where defendants were suing under Section Two of the Voting Right Act to reform school board elections and change at large elections into single member districts; employed by the plaintiffs, 1994-95;
- Consultant and expert witness for the 2001-02 redistricting process; employed by the Florida House of Representatives, 2001-02;
- Co-principal investigator providing expertise and technical assistance for redistricting in the City of Miami, the City of Boynton Beach, and Kissimmee; employed by Florida International University, 2003;
- Principal Investigator, Broward Voter Confidence Poll; employed by Broward County, 2005;
- Co-Principal Investigator, Broward Exit Poll; employed by Broward County, 2006;
- Principal Investigator, Annexation Feasibility Study; employed by the City of Opa-Locka, 2006;
- Consultant and expert witness for the 2012 Congressional and state legislative redistricting; employed by the Florida House of Representatives, 2011-16;
- Co-Principal Investigator, Annexation Feasibility Study; employed by the City of Miami.

Dr. Moreno's relevant experience also includes:

- 1993-1996 as a member of Miami Dade Boundary Commission on the annexation and incorporation of Miami-Dade Municipalities.
- 2002-2011 as a representative of Florida International University on the advisory committee before Miami-Dade County commissioners on nominee for the Miami-Dade County Citizens Transportation Board.

Dr. Moreno is Associate Professor in the Department of Politics & International Relations at Florida International University. He holds a Ph.D. from the University of Southern California. He conducts research on Miami politics, Florida politics, and Cuban-American politics. He has published over 20 scholarly articles, book chapters, and two books. Dr. Moreno is a nationally recognized expert on Florida and Miami politics and is often quoted in both the national and local media. He is a contributing editor to the Harvard Journal of Hispanic Policy. He has been a Pew Scholar at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University, and a Fulbright scholar in Costa Rica. He teaches a variety of classes in the Department of Politics & International Relations at FIU, including Miami politics, Cuban politics, Florida politics, and a graduate seminar in urban politics.

Dr. Moreno is teaching a course on Florida Politics (POS 4182) in Spring 2021, which provides analysis of the state and county politics of Florida. Special emphasis is placed on the regionalism inherent to politics in the state. Dr. Maria Ilcheva has past and ongoing projects in Miami-Dade County, which underscore her thorough understanding of the county and specific communities within it. She is currently leading the research on the 2021 Status of Women report commissioned by the Miami-Dade County Office of the County Auditor. The report details the changing conditions of women over the last decade, with a focus on education, economic development, health and safety. She is currently working with the Miami Foundation and community partners in the implementation of workforce development and small business expansion in the county. She is also co-leading the research and development of <u>Broward County Equity Action Plan</u>, funded by the Urban League of Broward and Hispanic Unity.

Dr. Ilcheva participated in the 2020 Census Count effort through the Miami-Dade Census 2020 Task Force. She led the focus group research in Miami-Dade County, assessing barriers and motivators for specific communities in participating in the census. The <u>Hard-to-Enumerate Community In Broward</u> project entailed recruitment of participants from various groups, organization of logistics to hold meetings at easily accessible community locations – churches, community centers and other hubs to allow for inclusive participation.

In addition to intense data analytics projects, Dr. Ilcheva's work frequently entails participatory action research in which community members are engaged in an authentic, informed and coherent way, to make them an integral part of the process of finding solutions that affect their community. Dr. Ilcheva's approach to community engagement is predicated on the assumption that authentic community engagement is critical for rebuilding trust in institutions and creating appropriate mechanisms and processes for addressing community concerns.

In the Miami-Dade County <u>Community Needs Assessment (2020)</u> developed for the Miami-Dade County Community Action Human Services Department, Dr. Ilcheva led a research team to assess population trends and needs in the County. In addition, the project entailed community engagement through the Community Action Committees and the County's Community Action Board and focus groups including CAHSD staff and the Head Start Policy Council.

