Guidance Counselor

Greetings parents! As we go into these next few months, we will be having several assessments. Please ensure your student is fully prepared and ready to do their best on test day with these tips:

Please make sure your student is attending and participating in school daily so they continue learning!

- Make sure your student gets enough sleep the night before the test (at least 8 hours).
- Feed them a good breakfast.
- Get them to school on time.
- Tell them positive and encouraging words the day of.

Policy 5.5 Attendance Revised

During distance learning, the use of student cameras is required for attendance and instruction. Students will be counted in attendance in the learning environment during their scheduled class time. Teachers should be flexible and consider any extenuating circumstances of individual students who may be unable to turn on a camera. Teachers may consider other evidence of attendance for individual cases.

Virtual Attendance

Florida Statute 1003.21 states that all children between the ages of 6 to 16 are required to attend school regularly during the entire school year. Statute 1003.24 states that parents are responsible for the school attendance of their children. Parents, if your child is going to be virtually absent, please call the attendance hotline (754) 322-8152 to report the absence. Parents are responsible for their child's regular attendance. To report an absence, visit our website under CONTACT, then select REPORT AN ABSENCE to submit an electronic form, call the attendance hotline, or deliver a note to our staff. Our goal is to have ALL students that are able to attend more than 95% of school days. Students that are absent 5 or more days may require parental interventions from school staff. Truancy notifications may lead to more severe penalties. Absences impact the teaching and learning for all students in the classroom. If your child must be absent for an excusable reason, please report the absence within 24 hrs. Our attendance clerk will update all absences that are reported and meet one of the reasons in the attendance policy.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

Parents of Face to Face (F2F) students, please be sure you perform the Daily Health Self-Assessment Checklist on your child(ren) PRIOR to sending them to school., Students who do not feel well or who cannot answer NO to all questions below are NOT permitted to come into school. Thank you for your cooperation.

- Do you feel warm, have a fever or elevated temperature (100.4), or have the chills?
- Do you have a persistent cough, runny nose, or sore throat?
- Have you recently had a loss of taste or smell?
- Has anyone in your household tested positive for COVID-19?
- Have you been in close, unprotected contact with anyone who has tested positive for COVID-19?
- Are you feeling sick or ill today?
- Are you awaiting test results for COVID-19?
- Have you been told to self-quarantine or selfisolate by a doctor or the Florida Department of Health?

Distraction Burglary

The Coral Springs Police Department is encouraging residents to be cautious of unknown individuals attempting to get homeowners to come outside.

There has been an increase in reported cases of scams using distraction burglary techniques. Please take a minute to read the following:

During these incidents, scammers who generally work in pairs or groups will attempt to get a resident to leave their front door while pointing out something on their property. During this time another person may enter the residence and take items of importance, value, or personal information. These distraction techniques have led to thousands of dollars and property being stolen from victims.

REMEMBER: If someone unknown, even an officer or city worker, comes to your door unexpectedly ask for identification do not give them entry to your house or personal information. Above all, if you or anyone you know has been or feels like they could be experiencing a scam like this please call our nonemergency line at 954-344-1800.

Literacy Coach's Corner

The Importance of an Independent Reading Routine at Home

One way to become a better reader is to read! Independent reading is a key element of learning how to

read. Independent reading is children's reading of text such as books, magazines, and newspapers — on their own, with minimal to no assistance from adults. It can consist of reading done in or out of school, including purely voluntary reading for enjoyment or assigned reading for homework. There are strong associations between independent reading and reading achievement, and many researchers believe that independent reading plays a key role in the development of reading fluency (speed and ease of reading), vocabulary, background knowledge, and even spelling. Research also shows students who read independently become better readers, score higher on achievement tests in all subject areas and have greater content knowledge than those who do not. **Here are some ideas to increase the amount of independent reading at home:**

Have a routine that includes a set time and a quiet comfortable location for reading.

Allow your child to choose the books! A visit to a library or bookstore can spark interest in reading!

Remind them to read. It can take on average 18 days to build a new habit. Your child will need guidance and reminders during this time.

Encourage children to develop an interest in a variety of genres such as biography, historical fiction, and poetry. Challenge them to stop and check for comprehension after reading each paragraph or page. Children who check for comprehension and use fix up strategies become stronger readers. Fix up strategies include re-reading, looking up words, asking questions, and adjusting the reading rate. Let them become familiar with newspapers and magazines that address contemporary social, cultural, and civic issues. In other words, make reading an enjoyable part of your child's day!

Curbside Grab & Go Meals

Due to the low number of curbside meals served at our school, curbside meal distribution will no longer be offered at Ramblewood Elementary. Free curbside grab-and-go meals continue to be available at other school locations, the closest school being Coral Springs High School. Meals are distributed every Tuesday and Thursday for free for all children 18 years and younger. Beginning on Thursday, February 4, Sunday meals will now be included in meal bundles on Thursdays. Tuesday meal bundles will include meals for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, while Thursday meal bundles will include meals for Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday. 
