

Transportation Changes

Please note, that due to security reasons, changes to your child's transportation status cannot be delivered via telephone. Pre-School

In school this month, the preschool students will be learning all about the weather. We are recording each day's weather on a calendar. We're also learning what to wear in different kinds of weather. Please try the following activity at home. Each morning, look out the window and check the weather with your child. Encourage your child to choose what to wear for the day

Second Grade

Second graders are off to a great start this year! We are reading informational text and learning about habitats and life cycles. In math, we are working on strategies to add and subtract single-digit numbers. Students need to use flash cards and Reflexmath.com daily in order to quickly recall addition and subtraction facts. Contact your child's teacher about resources to use at home to ensure your child succeeds. Please sign the planner daily and make sure your child completes all homework assignments.

Kindergarten

In Kindergarten, we continue to work on beginning sounds in words and sight words. We are learning to answer questions about a story and fiction and nonfiction text. In math, we are comparing numbers 0-5. In science, we are learning about real and make-believe plants and animals. Finally, we are also learning about the season fall, fire safety and pumpkin investigation. Can't wait to share more with you next month.

First Grade

We will be studying characters this month and learning to write narratives. In Math, we are working with addition and subtraction in word problems. For Science we will study trait inheritance and variations in living things, and in Social Studies we will be learning how to be responsible members of our community.

Third Grade

Fall is here! It's the perfect time to continue practicing reading and comprehension. Pumpkins, weather, and the color of trees are great topics you can discuss with your student this month! It's also a great time to start practicing multiplication and reading graphs. In science we are exploring Parts of Plants and Photosynthesis! Our teachers are working hard to instruct and engage your child, so they are growing academically and in social and life skills. We're all in this together! Happy October!

Fourth Grade

In Reading, we are learning about Opinion Writing, identifying the main idea, supporting details, and summarizing text. We are also celebrating Hispanic Heritage month where we are celebrating influential Individuals of Hispanic background via our Read Aloud literature and Writing cultural projects. In Math, for October, we are learning how to add and subtract larger numbers. This is an extension of 3rd grade so the students should be confident with this concept. Parents, please continue to encourage students to complete their I-Ready lessons and to the log onto our Reflex Math program.