III. KEY PERSONNEL AND SUBCONSULTANTS PERFORMING SERVICE

Dr. Dario Moreno, Principal Investigador

Dr. Dario Moreno will be the principal investigator and project manager. He will oversee all aspects of the academic and technical research and production of maps as well as the community outreach efforts and all the corresponding reporting, conclusions and recommendations for the project.

Dr. Dario Moreno, has extensive experience and is a State recognized expert in the Redistricting field:

- Dr. Moreno has participated and contributed to last three State redistricting efforts, 1992, 2002 and 2012 – the 2012 effort being the most relevant as Amendments V and VI to the Florida Constitution V and VI were implemented. These amendments radically changed State Law regarding redistricting. Professor Moreno was a consultant for the State House of Representatives and was key in developing a plan for the House that was not only adopted by the legislative body but was also accepted by the Courts.
- In 1991-2 Dr. Moreno. was hired by the Republican Party of Florida and the Cuban American Caucus of the Florida Legislature as a consultant and expert witness in the DeGrandy v. Wetherall case that dealt with Congressional and state legislative redistricting.
- Dr. Moreno was also hired by plaintiffs as an expert witness in Suarez vs. Dade School Board (1994) and Negron v. City of Miami Beach (1995), where defendants were suing under Section Two of the Voting Rights Act to reform school board elections and change at-large elections into single member districts.
- In 2001-2 the Florida House of Representative hired Dr. Moreno as a consultant and expert witness for the 2001-2 redistricting process.
- Dr. Moreno. was the co-principal investigator on a Florida International University contract to provide expertise and technical assistance for redistricting in the City of Miami (2003), the City of Boynton Beach, and Kissimmee.
- In 2011-6 Dr. Moreno. was hired by the Florida House of Representatives as a consultant and expert witness for the 2012 Congressional and state legislative redistricting.
- In addition, Dr. Moreno is an expert in Census data and led the Metropolitan Center in 2002 in obtaining the prestigious Census Information Center (CIS) certification by the US Census Bureau, which allows early access to release data and data with restricted use.

Dr. Maria Ilcheva, Co-Principal Investigador

Dr. Maria Ilcheva will be the Co-Principal Investigator and manage the outreach efforts. She will also collaborate with staff and consultants on data analytics. She will also serve as the team liaison with the School Board.

Dr. Maria Ilcheva is subject matter expert on research methodology and data analytics. Over the past fifteen years at the FIU Metropolitan Center, she has led over 100 research projects focused on various South Florida issues, including demographic research and analysis, housing and community development, transportation, social justice issues and others. Some of her recent work in Broward County includes the Broward Status of Women report (completion in March 2021), the Impact of Habitat Homeownership Study for Habitat Broward, the Hard-to-Enumerate Focus Groups in Broward County, the Broward Housing Needs Assessment, and the Broward Nexus/Linkage Fee Study. Dr.

Ilcheva is also co-leading the research on the Broward Equity Initiative funded by the Urban League of Broward County and Hispanic Unity (commenced in February 2021). Most of Dr. Ilcheva's projects involve public outreach and engagement, with community leaders, public officials and various target populations.

Lina Duran, Senior Assistant to the Principal Investigator. Consultant for Data collection and Analysis Lina graduated Magna Cum Laude from Florida International University and later from New York University in Urban Planning. Lina is an expert in data collection, advanced analysis at the micro level, and economic development. Lina Served as Project Manager for Palm Beach County Rental Housing Needs Assessment. She performed demographic and economic market research for planned Transit Oriented Development on behalf of the Miami-Dade County Citizens Independent Transportation Trust. Lina also served as a Project Manager in housing market research and analysis for the Broward County Affordable Housing Needs Assessment and performed social and economic research on the Miami Foundation Soul of the Community Indicator Project. Lina also has work with Citibank analyzing local demographic data to identify and define community impact measures in Miami-Dade County. There she helped develop data to demonstrate community opportunities and measure impact needed to make the case for deeper cross-functional engagement of Citibank's businesses and collaborative institutional investment with national partners

