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Executive Summary

Broward County Public Schools is the sixth-largest school district in the United States and the second largest in Florida. The district serves more than 256,021 students at 231 schools and is one of the largest employers in South Florida with 30,529 team members.

School Mission Statement

Walter C. Young Middle School is a community of learners where all stakeholders (staff, parents and community) strive to ensure that all students exit performing their highest potential in academic and behavioral achievement.

School Community

Walter C. Young serves 870 students enrolled in grades 6-8. The student population's ethnicity is made of 46 % Hispanic and 51 % Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 15% White, 27 % Black, 0% Native %, 8% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 4% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Mark Henderson and Assistant Principal Dr. Ben Reeves, Ms. Madelyn Doval, Ms. Morgan Shabsels. Walter C. Young is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include an introduction to Microsoft Office, which trains students in PowerPoint Presentations, Excel, Word, and mastering real life technology skills. In addition, students design their own blog, as well as a travel document that depicts a history of the student's own travel experiences in order to create their own animated movie through a software called, "Moovty" of their own travel history. To conclude, WCY offers multiple advanced/Honors courses, GEM Math, Pre-Advanced Placement, Cambridge program, Gifted Education, Dual-Language, and English Language Learners. Through a partnership with Flanagan High School (Falcon Flyers), we are providing students the opportunity to earn high school credits while still enrolled in middle school. Support facilitation and electives like Spanish, Peer Counseling, and Chorus.

Moreover, students participate in yearly competitions, such as Science Project (E-cybermission) and Band Assessment.

Purpose of Collection Development Policy

The Media Center's collection of materials for teachers has been selected based on requests and input from several departments in the school. The collection reflects the needs of our school and neighborhood community. Faculty, staff and parents have recommended materials, and are encouraged to continue to do so.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Walter C. Young indicates that the average age of the collection is <10 years and the number of books per student is thousands. The American Association for School Libraries has established a criteria for highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 10 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Walter C. Young does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

Library Program

The WCY/Pembroke Pines Library provides open access to students and staff. The guidelines of the American Library Association have been utilized when developing our library policy. Teachers may request to visit the library by emailing the media specialist. The media specialist will schedule all class visit requests as quickly as possible. Most teachers can be scheduled to within a week of their request. From August – September, it may be a two week wait before the class can be scheduled. The beginning of the school year can be quite busy due to basic library usage and research skills instruction. During class visits, the media specialist will review library procedures, research skills, borrowing books, technology instruction, etc. Teachers may request to have books set aside for student research. The media specialist and teacher will collaborate before each visit to determine what resources are needed. Teachers are expected to provide active supervision in the media center. Please do not plan to have a substitute teacher bring your classes to the media center. If students need to utilize the library individually, the teacher must call the Media Specialist to verify that there is proper supervision for the student.

While using the library, students are expected to follow both BCPS and BCL code of conduct policies.

Scope of the Collection

Materials selected for the WCY/Pembroke Pines Library are chosen with student, staff, and community needs and interests in mind. A variety of materials will be provided to facilitate student and staff interests and educational endeavors. Student and staff learning and enrichment materials will be made available and the collection will be kept current. The BCPS media specialist and BCL staff members will oversee the daily operations of the WCY/Pembroke Pines Library. A collaborative effort is used in determining materials purchased for the school and library. While our shareholders are encouraged to take part in the recommendation process, the final selection of materials purchased with BCPS funds is determined by the BCPS media specialist. The selection process considers at least two critical reviews from professional resources (i.e. School Library Journal, Booklist, Kirkus, or Hornbook). The materials selected will reflect the community's needs and interests. Materials selected will reflect the community needs and interests. Materials will be purchased to provide curriculum support and enhancement. Materials will contain several selections from various Book Award lists. Collection development will also include age appropriate novels that will help make our community one of life-long learners. The materials collected will focus on a wide range of scope and sequence that will support our various curriculums.

The collection assessment will be ongoing. The BCL librarians and the BCPS media specialist will collaborate to determine what materials need to be weeded and what materials need to be added to the collection. Circulation reports will be run by BCPL librarians to assist in this process. Once materials are weeded, it is the responsibility of BCPL to properly eliminate

them from the collection. Materials that are for staff use (reference materials and class sets of novels) will be assessed on a regular basis also. These materials (when deemed necessary) will be weeded according to BCPS protocol.

