We are ½ way into 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter! Here are some things to remember:

- Please make sure your child is doing his/her homework. We get better as we practice!
- Studying is a part of doing spelling homework! Don't let your child just do the writing part of the homework.

  Make sure he/she is practicing spelling the words, especially now that we are getting into 4 and 5 letter words!
- Second quarter conferences may be happening for you. If you did not meet with your child's teacher first
  quarter, please be on the lookout for those conference notes and make every attempt to keep assigned
  appointments.
- Reading should be taking place every night. Fifteen minutes a day... that's all it takes!
- Please check your child's homework folder daily. This is your best way to stay informed as to what is happening in class.

Need ideas for a holiday gift for your child? How about SCHOOL SUPPLIES! This is the time of year when our supplies start running out, and in class we could use more glue sticks, pencils, and colored pencils. Check out your child's spelling notebook... if pages are running out, how about purchasing a new notebook for the new year! You can always bless your child's teacher with them too!!



#### Reading

Unit of study: Writers Tell Many Stories

We will explore several authors and their purpose for writing their stories. Students will learn that authors write to entertain us and to teach us lessons. Stories can show how families and friends care for one another. As we read, we will also describe the main character(s), setting, and retell important events in a story.

We will continue to work on letter recognition, letter formation, learning the sounds of letters, and sounding out words as we read and write. We are also focusing on concepts of print (identifying a word, letter, punctuation marks and to tell when we use them.) You can review these as you read.

Please continue to read to your child every night and ask questions about the story. In addition, have the student retell the story.

#### Math

In math, we are working on identifying and describing two-dimensional shapes. (circles, triangles, rectangles, squares) Students will learn about the attributes of the shapes. Please continue to help your child to count, write, and identify the numbers from 1-20.

Reminder: Students can access IReady reading and math at home. Please ask your child's teacher for the information.



We are off and running in our final stretch of 2021! December may be a short school month, but it will be PACKED with lots of activities, work, and learning. We have lots to do in a very short time, so please talk with your child about not getting lax in their diligence and homework over the month. In reading, our students will be looking into an author's point of view and perspective in a text. Students will need to differentiate between the two and be able to show evidence in the text that lends to the point of view or perspective.

In math, we are continuing to practice multidigit multiplication and division, as well as understanding the factors and multiples of a number. It is very important that students are memorizing their math facts, so please have them study flashcards or use our fluency programs to practice.

We would like to remind you of a couple housekeeping items also:

- Please make sure you have a routine for collecting papers from your child.
   Papers that need to be signed must be returned in a timely manner.
- Reading and math homework continues on! Please monitor your child's homework daily, not just for completion, but also for accuracy!
- Don't forget... our Canvas Courses are available for student and parent use!
- Attendance counts! We start our lessons with the second bell, right at 8:00am so please make sure your child arrives to school on time.

#### Dear Parents:

During December, we are focusing on Kindness as the Character Trait. A caring person is considerate, kind, compassionate and generous. A caring person considers how decisions, words and actions are likely to affect other people. Remind your child that they have the power to brighten someone else's day through a simple act of kindness.

Random acts of kindness go a long way! By displaying kindness, your child could be rewarded by their teacher! Each month, one student is chosen as the Kid of Character. Here are some ways to practice being kind with your child:

Below is a calendar with daily activities for students to practice Kindness. Explore the calendar with your child!





During the month of December, we will be concentrating on the following standards and skills:

In **Phonics** - R-controlled vowels (or, oar, ore, ear, eer, ere)

In Grammar - Adjectives, Adverbs, Subject and Object Pronouns, Interjections

In **Reading** - Use main story elements to retell a literary text, Identify different character perspectives, Create mental images about characters and their point of view, Identify and explain a theme, describe story elements, and identify plot structure and identify similes, idioms and alliteration

In **Math** - Two-digit Addition with and without regrouping, solve one- and two-step word problems, Add up to four two-digit numbers using strategies based on place value, and Explain why addition and subtraction strategies work.





This month, our Third Graders are focusing on...

**Reading:** We are still full swing and enjoying our reading units. Within our units we are learning to identify cause and effect, compare and contrast, points of view, and the importance of paying attention to text features such as maps, timelines, illustrations, captions and more. We are also learning how to compose expository and opinion essays. Our midyear iReady diagnostic will take place this month, that will give us an insight of how the students are progressing and what we need to do to help them with their weakest areas. Please make sure that your child is completing at least 50 minutes of iReady and pass at least two lessons. Also, it is important that they read a minimum of twenty minutes each night as well as answer questions or summarize what they read.

**Math:** We are about to finish with our multiplication and division unit. Students should know their multiplication facts by now. Please help us by ensuring they do Reflex Math on a daily basis until the light turns completely green. Also, by having them go to iReady and complete 50 minutes and pass at least two lessons.

As we approach the end of the second quarter, here is an update as to what skills we have covered so far and what we will be introducing to assist you in preparation for this year's FSA. Finally, we will be spending the last two weeks just before the FSA to revisit & review everything taught during the year as a final preparation for the Florida Standardized Assessment.

#### **Integrated Literacy:**

In Literacy, students are practicing how to -

- · Summarize and synthesize
- · Explain how text structure and/or features contribute to overall meaning
- · Use Context Clues to determine meaning
- · Write expository essays
- · Use prepositions and prepositional phrases
- · Recognize and correct

#### Math

Skills that we have covered and that your child should have already mastered:

- \* How to represent values in word form, expanded form & standard form
- \* Memorization of the multiplication facts 1 through 12
- \* How to read, write, order & compare numbers including decimal numbers
- \* How to Multiply & Divide whole & decimal numbers
- \* How to Multiply & Divide whole & decimal numbers by powers of 10
- \* Addition & Subtraction of whole & decimal numbers
- \* How to round numbers
- \* Estimation of Sums (+) Differences (-) Products (X) & Quotients (/)
- \* How to use models & diagrams to find solutions to a given problem

When we return from our winter break, we will be introducing our units on fluency with Fractions, Geometry & Measurement.





Winter break means a well-deserved reprieve from schoolwork and daily obligations. However, before you know it, the holidays will be over and it will be back to the bus stop, car loop – and of course, eLearning. To prepare for a smooth re-entry and a successful semester, don't let school skills like reading and writing slide completely during winter break. Try these family-friendly activities to keep skills sharp:

#### Read for pleasure.

Whether your child is in the mood for holiday stories, winter break provides the perfect opportunity to stash schoolbooks and read for fun. Encourage relatives to give books as holiday gifts or gather somewhere comfortable to take turns reading books.

#### Make the most of car rides.

Turn the drive to or from a holiday get-together into an opportunity to practice reading strategies and letters and sounds. Don't forget to allow your child to summarize what they've read to you. Ask questions.

By generating questions, students become aware of whether they can answer the questions and if they understand what they are reading. Students learn to ask themselves questions that require them to combine information from different segments of text. For example, students can be taught to ask main idea questions that relate to important information in a text.

#### Have a family game night.

Chances are many of your family's favorite board and card games reinforce skills such as reading, and writing. Gather the group to play games you usually don't have time for on school nights.

You and your students have a well-deserved break approaching. It's important to rest and reconnect, but there may be time for students to keep the learning going. *i-Ready* can help! Students can continue to work on their lessons, practice fluency with Learning Games, and engage their families in their progress.