Patrick J. Villalonga, Senior Assistant to the Principal Investigator, Voting Analysis

Mr. Villalonga is a 3rd year PhD student in Political Science at Florida International University. Mr. Villalonga has a strong background in quantitative research, particularly statistical and geographic analysis using statistical software such as SPSS, STATA, and ArcGIS, as demonstrated in his previous research. Mr. Villalonga relies heavily on ArcGIS in his research. Recently he has used ArcGIS to map the distribution personality traits and neighborhood walkability to determine how they influence political participation. Preliminary multivariate analysis of Miami, for example, shows that more walkable precincts tend to have higher rates of participation in national and local level electoral contests independent of income, race, gender, education, and age. Another paper looks at the geographic distribution of personality traits and its effect on community involvement. This project utilizes complex statistical methods such as multilevel modeling. Mr. Villalonga is an expert in ArcGIS. Mr. Villalonga contributed two chapters to the book entitled A Divided Union: Structural Challenges to Bipartisanship in America. In one chapter he analyzes the consequences of different primary election systems on political polarization. However, his greatest contribution to the volume was an analysis of political segregation and its effects on political polarization.

Patrick J. Villalonga will assist the principal investigator with voting behavior analysis using regression analysis at the precinct; district and county level to accurately reflect the results of the evaluation methodology.

Lina Duran will assist the principal investigator with the evaluation methodology. This includes the collection and analysis of strategic data variables and their interrelation at the micro level related to demographics, income and spending, housing, lending, quality of life, economic status, educational attainment, and health in order to determine communities of interest.

Functions: Voting Analysis, Data Analytics

IV. PROPOSED APPROACH

1. Project Plan

The tasks outlined below describe the required steps for the completion of the redistricting plans by the December 2021 deadline set by the Broward County School Board.

 Comprehensive Demographic Analysis: The team will conduct a 10-year demographic analysis to describe population changes in each district since the last decennial redistricting effort. The analysis will be conducted at the block group level, using annual estimates from the American Community Survey of the U.S. Census Bureau to understand community dynamics.

The analysis will provide insight into which districts are currently malapportioned and what boundaries need to be adjusted based on population growth and the shifting of population between districts. In addition to basic demographics covering population characteristics such as counts, ethnic and racial distribution, age, household composition etc., the analysis will also inform the delineation of communities of interest by examining current community conditions and trends in the areas of education, economic development, housing, and health among others.

- 2) Voting Behavior Analysis: This task involves the analysis of Broward County's voting behavior in every countywide election between 2012 and 2020 to test for ethnic and racial voting polarization and other relevant voting patterns. The team will utilize a double step approach: first a regression analysis and then a homogenous precinct analysis. The regression analysis allows for the examination of voting patterns by race/ethnicity even when there are no homogeneous precincts. The homogeneous precinct analysis will compare voting patterns in "homogeneous precincts" – precincts that are 90% or more single race/ethnicity, and this analysis will determine voter polarization.
- 3) Community of Interest Aggregation: The analysis in Tasks 1 and 2 will lead to the delineation of communities of interest across Broward County, with a special attention to how these communities of interest are currently represented through the existing district structure.
- 4) Census Redistricting Data Analysis: The research team will compare the official census data with the analytics in Tasks 1, 2 and 3, to determine if changes need to be made in the conclusions drawn from these tasks related to current community characteristics. In this task, the consultant will apply redistricting criteria, as prescribed by law and common practice, including compactness, contiguity, communities of interest, competitiveness, prohibition on favoring or disfavoring an incumbent or candidate etc. Maps will be tested for compactness, proportionality, competitiveness and other accepted map quality standards. The methodology outlined above will ensure a smooth process of adoption of the maps by the School Board.
- 5) Draft Redistricting Plans: The consultant will develop redistricting maps based on the demographic, voting and socio-economic analysis, considering natural and man-made barriers, such as canals and highways, municipal and natural boundaries such as bays, rivers, inlets and national parks. The maps and supporting analysis will be presented to the Broward County School Board and to the residents of Broward County at public meetings and workshops. The proposed maps will be adjusted based on feedback from Broward County School Board members, residents, and other stakeholders.
- 6) **Final Redistricting Plan**: Present final map to Broward County School Board for final comments and adoption.

