Spring is here and our Kindergarteners are very excited about reading. Our students receive weekly homework packets that need to be completed and returned on Fridays. Sentence writing continues to be a challenge for many, so extra practice at home is very important to their success. Also, continue to work on sight words, decoding two and three letter words, blending sounds, sentence structure, and punctuation.

In math, students are learning numbers to 20 and beyond and skip counting by 2’s, 5’s and 10’s. Please continue to review word problems and addition and subtraction equations with your students.

Your children had fun learning about Famous Americans and American Symbols in Social Studies and we are currently moving on to learn about the similarities and differences between animals, their body coverings, movement, habitats, life cycles and needs.

Our field trip to Flamingo Gardens is scheduled for March 31st. We are excited about all we will see and learn to enhance our learning about plants and animals.

Spring break is right around the corner, the week of April 10th- 14th. Please enjoy this time with your family, but also take time to read and journal about a special moment!

Water Safety lessons will be held from May 1, 2017 through May 12, 2017. We will need parent volunteers to assist in each class. If you will be available to help out any of these days, please discuss this with your child's teacher. All chaperones must be pre-approved and that information is needed as soon as possible. More information about Swim Central will be sent home when we return from spring break.

First graders have been getting ready to bloom into second graders. In math, we have learned about place value and adding and subtracting numbers. We will be learning about measurement, including time. In science, we are learning about motion and gravity. Soon your child will be assessed a final time with the Broward Assessment System, (BAS). These results will be used as one criteria for promotion. Your child should be reading at an instructional level "I" in order to be promoted to second grade. Be sure to read with your child each night and discuss the story. This will help with your child's comprehension and fluency. If you have internet access at home, i-Ready is a great tool to use to enhance your child's learning.

Please check your child's backpack each night and empty out any old or graded papers. Ask questions about graded work.

Happy Spring, everyone! It's hard to believe we will soon be in the 4th quarter of this school year! Our second graders will soon be third graders. We are working very hard to bring all students up to and beyond grade level. Please be sure your child is reading at home 20-30 minutes each day to strengthen reading fluency and skills.

We are studying our favorite Science topic: Life Science. Students learning about the life cycles, needs, and habitats of plants and animals. When walking around your neighborhood, have your child identify plant parts, and look for plants and weeds which have gone to seed. Educational TV has many programs about animals which will help your child understand animal life cycles, when we can't study real animals. Students are very excited when learning about animals. Of course, we all love animal babies.

Please remind your child that homework counts. In second grade, students have 20-30 minutes of homework. The practice and review of skills taught in the classroom really helps students to be ready for the next lesson.

Parents, please give us 24-hour notice when you would like to have a conference. It is very difficult for us to do last minute conferences on the spot. We may be otherwise occupied, or in a previously scheduled conference with another parent. You may schedule a conference by giving us a call, or writing a note in your child's homework agenda. We do want to meet with you, and give you the necessary time for a complete and uninterrupted meeting. Thank you for understanding.

Third graders have been working hard preparing for our upcoming Reading and Mathematics Florida Standards Assessment, (FSA). The reading portion of the test will be on March 28th and 29th and the math portion is in April.

Students have been learning reading and math strategies and have become proficient with the many benchmarks for third grade. We highly encourage that students have a quiet place to read at home for at least 30 minutes on a daily basis. Let them read aloud to you and hear the progress they are making with their fluency. Also, ask your child questions about what they read (i.e. state the problem, give an example of cause & effect, who is the main character, can you describe him/her?). Having them read and monitor their reading time, exposes them to new vocabulary and gives them the necessary stamina to complete tasks with maximum effort and focus.

Parents play a critical role in their children's learning. Being involved in their education shows students the importance of school, and how it will affect their future. It is very

important that on test days, students get a good night's rest, have a healthy breakfast, and feel ready for school. We suggest encouraging your child by letting them know that they "got this," or not to worry, and to do their best. Positive and loving interactions allow students to enter their testing class with a positive attitude and a smile on their faces. Please continue to look for important papers that go home. They contain valuable information.

If you have not had a chance to fill out the parent survey, please take the time to complete the form and return it to school as soon as possible.

We appreciate the time you take to help make your child successful in school.

