TIPS FOR READING SUCCESS



BUILD READING SKILLS WITH YOUR YOUNGSTER BY READING WITH THEM.

1. **READ REGULARLY-** TRY TO READ WITH YOUR CHILD EVERY DAY. SET A GOAL TO READ FOR 10-15 MINUTES. SOME SUGGESTIONS FOR REGULAR READING ARE TO READ AT BEDTIME TO CREATE A PEACEFUL END OF THE DAY. YOU CAN ALSO BRING ALONG A BOOK TO A SIBLING'S SPORTS PRACTICE OR JUST FIND A TIME TO READ WHEN YOU GET HOME FROM A BUSY DAY.
2. **TAKE TURNS CHOOSING BOOKS TO READ-** YOUNGER CHILDREN LOVE TO HEAR AN OLD FAVORITE AGAIN AND AGAIN. THAT'S GREAT! CHANGE THINGS UP BY CHOOSING A NEW TITLE OR GENRE WHEN IT'S YOUR TURN TO CHOOSE. YOU MAY WANT TO TRY NONFICTION OR POETRY.
3. **LET THEM PARTICIPATE-** ASK YOUR YOUNGER CHILD TO TURN PAGES WHILE YOU READ. FOR OLDER CHILDREN HAVE THEM MAKE PREDICTIONS ABOUT WHAT WILL HAPPEN NEXT. GO SLOWLY SO THEY HAVE TIME TO UNDERSTAND THE STORY, NEW VOCABULARY, OR LOOK AT THE ILLUSTRATIONS. CHILDREN ENJOY READ ALOUD TIME IF THEY ARE AN ACTIVE PART OF THE READING.
4. **BE PLAYFUL-** YOU CAN USE DIFFERENT VOICES FOR THE VARIOUS CHARACTERS IN A STORY. YOU CAN ALSO SUBSTITUTE YOUR CHILD'S NAME FOR THE MAIN CHARACTER'S NAME.

NOTE: YOU DON'T HAVE TO BE AN EXPERT READER...YOUR YOUNGSTER WILL JUST LOVE THAT YOU TOOK THE TIME TO READ WITH THEM.

VOCABULARY BOOSTERS:

WHEN CHILDREN HAVE A LARGE VOCABULARY, IT CAN TURN THEM INTO A BETTER READER AND WRITER. WHEN TALKING WITH YOUR CHILD, USE NEW VOCABULARY AND EXPLAIN THE MEANING. EXAMPLE: YOU MAY BE AT THE GROCERY STORE AND SEE A TUB OF BUTTER WITH THE WORD "VEGAN" WRITTEN ON IT. TAKE TIME TO EXPLAIN WHAT THE WORD "VEGAN" REPRESENTS.

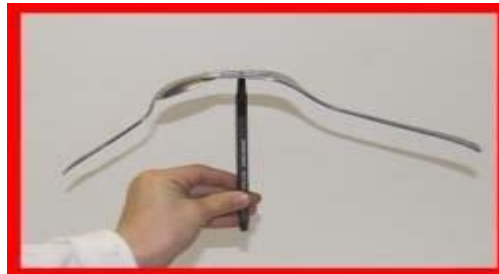
SCIENCE CURRENT EVENTS

- **Animals frolicking beneath Antarctica** NASA took a two-minute video beneath the Antarctic ice cap recently. Scientists expected to find some microscopic life 600 feet below the surface of the Antarctic ice cap and instead found two animals that appeared to be frolicking in the ocean during the short video. One was a 3-inch shrimp like animal and the other was a jellyfish.

SCIENCE TRIVIA

- Jelly fish are not really fish because they don't have a backbone. They are underwater creatures with tentacles and a jelly-like body shaped like a bowl turned upside down. The Portuguese man-of-war has tentacles that can be more than 100 feet long. The tentacles contain poison used to catch the prey they eat. If you brush against a Portuguese man-of-war while swimming it will release venom that will cause you a great deal of pain.

SIMPLE SCIENCE ACTIVITY BALANCING ACT



Introduction

Every object has a center of gravity. In this activity students will find the center of gravity of a spoon and fork.

Materials

- Spoon and fork
- Ballpoint pen or pencil

Directions

- Joint the spoon and fork by sliding the spoon through the tines of the fork.
- Place the ballpoint pen beneath the fork and spoon so it balances.
- Now balance the fork and spoon on the eraser of the pencil. Determine if the spoon and fork are more stable on the pencil lead or eraser.

- **Science Behind the Experiment**

The center of gravity of the spoon and fork is below the base of support, which in this activity is the point of the pencil lead or the pencil eraser. The eraser is more stable than the pencil point because it has a larger base of support.

A BIG Jump

From 2nd to 3rd Grade

You might be surprised to know that third grade is typically thought of as **the most important year in a child's academic career**. It's the year that students move **from learning to read** — decoding words using their knowledge of the alphabet — **to reading to learn**. Where academic performance and school expectations are concerned, big changes occur in third grade!

When children enter 3rd grade, the level of work and expectation becomes much more challenging than what they experienced in previous grades. The reading passages get harder, the amount of writing gets longer, and the level of abstract thinking in mathematics increases. This is the year that your child needs to know all their basic math facts (+, -, x) and other important foundational information.

As a parent, you can help your child lessen the increased stress of performing well at school by offering lots of encouragement. Praise the effort they put into learning a new concept, memorizing facts, or spending extra time to do an assignment well. Be sure to reassure your child that tests and grades do not necessarily determine future success. If your child faces difficulties, or even failure, help them see that these moments are all part of the learning process.

Reading

Third graders are no longer learning to read; now they're reading to learn. They're reading longer books with chapters and using more complex reading strategies. They should be able to:

- Use reading strategies such as asking questions, making inferences and summarizing.
- Describe characters in a story.
- Understand the different genres of fiction.
- Determine the main idea and details in non-fiction texts.



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Terrific 3rd Grade continued

- Use and understand text features in non-fiction texts.
- Use context clues to learn new vocabulary.
- Compare and contrast information from texts.

Writing

When it comes to writing, third graders take the foundational skills they've learned thus far and apply them. Now they should be able to:

- Use thinking maps to organize their ideas.
- Write in a variety of genres including letters, personal narratives, fiction stories and research reports.
- Revise and edit their writing.
- Write in paragraphs using transition words.
- Write in cursive.
- Understand parts of speech: noun, verb and adjective.
- Correctly use basic punctuation.
- Understand prefixes, suffixes and homophones.
- Use reference books such as the dictionary and thesaurus.
- Support opinions in expository writing.

Math

Third-grade math expects students to know their addition, subtraction, multiplication and division fact families and use them in equations and two-step word problems. In addition, third graders need to know how to:

- Read and write large numbers through the hundred thousands, knowing the place value for each digit.
- Round and compare numbers.
- Understand equivalent fractions, be able to compare fractions
- Use number lines.
- Recognize and write patterns.
- Do mental addition and subtraction.
- Add four-digit numbers.
- Subtract with regrouping.
- Know time to minute and elapsed time in minutes.
- Read and make graphs.
- Determine a shape's perimeter and area.
- Recognize two-dimensional shapes and their attributes.
- Measure with both Customary and Metric systems – length, weight, volume and temperature.