2. Redistricting Updates and Outreach Plan

- Interactive Mapping Software: The project team, in collaboration with Broward County School District will solicit input by offering DRA2020, an interactive Web Geographic Information Systems technology for drafting redistricting maps. This web application ensures transparency of the redistricting process by allowing everyone to create, view and analyze redistricting plans. DRA 2020 includes demographic data from the 2020 Census and election data for recent federal and state elections.
- 2) School Board Member Engagement: School Board members will receive periodic updates from the project team on the progress in describing community change, community of interest delineations and mapping. The project team will provide these updates electronically, as well as in person, to individual board members, at board workshops and public meetings, as needed.
- 3) Public Engagement: The project team will collaborate with the Broward County School Board in the public outreach process by providing information that can be used for the development of the School Board's redistricting website, communications to residents and community leaders and other outreach efforts.

Teaching a graduate class on Research Methods and Tools in the Master's in Arts in Global Affairs program.
- Collaborates with Director and senior FIU leaders in preparing the Center's self-assessment reports for university administrators and Board of Governors

SELECTED RESEARCH PROJECTS (serving as principal investigator, last two years), funder, and duration:

Impact of Habitat for Humanity Homeownership, funded by Rogers Family Foundation (2020-ongoing): The research entails detailed analytics of the neighborhoods in which Habitat homes are located in Broward County, including demographics, economic and housing data, property appraiser analysis etc. Additionally, the research entails the administration of a survey with homeowners measuring any changes related to education, income, health and other household characteristics as a result of homeownership.

Broward Equity Action Plan, funded by Urban League of Broward and Hispanic Unity (2021 – ongoing): The Jorge M. Pérez Metropolitan Center is developing assessments on the "State of Black and Latinx Broward." The assessments including the analytical framework, key data points, baseline indicators, and findings for seven subject areas, including baseline demographics, economic development, education, housing, criminal justice and safety, public health and voter engagement. The assessments will provide the underpinnings for the subsequent "Broward Equity Plan of Action." The plan will include specific planning and policy recommendations for each topic area.

Broward Status of Women Report 2021, funded by Broward County (2020-2021): The Status of Women in Broward County Report 2021 is the first biennial report that tracks disparities between men and women and progress toward closing the gender gap. The 2021 Report tracks women's progress in Broward County based on educational attainment, economic development, and overall health and safety. Women's status in each of these categories is evaluated over ten years from 2010 to 2019, across racial and ethnic boundaries, and compared to their male counterparts.

Building Prosperity in Miami-Dade County, The Miami Foundation/JP Morgan Chase (2019-2021): The FIU Metropolitan Center is the evaluator of the workforce and small business interventions implemented by the Miami Foundation and community partners to train local residents and businesses to be more resilient to chronic financial stresses, such as lack of access to well-paying jobs and insufficient business opportunities. The evaluation entails working with community partners on developing assessment tools, the collection of data from their clients and the assessment of success in achieving desired goals in terms of program outputs, outcomes and systems change.

Miami-Dade County Comprehensive Community Needs Assessment, Miami-Dade County Community Action and Human Services Department (2019-2020): The report provides a comprehensive assessment of the community, outlining in depth the characteristics that point to its strengths, weakness and opportunities to improve. The report examined a variety of factors across topical areas such as demographics, education, economic opportunity, health, crime and safety and community resources, for the county as well as for specific neighborhoods and opportunity zones. The research also included primary data collection through a survey administered over the phone, online and in person, with approximately 3,000 collected responses. Additional qualitative information was collected through eight focus groups with community members, department staff and board members.