The district provides online resources to ensure equitable access to information for teaching and learning to improve student performance and achievement. Students and teachers can use Clever or Canvas to access age-appropriate materials that support educational and social-emotional needs through the following online resources: Follett Destiny Online Library Catalog, Gale Online Databases and eBooks, and Sora by Overdrive.

School media centers provide access to library media materials that eliminate educational barriers based on gender, race/ethnicity, national origin, color, religion, disability, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, expression, or other protected group status and that are free of bias, stereotypes, distortions, and prejudices. This includes the ability to obtain information in a variety of formats -electronic, as well as print, without fear of censorship or reprisal.

Collection Development

Collection Development is the process of providing quality materials and equipment for the library media center. The goal of collection development is to ensure the collection has information sources in adequate quantity and variety to support student's academic and personal interest needs. The media specialist is charged with leading this process with the input of teachers, students, and parents. Resources are selected according to principles of intellectual freedom and provide all learners with access to information representing diverse points of view.

Selection and Evaluation Criteria (Drawn from BCPS Policy 4120)

Selection of Materials

Funded by the state, district, and school, the media collection will contain a wide range of appropriate materials on varying levels of difficulty in various existing and emerging formats. It will focus on materials that address different learning styles and levels.

Responsibility

The School Board of Broward County is legally responsible for all matters relating to the operation of the Broward County Schools. The responsibility for coordinating the selection of instructional materials for the School Media Center is delegated to the **professionally trained media specialist** in consultation with the principal, teachers, and students.

*In the event there is not a school library media specialist, the Principal and/or Administrative Designee will assume the responsibility for identifying and selecting an instructional staff

member(s) to engage in the selection process to ensure materials support the needs of the school community.

NOTE: Clerical personnel should NOT be responsible for library material collection development and/or resource management and selection of materials.

Criteria for Selection of Print and Non-Print Materials

- 1. Materials are selected to support the mission of Walter C. Young Middle School
- 2. Materials are selected to enrich and support the curriculum and the educational, emotional, and recreational needs of the users.
- 3. Materials shall be appropriate for the age, emotional development, ability levels, learning styles, and social development of the students.
- 4. Materials shall represent differing viewpoints of controversial issues so that users may be motivated to engage in critical analysis of such issues, to explore their own beliefs, attitudes, and behavior, and to make informed choices in their lives.

In keeping with the Library Bill of Rights, materials will be considered based on the following:

- Needs of the curriculum, learning/teaching styles of students, faculty, and staff
- Possible use of material (including small or large group instruction, in-depth study)
- Level of physical, artistic, and literary quality
- Representation of multiple viewpoints
- Treatment of subject and lack of cultural bias
- Accuracy and currency of information
- Scope of coverage
- Support of inquiry and critical thinking skills
- Relationship of the material to the overall collection
- Cost, packaging, and documentation

Selection Tools

The following professional resources are available to assist the media specialist in the selection process. However, selection is not limited to the use of these tools.

Follett Titlewave: Titlewave is a collection development and curriculum support tool for school libraries, librarians, and educators, featuring professionally curated content from Follett library services and support tools that help you find the most relevant materials.

Mackin: Mackin uses highly acclaimed review sources (AudioFile, Booklist, Horn Book Magazine, Kirkus Reviews, Library Media Connection, Publishers Weekly, and School Library Journal). It places them in one convenient location to make the best selections for school libraries and students.

Periodicals: School Library Journal, Kirkus Reviews, Booklist, Horn Book, Library Media Connection, Journal of Adolescent and Adult Literacy, Young Adult Library Services, Knowledge Quest.

Books: Children's & YA Book Lists: Best Books, Best Books for Young Adult Readers; Books for You: An Annotated Booklist for Senior High Students; Outstanding Books for the College Bound: Choices for a Generation; and Senior High School Library Catalog.

Note: Common Sense Media, Amazon, Goodreads, and Reviews from paid reviewing sources **may be used** in conjunction with professional reviewing sources.

Gifts and Donations

Any gifted or donated items must meet the same selection criteria as all other materials – the selection criteria as listed in House Bill 1467 and in Broward County School Board Policy 4120.

Collection Maintenance

Removing materials from a library collection that are no longer educationally appropriate is as an equally important process as selecting new items of high quality. The library media specialist and/or instructional staff should have an ongoing process to evaluate the library media collection and to keep the collection relevant to the changing needs of the curriculum, personal interests, and needs of students. Evaluation of items under consideration for removal from the Library Media Center should be based on criteria related to the educational value of the resources. The removal (weeding) of library materials from the collection is the responsibility of a skilled professional library media specialist. Weeded items should not be disposed of or discarded at the school site. Weeded items should be boxed and identified as DISCARDED or WITHDRAWN and scheduled for pick up by Procurement and Warehousing Services by completing the enclosed Warehouse Assistance Request Form.