Wow! We are already three months into 2017, and time is flying by. The 4th graders just recently took their Florida Standards Assessment, (FSA) Writing section and we are very proud of the effort they put into their writing; they should be very proud of themselves! Although one FSA, is done, we still have two more to continue preparing for.

Please check your child's agenda daily and make sure they are completing all homework, including their i-Ready workbook; these lessons are very important for the upcoming FSA. The Reading FSA will take place after Spring Break (April 24-25) and the Math FSA will be given May (May 4-5). Please check to see if your child has been given a study packet to complete over Spring Break and make sure they are working on it each day to keep the material from being forgotten. It is essential that your child is practicing the skills they have been taught over Spring Break because they are being assessed soon after they return. Encourage your child to log onto the i-Ready reading and math computer programs and ten marks. These programs are excellent in preparing for the FSA. Please continue to have your child read 30 minutes or more a night to help build their reading stamina in preparation for the FSA. **Reminder: Students in 4th grade need to pass the math and reading FSA to be promoted.**

Now that the year is more than half over, please replenish your child's supplies. Fourth graders need a package of #2 pencils, pink eraser, a new homework folder if it is ripped or lost and a package of notebook paper to complete the year,

along with new notebooks if their previous notebooks have been filled.

It is also essential that your child is coming to school **daily** and **on time**. As always, donations of school supplies and motivational treats are truly appreciated! Let's continue working together to help support our students to finish out testing and the school year on a positive note! Thanks for all you've done and continue to do to help these students to succeed.

Test Prep and Study Skills for parents

- Map out a study schedule, 15 to 30 minutes a night depending on the child's age, how much material there is to cover, and how much homework needs to be done.
- Find out if the teacher has explained whether the test is short-answer, multiple-choice, essay, or a combination of the three. For the first two kinds of tests, kids will need to know lots of facts and details; thinking about the big picture is more important.

- Review class notes, textbook chapters, study questions, and other materials together, and ask your child what she thinks is the most important info.
- Help your child write down answers and key pieces of information so she can review them later
- Review the basics, like who, what, when, where, and why.
- On test day, remind your child to read the questions and answer choices all the way through.
- Do provide a quiet, comfortable place for studying at home and make sure that your child is well rested on school days and especially on the day of a test. Children who are tired are less able to pay attention in class or to handle the demands of a test.

Reminders!

Please continue to encourage your child read and take AR quizzes.

Each child has access to i-ready.com, there they can practice all the reading and math skills covered in class.

Hello Parents and Guardians!

It's hard to believe that Spring is here and we are beginning our fourth and final quarter of the school year! Your children have been busy working on the character traits of Honesty (February) and Self-Control (March). We also wrapped up our Pennies for Patients Campaign, which raised money for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. Our families helped raise over \$700, which will help fund research for life-saving blood cancer research.

Our second graders had a special visit from the "I'm Thumbbody" program, who worked with our students on self-esteem and standing up to bullying. Second grade also recently participated in our Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT), which will inform us of your child's individual learning style, predict achievement on standardized tests, and screen for gifted ability.

For those of you with students in the intermediate grades, we will be administering the Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) in the areas of ELA Reading and Mathematics, as well the FCAT 2.0 Science for our fifth graders only. These assessments will take place immediately

following our April Spring Break. Please remember that you play an important role in your student's academic success! You can help your child perform at his/ her best by ensuring that your s/he gets a good night's sleep prior to testing, is present and on-time for school, and also that s/he eats a healthy breakfast before coming to school (Note: Free Universal Breakfast is provided in the cafeteria everyday beginning at 7:05am until 7:35am).

You may also assist your child in preparing for the FSA by ensuring that your child attends after-school camps, completes all necessary homework and classwork, and by accessing practice test questions online at: <http://fsassessments.org/students-and-families/practice-tests/>.

A letter will be sent home with your child prior to assessments, but please find the testing dates below and mark your calendars! (*Note: most assessments are computer-based, except for Grade 3 ELA, Grade 5 Science and/ or if your child receives accommodations for testing). All students taking a computer-based test will need headphones. We are able to provide headphones for students, but if you would like to send in personal headphones for your student to use you are able to do so. Please feel free to contact me with any questions or concerns!