The Small Business Ecosystem of Miami-Dade County, JP Morgan Chase (2019-2020): The research entails the creation of a detailed inventory of all institutional, nonprofit and private organizations serving small businesses, with a categorization of services with the outcome will be a resource for businesses and for service providers to direct clients to appropriate resources; a comprehensive analysis identifying areas of need and opportunities for service enhancements through the collection of first-person information from service providers on their observations of small business needs and challenges; and development of a platform for collaboration and knowledge exchange among service providers, and

within the business community with the hosting service providers meetings improving collaboration and know-how for businesses and service-providers. The funding will also be used to update the <u>Small</u><u>Business. Big Impact.</u> report produced by the Metropolitan Center in 2018.

Hurricane Preparedness and Mitigation, Florida Legislature, (recurring annual funding since 2006): The research involves the administration of an annual Hurricane Preparedness poll which gauges the culture of preparedness of Florida residents and includes an assessment of their ability and willingness to engage in mitigation measures. Each year the research has a specific focus, including the impact of flooding and development on the ability of regions to deal with hurricanes, social vulnerability assessments by region, as well as the impact of climate change and sea level rise on the decision-making processes and actions of local residents and decision-makers.

Status of Women in Miami-Dade County, Miami-Dade County Office of the Commission Auditor,

(recurring annual funding since 2016): The first annual report on the status of women and girls in Miami-Dade was presented to the Board of County Commissioners Tuesday, December 6, 2016. The findings shed a light on areas where women and girls are succeeding or struggling, including in education, health and safety and economic development. The annual reports track progress towards reducing the gender pay gap, across educational levels, industry sectors and occupations, and assess the challenges women face.

211 Helpline Quality Assurance Assessment, Jewish Community Services/The Children's Trust (recurring annual funding since 2011): Assessment of the customer service and quality of information provided by 211 agents. JCS operates the 211 Helpline with funding assistance from the Children's Trust. The assessments are completed through phone secret shops in English, Spanish and Creole, with the analysis provided to JCS in quarterly evaluation reports.

Make It Miami: Report on the Manufacturing Sector in Miami-Dade County, Citi Community

Development (2019): The report, a collaboration of the FIU Jorge M. Pérez Metropolitan Center and the Florida SBDC at FIU, outlined the strength of the manufacturing sector in the county, the types of establishments and subsectors of manufacturing firms, and their characteristics in terms of functions, sales and employment. The report found that the manufacturing sector connects with many other sectors in Miami-Dade's economy through a multiplier effect—a way of measuring how important one industry is to the others in a region. For every job gained or lost in the manufacturing sector, 2-3 jobs are similarly affected. The research also included a survey with manufacturing companies that assessed the challenges and opportunities for their business.

What is Redistricting?

Redistricting of School Board Member <u>Voting Districts</u> DOES NOT impact student attendance boundaries or transportation.

Redistricting is the process of changing **boundaries of <u>voting</u>** <u>districts</u> so that all school board member districts have the same number of people or nearly the same as practicable. This occurs every 10 years, immediately following the decennial census.

As communities grow and change, peoples' representation in government begins to get out of balance. Redistricting brings everything back into balance.

The 2020 United States Decennial Census indicates, based on preliminary estimates, an increase in population of Broward County over the last ten years by approximately 11.7%.

CONSTRAINTS

- Given the extremely compressed two month timeframe, the Board would need to select a scenario much more quickly than in 2011.
- There may be only 2 or 3 Board meetings remaining in 2021 after data reconciliation, review, creation of baseline data, and scenario generation.

 - Consultant to leveraged an outreach plan to include a website with the ability to receive public comments on scenarios.