Reconsideration of Materials

Inquiries regarding the appropriateness of particular library and supplemental instructional materials are a normal part of the process of providing a wide variety of resources for student use.

Opt-Out Form

Parents may submit their request to limit their student's access to materials in the school or classroom library by submitting a completed Opt-Out Form to the school principal.

Procedures for Objections to Library Materials and Reading Lists Objection Process

Superintendent Review Committee

- 1. The School Board shall form a Superintendent Review Committee (SRC) to review objections to library materials. The SRC must have a minimum of five members but may have as many additional members as the Superintendent or his/her designee appoints based on need.
- 2. Any committees convened for the purpose of resolving an objection by a parent or resident to specific materials must include parents of students who will have access to such material.
- 3. The membership of the review committee should reflect the broad racial, ethnic, socioeconomic, and cultural diversity of Broward County Public Schools as well as individual(s) with noted or reasonable subject matter expertise.

Phase 1: Complete Objection to Library/Instructional Materials Form

- a. A parent or resident of Broward County who wishes to object to materials used within the School Board of Broward County Public Schools must complete the "Objection to Library/Instructional Materials Form," located on the school's Library Media website. The objection shall include the following information:
- b. Parent or resident of Broward County must specify the text within the material he/she believes is out of compliance with the requirements of Section 1006.28(2)(a)2.a. or b., Florida Statutes, and the nature of the alleged noncompliance.

Phase 2: Notifications

- a. Upon receipt of the completed "Objection to Library/Instructional Materials" form, notifications will be sent to the principal where the challenge originates as well as the Innovative Learning Department staff, school board members, and superintendent.
- b. Any item subject to an objection on the basis of sub-subparagraph b. (I) or sub-sub-subparagraph b. (II) must be removed within 5 school days of receipt Page 9 of 10 of the objection and remain unavailable to students of that school until the objection is resolved.

Phase 3: Superintendent's Review Committee Review

- a. The Innovative Learning Department Director shall convene the SRC to review the material.
- b. SRC will utilize an approved review rubric aligned to School Board policies and state statutes approved by the Superintendent.

Phase 4: SRC's Recommendation to the School Board

- a. A decision will be rendered within ninety (90) days after receipt of the objection.
- b. Committee will submit their recommendation to the School Board of Broward County, the Superintendent, and the parent or resident of Broward County.
 - i. allows the challenged material to maintain its current status;
 - ii. leave the challenged material in the classroom or school media center, but allow students to use alternate materials approved by school personnel who require the use of the disputed items;
 - iii. limit the educational use of the challenged material;
 - iv. transfer the challenged material to a higher-level school (e.g. elementary to a middle school); and/or
 - v. remove the challenged material from the school environment.

Phase 5: Appeal

- a. If a parent or resident of Broward County disagrees with the determination made by the SRC, he/she may request inclusion on the School Board agenda.
- b. If they disagree with the School Board's decision on the objection to the use of a specific material, a parent or resident of Broward County may request from the Commissioner of Education appointment of a special magistrate who is a member of the Florida Bar in good standing and who has at least 5 years' experience in administrative law to render a recommended decision.

BROWARD COUNTY LIBRARIES DIVISION COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT POLICY

I. PURPOSE OF COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT POLICY

The Materials Selection Policy of the Libraries Division is intended to describe how materials for the Library are selected, maintained and evaluated, and to inform the public about the principles of material selection. It directly relates the collection to the Library's mission statement, and defines the scope and standards of the various collections.

Broward County Library's mission is to provide convenient access to a full range of innovative and cost-effective services that satisfy the changing needs of the people of Broward County for information, education, and recreation. Providing access to the collections and electronic resources of the Library is the principal means by which the library fulfills its mission.

The scope of the collection aspires to reflect and appeal to the diverse residents and the American heritage. As the community changes, Broward County Libraries Division (BCL) reassesses and adapts its collections to reflect current and diverse areas of interest and concerns.

