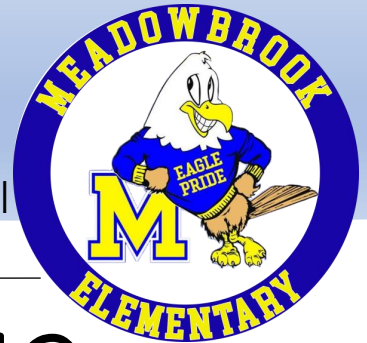

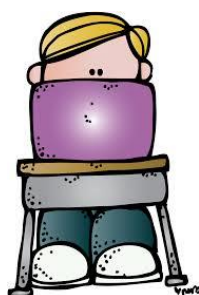
## School Advisory Council

## Lost Property



Please ensure that all items of clothing are clearly marked with your child's name and encourage your child to take responsibility for his/ her own belongings. We have a **lost and found located in the cafeteria** where children may search through the lost items. Parents, please remind your child not to take items that do not belong to them, if by chance an item does come home that does not belong to your child, please return it to the school.

## Five Tips Toward a More Positive Attitude

1. Kids model their parents' behavior. If they see you bouncing back from setbacks, they'll learn to do the same.
2. Help them see a way around obstacles. When something doesn't work out as planned, encourage them to brainstorm other ways to approach the problem or to reach their goal.
3. Let them know that negative reactions are okay when it's appropriate. Having a positive attitude doesn't mean burying legitimate feelings, but acknowledging them, and then finding a way to move on.
4. Teach constructive reframing. If a child declares she's lousy at sports, suggest that she simply needs more practice and that if excelling at sports *is important to her*, she'll eventually master the necessary skills.
5. Encourage positive self-talk. Words have power, so offer a few affirmations they can repeat until they become second nature.

## Transportation Changes

Please note, that due to security reasons, changes to your child's transportation status cannot be delivered via telephone. This is for the safety of your child, as we cannot safely identify callers via the telephone. Please help us by sending **any changes** with your child **in writing** to be delivered to the teacher the day before. Thank you for helping us to get our students home safely.



### Arrival



For the safety of our students, they should not arrive to school prior to 7:15 AM, as there is **NO** supervision available. Breakfast is served each morning beginning at 7:15 AM until 7:50 AM. Students must arrive to the cafeteria on time in order to have breakfast. The first bell rings at 7:50 AM. It is vital that all students arrive to school on time.

### Car Line

#### Drop off



- For safety reasons cell phone use is prohibited.
- Only the east parking area is to be used for drop off and pick up
- Please pull all the way forward, in order to keep the line moving.
- Remain inside your car.
- Once all cars have stopped, please allow your child to exit the vehicle.
- Students should exit from the passenger side of the vehicle.

#### Pick up

- Please have your car tag displayed EVERYDAY for faster service.
- Pull all the way forward before allowing your student in the car.
- Remain inside your car.
- Car line closes at 2:25 PM, after which you will need to go inside to pick up your student, **identification is required**.

## Pre-School

In February the preschool classes were busy making patterns with Valentine colors (red, white and pink). We are learning that Valentine's Day is a time to show affection to family and friends by sending and receiving cards, gifts and flowers. Also, love and friendship can be expressed in many ways. Examples are sharing, helping and talking or playing with each other in kind ways. Parents talk with your child about the ways people in your family are kind to one another.

## Second Grade

Second-grade students are currently working on retelling stories and identifying story elements, as well as continuing with writing opinion pieces based on texts they have read. In math we are counting coins and telling time to five-minute intervals. In science we are exploring magnets and learning about their daily uses. Please continue to read to your child, as well as letting your child read to you for a combined 30 minutes per night. Thanks for all the support as we watch your child learn and mature.

## Kindergarten

This month in kindergarten, we will focus on technology at home and at school. In math, we are learning addition and subtraction 0 to 10. In science, we are learning about the sounds. In social studies, we are learning about United States symbols. February, the month of love, is upon us, and we're spreading love throughout the entire month. Looking forward to sharing even more with you next month!

## Third Grade

Happy February! In reading, we are learning how text features contribute to meaning and identify the text structures of chronology, comparison, cause/effect in texts. In math, we are learning how to add and subtract multi-digit numbers including using a standard algorithm. In science, we are investigating, observing, and explaining that heat is produced when one object rubs against another. Help us at home by reminding students to read at least 20 minutes a day. Students can also practice their math on I-Ready Math which is located in Clever.

## First Grade

This month "Our Soaring Eagles" in grade one continue working with Benchmark Advance Unit 5 topic "Technology at Work". They will identify the topic and relevant details in a text, use topic and important details for an informational text and identify and describe the main story elements in a story. Students will produce an informational writing piece. During our Math block we are working on topic 9 Order and Compare Two Digit Numbers. In science students are learning about "Material on Earth's Surface" SC.1.E.6.1.

On February 7, 2024, students get to engage in a fun activity to celebrate the hundredth day of school. Students have the option of dressing up in their favorite 100th Day attire. We are so excited they are a hundred days smarter! February 14, 2024, Valentine's Day/Day of Service Early Release.

## Fourth Grade

In ELA, students will be learning about the author's claim or perspective in any given text, explaining how relevant details support its central idea, understanding its text structure to further our understanding of the text, and writing expository texts on non-fiction topics. In Math, students are learning how to create equivalent fractions using different strategies. They will be moving into adding/subtracting fractions soon.

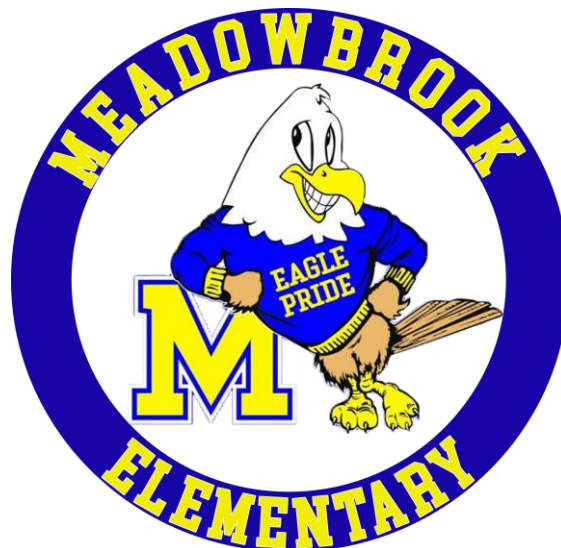