On April 17, 2012, the School Board adopted the following redistricting criteria for the 2011-13 Redistricting:

Required to do:

Florida Statute 1001.36 states:

• Changes to school board member residence areas shall, as nearly as practicable, be **equal in population**, and;

 Changes to school board member residence areas shall be made only in odd-numbered years, and;

• That no change which would affect the residence qualifications of an incumbent member shall disqualify such incumbent member during the term for which he or she is elected, and;

• Seven district school board member residence areas. The electorate approved the school board to be comprised of nine members, seven of whom are to be elected from a single-member residence area by electors residing in the single-member residence area only, and two of whom are to be elected at-large.

• Compliance with Section 2 of Public Law 89-110, **Voting Rights Act** (prohibits voting practices or procedures that discriminate on the basis of race, color, or membership in one of the language minority groups identified in Section 4(f)(2) of the Act.)





On April 17, 2012, the School Board adopted the following redistricting criteria for the 2011-13 Redistricting:

The following Florida Constitutional provisions <u>may also be considered</u> when drawing new districts.

Traditional Guiding Principles:

The following are the "standards" from the Florida Constitution:

a) No apportionment plan or individual district shall be drawn with the intent to favor or disfavor a political party or an incumbent; and districts shall not be drawn with the intent or result of denying or abridging the equal opportunity of racial or language minorities to participate in the political process or to diminish their ability to elect representatives of their choice; and, shall consist of contiguous territory.

b) Unless compliance with the standards in this subsection conflicts with the standards in subsection (a) or with federal law, districts shall be as nearly equal in population as is practicable; districts shall be **compact**; and, districts shall, **where feasible, utilize existing political and geographical boundaries**.

c) The order in which the standards within subsections (a) and (b) of this section are set forth shall not be read to establish any priority of one standard over the other within that subsection.





2011 REDISTRICTING CRITERIA FOR ANALYSIS, CON'T.

Guiding Principles Important to Broward School District:



Alignment of single-member districts with high school innovation zones allows school communities to be represented by one board member with minimal disruption whenever possible.



Alignment of single-member districts with equal numbers of schools within a district whenever possible.

Whenever possible maintain the existing geographic area population diversity within singlemember districts.

Preservation of communities of interest whenever possible.

Legal counsel is reviewing the cases that have been decided since 2011 to determine whether there are any adjustments to the 2011 Criteria that are legally advisable.






RECOMMENDATIONS

The U.S. Census Bureau estimates that 2020 Census block data will be released to states by August 16, 2021, which gives the School Board only until December 2021 to draft, present, and ratify any maps based on that data. Those maps, moreover, must comport with legal redistricting principles to survive court scrutiny.

- The School Board of Broward County, Florida to authorize the Board Attorney to procure a professional services contract with a four-year college or university to obtain services of outside legal counsel consultant(s) specializing in redistricting process and election law, and redistricting database mapping expert(s) for the purpose of 1) assisting with the complexities for the redistricting process; and 2) reviewing and advising the Board on the legal repercussions related to proposed legislation.
- Adopt a resolution¹ for redistricting criteria analysis at the next School Board meeting so that it is in place ahead of the data release.
- Make our best effort to achieve Redistricting in 2021, if recommended.





RESOLUTION #12-32 OF THE BROWARD COUNTY SCHOOL BOARD

WHEREAS, Section 1001.36, Florida Statutes, provides that "Any district school board may make any change that it deems necessary in the boundaries of any district school board member residence area at any meeting of the district school board, provided that such changes shall be made only in odd-numbered years"; and

WHEREAS, certain provisions of the Florida Constitution require that the boundaries of legislative districts and county commission districts be reconfigured after each decennial census; and

WHEREAS, the federal government has completed the 2010 census and has provided the Broward County School Board with the county's population figures; and

WHEREAS, based on those 2010 census population numbers, the seven representative single-member districts for the Broward County School Board are no longer equally proportioned and must have balanced populations to comply with the established legal principles regarding the distribution of population within the County; and

WHEREAS, the Broward County School Board has decided to create a Redistricting Steering Committee to recommend any necessary or desirable changes to the boundaries of the School Board districts based on the 2010 census; and

