What is the "Every Student Succeeds Act"?

Education act signed into law in 2015 that aims to:

- * Provide state standards for all students that are aligned to the demands of postsecondary education and the workforce;
- Provide Statewide assessments that are aligned to statewide standards;
- * Ensure that statewide accountability systems expect more progress for all groups of students, especially for those that are underperforming;

What is the "Every Student Succeeds Act"?

(Continued) Education act signed into law in 2015 that aims to:

- Provide public reporting on the academic outcomes and opportunities to improve learning for all groups of students;
- Improve the quality and effectiveness of teachers and school leaders to increase student academic achievement; and
- Continue providing equitable federal funding to economically disadvantaged students.

What is Title I?

- * Title I is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- * The goal of Title I is a higher quality of education for every child.
- * The program serves millions of children in elementary and secondary schools each year. Coral Springs Middle School is now a Title I school

How Title I Works

- * The federal government provides funding to states each year for Title I.
- * The Florida Department of Education sends the money to the district.
- * The school district identifies eligible schools and provides Title I funds.
- * Coral Springs Middle School implements a Title I program.

School Status

- * School Grade: CSMS currently has a letter grade of B for the 2017-2018 school year
- * Focus: Social Emotional Learning using Conscious Discipline, Positive Behavior Interventions and working with students that fall into the lowest 25%, while having higher
- * High expectations for ALL

Parent's Rights

- * Be provided information on your child's level of achievement on assessments like FSA/EOC assessments in reading/language arts, mathematics, and science
- * Request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher; and
- * Be informed if your child is taught by a non-highly qualified teacher for four or more consecutive weeks.

- * School Public Accountability Report (SPAR) provides parents and the community with important information about each public school
 - * Demographic data;
 - * School safety and climate for learning information;
 - * Academic data;
 - * Graduation rates;