II. ABOUT THE LIBRARY AND ITS COMMUNITY

BCL is located in the heart of South Florida and serves all of Broward County. The region covers 410 square miles and is bordered on the east by the Atlantic Ocean, bordered to the west by the Everglades, bordered to the north by Palm Beach County, and bordered to the south by Miami-Dade County. It serves more than 1.9 million residents living in 31 cities including Fort Lauderdale, Pompano Beach, and Hollywood. The library system is comprised of a flagship Main Library, the African-American Research Library and Cultural Center, the NSU Alvin Sherman Library, Research, and Technology Center, five regional libraries (four of which are joint-use facilities with educational partners: Florida Atlantic University, Broward College, and municipal charter schools), and 30 branch libraries.

Broward's residents are 43.5% White, 25.7% Black and 25.1% Hispanic, according to the 2015 statistical atlas (https://statisticalatlas.com). More than one third of residents are foreign born, with two-thirds of those being from Latin America and the Caribbean. 41% of residents speak a language other than English in the home. Resident's median age is 40.2 years; 23% of the population is under the age of 18; 16% of the population is age 65 or over. Broward is home to more than 81,000 veterans. The median household income is \$53,926 however, 13.9% of the population live below the poverty line.

Library Bill of Rights

The American Library Association affirms that all libraries are forums for information and ideas, and that the following basic policies should guide their services.

- I. Books and other library resources should be provided for the interest, information, and enlightenment of all people of the community the library serves. Materials should not be excluded because of the origin, background, or views of those contributing to their creation.
- II. Libraries should provide materials and information presenting all points of view on current and historical issues. Materials should not be proscribed or removed because of partisan or doctrinal disapproval.
- III. Libraries should challenge censorship in the fulfillment of their responsibility to provide information and enlightenment.
- IV. Libraries should cooperate with all persons and groups concerned with resisting abridgment of free expression and free access to ideas.
- V. A person's right to use a library should not be denied or abridged because of origin, age, background, or views.
- VI. Libraries which make exhibit spaces and meeting rooms available to the public they serve should make such facilities available on an equitable basis, regardless of the beliefs or affiliations of individuals or groups requesting their use.
- VII. All people, regardless of origin, age, background, or views, possess a right to privacy and confidentiality in their library use. Libraries should advocate for, educate about, and protect people's privacy, safeguarding all library use data, including personally identifiable information.

Adopted June 19, 1939, by the ALA Council; amended October 14, 1944; June 18, 1948; February 2, 1961; June 27, 1967; January 23, 1980; January 29, 2019.

Inclusion of "age" reaffirmed January 23, 1996.

Although the Articles of the Library Bill of Rights are unambiguous statements of basic principles that should govern the service of all libraries, questions do arise concerning application of these principles to specific library practices. See the documents designated by the Intellectual Freedom Committee as Interpretations of the Library Bill of Rights.

Library Media and Instructional Materials Guide



Library Media and **Instructional Materials** Guide

The purpose of this guide is to inform stakeholders of the opt-out and objection process of library media/instructional materials. The House Bill and Policies mentioned are referenced in the right column.

House Bill HB1069

The bill includes provisions designed to protect children in public schools. The bill includes requirements for age-appropriate and developmentally appropriate instruction for all students in prakindergarten through grade 12.

The bill prohibits district school boards from imposing or enforcing requirements that personne or students be refer with pronouns that do not correspond with biological sex as defined in the bill, subject to specified exceptions.

The bill enhances the process for transparency and review of library and classroom materials available to students is public schools and the process for parants to limit student access to materials and make objections to materials. The bill requires the suspension of materials alleged to contain persongraphy or obscene depictions of sexual contain (identified in current law, pending resource) or objection to the material. A district school board must also discontinuities used on materials the based does not allow a parent to read cloud.


The bill requires that meetings of committees to resolve objections must be noticed and open to the public, and provides an appeals process through a special magistrate.

Each district school board must adopt a policy regarding an objection by a parent or a county resident to the use of a specific material, which county describes a process to handle oil objections and provides for resolution. The process must provide the parent or resident the opportunity to profer ovidence to the district school board [HB 1049]).

BCPS Policy 4120

Policy 6317 was sursetted on 9/13/2022 and embedded into new Policy 4120, which aligns with state statutes and the current library Media Innovative Learning Commons spaces, in addition, the revised policy addresses the objection review process. The newly adopted district policy 4120, continued or June 13, 2023, states that the Superintendent establish a committee that will serve as the Superintendent's Review Committee (SRC). A parent or resident of Broward County that wishes to object to materials used within the School Board of Broward County, Florida public schools must complete the "Objection to Library/Specific Materials Form" located on the School Board of Broward County homepage and on the media center page of each school. All completed objection forms must be emailed to the Director or Innovative Learning at objectiontomaterials@browardschools.com.