WHEREAS, the Broward County School Board recognizes the paramount importance of reapportionment in the School Board's effort to comply with the "one person - one vote" principle; and

WHEREAS, Section 1001.36, Florida Statutes, also provides that "no change that would affect the residence qualifications of any incumbent member shall disqualify such incumbent member during the term for which he or she is elected"; and

WHEREAS, the Broward County School Board intends to adopt a reapportionment plan such that the seven single-member school board districts will continue to be contiguous and compact territories that are as nearly equal in population as practicable, while taking into consideration the geography of the neighborhoods and current school attendance zones and the demographics of the county while preserving communities of interests and while avoiding the disqualification of any incumbent school board member for the duration of any term; and

WHEREAS, the Broward County School Board intends to adopt the redistricting plan in 2013 to allow the public, prospective candidates and the Broward County Supervisor of Elections ample time to observe and familiarize themselves with the newly created districts for the 2014 school board member elections; and

WHEREAS, the Broward County School Board desires that the reapportionment process be conducted in an open, public and fair forum in which all Broward County residents have a right to participate; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Broward County School Board moves for approval of the following items with respect to the 2011-2013 Broward County School Board Redistricting Steering Committee:

SECTION 1. CREATION OF THE 2011-2013 REDISTRICTING STEERING COMMITTEE. There is hereby created a steering committee to be known as the 2011-2013 Broward County School Board Redistricting Steering Committee, hereinafter referred to as the "Committee". SECTION 2. MEMBERSHIP. The Committee shall consist of no more than nineteen (19) individuals. The nominees for the Committee shall be comprised of two (2) nominees by each of the nine (9) Broward County School Board members and one (1) nominee by the Broward County Superintendent of Schools. All members of the Committee are and shall continue to be electors of Broward County, Florida, and shall be residents of the particular school board district from which they were appointed. Elected officials, other than members of the judiciary, and Broward County Public School employees are not eligible to serve on the Committee. Candidates for office for any individual Broward County School Board district in 2012 or 2014, as well as persons intending to run or otherwise considering whether to run for the office of school board member in 2012, are not eligible to serve on the Committee. The Committee shall adopt all procedures in School Board policy 1.7, Appointment of School Board Members to a Committee, except for annual reappointment. The appointment and approved committee will conduct and complete the redistricting advisory work within the School Board approved timeline.

The following individuals, each of whom shall be confirmed by a vote of the Broward County School Board, are hereby appointed to serve on the 2011-2013 Broward County School Board Committee upon the adoption of this resolution:

SECTION 3. DUTIES, RESPONSIBILITIES AND GUIDELINES. The Committee shall endeavor to submit to the School Board at the first regular School Board meeting in December 2012, its proposal(s) for reapportioning Broward County into seven (7) single-member school board districts of contiguous and compact territory as nearly equal in population as practicable. In developing its recommendations, the Committee shall take into consideration the School Board Redistricting Guiding Principles approved on October 18, 2011.

SECTION 4. VACANCIES. In the event of a vacancy on the Committee due to relocation, resignation, death, disability, or any other cause, the School Board Chair or the School Board Member, as applicable, shall nominate a replacement, and such nominee shall be appointed to the Committee, but only upon confirmation by a vote of the Broward County School Board.

SECTION 5. MEETINGS AND PUBLIC HEARINGS. At its initial meeting, the Committee shall select a Chair and a Vice Chair and establish a tentative schedule of regular meetings, including times and locations, which shall be advertised in a newspaper(s) of general circulation within Broward County and published on the Broward County Public Schools' website.

