Dear Peters Family,

Let me congratulate you on completing the first two weeks of school. We understand what an unbelievable challenge this continues to be, and we thank you for the incredible effort you put forth every day to ensure your children are ready to learn. Don't give up Pandas! Every day, we become wiser, stronger and more able to navigate this "new normal".

Presently, we are gathering data in the form of diagnostic assessments and observations to determine where our students are, which then enables us to plan a tailored path of instruction.

Our goals this year include:

- 1. Help students identify social emotional triggers and apply self-regulation strategies by providing social emotional learning/lessons and practicing strategies.
- 2. Increase overall learning gains in English Language Arts to 58% by increasing the number of students making one year or more of growth on the Benchmark Assessment System (BAS) and/or the iReady Diagnostic assessment (Compared from beginning of year to end of year).
- 3. Increase overall learning gains in mathematics to 50% by increasing the number of students making one year or more of growth on the iReady Diagnostic assessment (Compared from beginning of year to end of year).
- 4. Increase the number of 5th grade students making a level 3 or higher on the Science FSA by having 50% or more of student making a 70% or higher on the End of Year Science assessment.

I encourage you to schedule a Parent/Guardian Conference with your child's teacher soon. He/She should also be contacting you with beginning of year academic data.

Each day I try to remind myself how fortunate I am to have an exceptional staff that is working beyond expectation, an amazing community of families, students and sponsors who continue to SHOW UP!

COVID 19 Protocols – NEW

Students who have **tested positive or are experiencing symptoms** consistent with COVID-19
should not attend school, or attend school-sponsored activities or be on school property until:

- The student receives a negative diagnostic COVID-19 test and is asymptomatic; or
- Ten days have passed since the onset of symptoms or positive test result, the student has had no fever for 24 hours and the students' other symptoms have improved;
- The student receives written permission to return to school from a medical doctor licensed under chapter 458, an osteopathic physician licensed under chapter 459 or an advanced practice registered nurse licensed under chapter 464.

Students who have been **exposed (direct contact)** to an individual who received a positive COVID-19 test (exposed is defined as cumulative exposure for at least 15 minutes, within 6 feet) should not attend school, or attend school sponsored activities or be on school property until:

- The student is asymptomatic and receives a negative diagnostic COVID19 test after four days (on day five or later) from the date of last exposure to the COVID-19 positive individual; or
- The student is asymptomatic, and seven days have passed since the date of last exposure (on day 8) to the COVID-19 positive individual. If a student that is known to have been exposed (direct contact) with an individual that was positive for COVID-19 becomes symptomatic following exposure, the student should follow the procedures described above in the Isolation Guidance.

COVID 19 Protocols – Continued

If a student with a prior COVID-19 infection in the previous 90 days or a fully vaccinated student becomes symptomatic, the student should follow the procedures described above in the Isolation Guidance.

Students who have tested positive for COVID-19 within the past 90 days and recovered do not need to be quarantined for any period of time as long as they are asymptomatic.

FREE MEALS

Breakfast and lunch are now FREE! You are HIGHLY encourage to complete the Free and Reduced Meal Application form regardless of having these meals provided at no cost. Also, the approval of the application stays active until the end of September 2022, which means your child would continue to receive Free or reduced meals in the beginning of the 2022-2023 school year, until you reapply if they qualify.

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GRADE LEVEL NEWS

PRE-KINDERGARTEN

All our preschool classes at Peters Elementary are enjoying a wonderful start to the year. We are learning how to make that big transition to school which includes saying good-bye to our parents and caregivers at drop off. We are adjusting to class procedures and having fun! Second Grade

In Math the students are utilizing various strategies to solve single-digit addition and subtraction equations. In Science we are concentrating on thinking like a scientist and how to use science tools. In Social Studies we are emphasizing how to be a good citizen in our classrooms.

Third Grade

Third graders are off to a phenomenal start for the 2021/2022 school year! All the teachers are thrilled to have our students back in the classroom with us. Third grade is a very important transitional year. It will be the first-year students take the Florida Standards Assessment (FSA). Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety



Is there a beep or a chirp coming out of your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? What does it all mean? Knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family! Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and knows how to respond. Learn the sounds of your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms by checking the user guide or search the brand and model online.

What is your alarm telling you?

SMOKE ALARMS

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- · All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home.
 Go outside, call 9-1-1 and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have "end of life" sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of everyone in your home, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

Some tips:

- Install a bedside alert device that responds to the sound of the smoke and CO alarms. Use of a low frequency alarm can also wake a sleeping person with mild to severe hearing loss.
- Sleep with your mobility device, glasses, and phone close to your bed.
- Keep pathways like hallways lit with night lights and free from clutter to make sure everyone can get out safely.

Get out and stay out! Call 9-1-1 from outside.

Hear a Chirp, Make a Change!

chirping alarm needs attention. Replace the batteries or the entire unit if it's over 10 years old. If you don't remember how old the unit is, replace it!