The Committee shall hold no fewer than seven (7) public hearings before adopting its recommendations, and notice of each public hearing shall be advertised in a newspaper(s) of general circulation and published on the BCPS website not less than ten days before each hearing. A public hearing shall hereby be defined as any meeting held by the Committee as a whole or as a subcommittee, in which the public is afforded an opportunity to comment on any proposed recommendations and to submit any reapportionment plans for the entire county or for any portions thereof. For all meetings other than the aforementioned public hearings, the Committee should include in their agenda a section allowing the public to provide input on any proposals considered by the Committee. The Chair of the Committee may reasonably limit the time each member of the public can speak. The Committee shall endeavor to meet at least twice per month to meet no more than twice a month, whether in regular or special meetings or in public hearings, until its assignment is completed. As an advisory committee, the Committee and any subcommittees are subject to the State of Florida's Government in the Sunshine Laws as well as Florida's Public Records Laws, as prescribed by Florida law.

SECTION 6. SUPPORT. The Committee shall be entitled to the support of Broward County School Board staff and specifically shall be provided the following support services:

(a) The Committee may submit legal questions to the General Counsel as necessary.

(b) The Broward County Public Schools GIS within the School Boundaries department shall assign staff as necessary or desirable to assist the Committee in developing its recommendations and proposed reapportionment plans.

SECTION 7. ADVISORY NATURE OF THE COMMITTEE. The recommendations of the Committee are advisory only and are subject to such revisions and amendments as the School Board may elect. Furthermore, the dates set forth in this Resolution are guidelines and targets, but not procedural deadlines. Failure by the Committee to submit its recommendations by the first regular School Board meeting in December 2012, and failure by the School Board to adopt a redistricting plan before the conclusion of 2013, shall not affect the validity of the redistricting plan in any respect.

SECTION 8. TERMINATION AND CESSATION OF REGULAR MEETINGS. Unless

otherwise terminated sooner by the Broward County School Board, the Committee shall sunset upon adoption of a reapportionment plan by the Broward County School Board. Regular meetings of the Committee shall cease upon the Committee's submission of its recommended plan(s) to the Broward County School Board. The Chair of the Committee shall present the recommended plan(s) to the Broward County School Board at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Broward County School Board. Any additional meetings of the Committee may only be held upon the further request of the Broward County School Board and subject to any notice requirements pursuant to Florida law.

SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Resolution shall become effective upon adoption by the Broward County School Board. As approved by a vote of the Broward County School Board on this 18th day of October of 2011.

2011-2013 Single-Member School Board Redistricting Guiding Principles

Florida Statute 1001.36 states:

- Changes to school board member residence areas shall, as nearly as practicable, be equal in population, and;
- Changes to school board member residence areas shall be made only in odd-numbered years, and;
- That no change which would affect the residence qualifications of an incumbent member shall disqualify such incumbent member during the term for which he or she is elected, and;
- Seven district school board member residence areas. The electorate approved the school board to be comprised of nine members, seven of whom are to be elected from a single-member residence area by electors residing in the single-member residence area only, and two of whom are to be elected at-large.

Compliance with Public Law 89-110 Voting Rights Act of 1965 states that no voting qualifications or prerequisite to voting, or standard, practice, or procedure shall be imposed or applied by any State or political subdivision to deny or abridge the right of any citizen of the United States to vote on account of race or color.

The following Florida Constitutional provisions may also be considered when drawing new districts.

- a) No apportionment plan or individual district shall be drawn with the intent to favor or disfavor a political party or an incumbent; and districts shall not be drawn with the intent or result of denying or abridging the equal opportunity of racial or language minorities to participate in the political process or to diminish their ability to elect representatives of their choice; and, shall consist of contiguous territory.
- b) Unless compliance with the standards in this subsection conflicts with the standards in subsection (a) or with federal law, districts shall be as nearly equal in population as is practicable; districts shall be compact; and, districts shall, where feasible, utilize existing political and geographical boundaries.
- c) The order in which the standards within subsections (a) and (b) of this section are set forth shall not be read to establish any priority of one standard over the other within that subsection.

Guiding Principles Important to Broward School District:

- Alignment of single-member districts with high school innovation zones allows school communities to be represented by one board member with minimal disruption whenever possible.
- Alignment of single-member districts with equal numbers of schools within a district whenever possible.
- Preservation of communities of interest whenever possible.
